BHC dismisses constitution petition filed against appointment of some members of interim cabinet

QUETTA: The Balochistan High Court (BHC) dismissed the constitution petition in which the appointment of three members of provincial caretaker cabinet and an Advisor to caretaker Chief Minister were challenged.

The division bench of High Court, Mr. Justice Naem Akhtar Afghan disposed of the CP No. 1308/2023 wherein the petition had challenged the appointment of Dr. Qadir Bakhsh Baloch, Jan Achakzai and Captain (Retd) Zubair Jamali as members of the cabinet and appointment of Ms. Shania Khan as Advisor to caretaker CM was challenged on the grounds that they are suffering from disqualification under Article 63 of the Constitution of Islamic Repub-

lic of Pakistan 1973 having affiliation with political parties; Mr. Jan Achakzai is a British national and he remained affiliated with different political parties in different years, Capt (Retd) Zubair Jamali is a close relative of Speaker Balochistan Provincial Assembly; Ms. Shania Khan was previously appointed as coordinator to then Chief Minister and she ceased to hold the office in pursuance of judgment dated 26.07.2023 passed by this court in CP No. 282/2023; Dr. Qadir Bakhsh Baloch is permanent resident of Taunsa/ Dera Ghazi Khan, he remained professor / Director Business Studies and Leadership in Abdul Wali Khan University Mardan, he was removed from service on 24.07.2023 on the allegation of illegal appointments.

Election Commission to decide polls date: PM

We have no intention to prolong tenure of the caretaker government; Action against smuggling would continue and the writ of the state would be established

ISLAMABAD (APP): Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar Monday said Election Commission would decide about the date for the upcoming elections.

In an interview with a private television, he said Parliament had passed a law according to which Election Commission had the power to announce the date for new elections.

Speculation regarding the elections should end as these would be held according to the prevalent law, he said adding, "We have no intention to prolong tenure of the caretaker government."

He said as a student of

history of Pakistan, he would express gratitude to Quaid-e-Azam for protecting rights of the Muslim minority and saving it from the domination of majority.

After seeing the attitude of bigger states against the minorities, he said he could see that it would have been difficult to protect the religious and cultural identity of Muslims if Quaid had not secured an independent state for Muslims.

He said he admired Quaid-e-Azam for his constitutionalism, all-inclusiveness and for protection of rights of minorities.

The prime minister assured that action against smuggling would continue and the writ of the state would be established.

"We are taking these actions so that the new government with its mandate can easily continue our work for public interest."

He said the apex committee of Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC) included current military leadership, thus making the council a strong constitutional and legal body which was taking firm actions and implementing decisions. The caretaker federal and provincial governments had good coordination which was helpful in implementing decisions, he noted.

SC tested several times over constitutional matters in Feb 2023, says CJP

ISLAMABAD (INP): Speaking for the last time at a ceremony marking the commencement of the new judicial year on Monday, Chief Justice of Pakistan Umar Ata Bandial said that the court was tested several times in February 2023 with matters pertaining to the Constitution of Pakistan.

He added that he did not want to repeat all that has happened but it is reflected in part in the decision for the audio leaks case.

Commenting on his differences with incoming CJP Qazi Faez Isa, Justice Bandial maintained that the latter was an admirable man.

The media is the eyes and ears of society, said the CJP, but, he added, incorrect reports were published about him. He referred to the use of his phrases "good to see you" and "short and sweet" and said they were taken out of context. He doesn't hold this against the media, he added.

The outgoing CJP said that this might be his last address as the chief justice, and mentioned that the ongoing political situation has also affected judicial performance. Commenting on the performance of the apex court, CJP Bandial said that the SC disposed of 23,000 cases in the past year, breaking a previous record of disposing of 18,000 cases in one year. He added that he had wished to reduce the number of pending cases by 50,000 but managed to address only 2,000 cases from the backlog.

Justice Bandial took office as CJP in February 2022 and is due to retire on September 16, 2023. The Supreme Court has been marred with controversies this year against the backdrop of a political crisis which has garnered the attention of international media and much uncertainty surrounding the next general elections.

250 tons of sugar, 750 tons Urea recovered from three godowns in Kuchlak

Vulnerable Chitral

The Chitral region of KP has been in the headlines of late due to the Sept 6 deadly cross-border incursion in which a large band of TTP militants reportedly crossed over and attacked Pakistani positions before being pushed back into Afghanistan.

Though the authorities have not given any numbers, the raiders were reported to be in the 'hundreds'. The interim foreign minister insists this was an "isolated incident" and that the Afghan Taliban rulers did not sanction the attack, while the Foreign Office has repeated the mantra that Pakistan's concerns have been communicated to the relevant quarters in Kabul. State functionaries may be giving the impression that all is well in the region, but more information is needed on the exact details of the attack, while the local people need to be reassured that their lives and properties will be protected by the state. Chitral lies in a strategically sensitive area, bordering Afghanistan and with only the Wakhan Corridor separating it from Tajikistan. China's Xinjiang region is also in the vicinity.

This makes it an attractive location for transnational jihadists looking to expand their operations, even though Chitral itself has largely been shielded from terrorist activity.

Moreover, the region is culturally, linguistically and ethnically distinct from the rest of KP. While Swat and erstwhile Fata suffered the most during earlier waves of terrorism, Chitral managed to weather the storm. The area where the incursion took place is close to the traditional lands of the Kalash people, and Chitral also has a significant Ismaili population.

Therefore, the state needs to beef up security in the area, as the banned TTP and sectarian militants thrive on targeting minority communities. While there have been reports of small-scale infiltration from Afghanistan, the last major incursion occurred in 2011 when reportedly a very large number of terrorists staged attacks, leading to several fatalities among security men.

Simply expecting the Afghan Taliban to 'do more' may not be enough, especially when there is speculation that some Taliban factions may actually be encouraging attacks within Pakistan.

The best option is for the military to provide iron-clad security to all vulnerable border regions, and ensure that no groups are again able to violate Pakistan's territory.

A jirga in Chitral has asked the army chief to visit the area, and called upon the authorities to fence the border with Afghanistan. Reports indicate that the Afghan Taliban had started relocating TTP fighters from the border area; the process must be sped up so that this ever-present threat on the country's frontiers is neutralised. The terrorist threat on the borders must be handled proactively. In the past, the country has suffered immensely by allowing malevolent actors to establish fiefdoms on Pakistani territory. This mistake must never be repeated.

Are 'middle powers' more important today in geopolitics? Which countries are middle powers and why do they have rising clout in the present era? How do we define them and assess their influence on the international stage? Is soft power also a factor in their global standing?

The notion of middle powers has long been around. But it has acquired new relevance in the current geopolitical context whose defining features are increasing multipolarity and the US-China competition. There is no consensus in the growing literature about how to define middle powers. However, there is general agreement that these countries are neither among the world's superpowers nor are they small powers as

they have the ability to influence geopolitics.

This is due to their economic strength, military muscle or other attributes, including demographic characteristics, regional weight, soft power, diplomatic conduct and activism. This gives them significant leverage in global affairs and ability to build multiple relationships.

They include countries from the developed world and Global South, such as Germany, Japan, Canada, Brazil, India, South Africa, Turkey, Saudi Arabia, Singapore and Indonesia. They are a heterogeneous group of countries with varying governance systems as well as political and strategic interests. Pakistan is in some respects a middle power but its economic weakness has significantly limited and diminished its global influence.

The global debate about the role of middle powers has intensified as a consequence of the US-China stand-off. This hasn't mimicked the Cold War in terms of dividing the world into a 'tight' bipolarity. But, as several analysts have noted, it has, instead, offered opportunities and le-

way to countries to increase their leverage by playing off that rivalry and pursuing an 'independent' path.

Moreover, structural changes and dispersal of power in the international system—the very currency of power also having changed—has created an enabling environment for middle power activism and for them to wield influence. As Alec Russell recently wrote in a thoughtful Financial Times op-ed, "The age of the Western set menu is over. And the new menu, while heavily influenced by two lead chefs, is still being written"—a reference to middle powers who now seek a seat at the table.

Last month's BRICS summit in South Africa renewed focus on middle powers and their aspiration to reconfigure the global order and rewrite the rules of the game. Expansion of the group by addition of Saudi Arabia, Iran, Egypt, Argentina, UAE and Ethiopia, with China working for enlargement, underlined how these emerging economies were seeking a bigger role by using the bloc as a countervailing force to US-led Western groupings, such as G7.

They also advocate reform of the international financial system and Bretton Woods institutions. As widely acknowledged, this expansion has increased the weight of BRICS, which represents over a quarter of the global economy and accounts for a major share of the world's oil resources.

Among decisions to emerge from the Johannesburg summit was for finance ministers of member countries to explore how to reduce dependence on the US dollar. As Cyril Ramaphosa, South Africa's president put it, "BRICS has embarked on a new chapter to build a world that is fair" and "inclusive". Whether or not that ambition is realised, the bloc has become an important platform for middle powers to make their global presence felt.

While many middle powers are capitalising on the US-China competition to strengthen their bargaining position they also seek to enhance relations with both global powers. They want to avoid getting in the crosshairs of that confrontation but to also reap advantages from it. This has urged both the US and China

to pay more attention to middle powers to ensure they don't get entrenched in their rival's camp.

Under Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, Saudi Arabia has pursued initiatives that have set a new foreign policy direction and raised its diplomatic game. Riyadh loosened its traditionally close ties with the US to significantly boost its economic ties with China. Its rapprochement with long-time regional rival Iran, brokered by China, greatly increased its leverage with Washington.

This development so alarmed the Biden administration that it urged Washington to hasten plans to pursue a 'grand bargain' in the Middle East. This involves Saudi Arabia normalising relations with Israel in return for a mutual security pact with the US and Riyadh committing to scale back ties with China. In fact, Riyadh is driving a tough bargain by making several demands—a defence pact with Washington, a civilian nuclear deal, missile defence system/other high-tech weapons and substantial Israeli concessions for the Palestinians.

Turkey is another

country adept at the middle power diplomatic game, which has been widely commented on. A member of Nato, Turkey under Recep Tayyip Erdogan, has followed an assertive foreign policy in the region and beyond, maintaining ties with both the US and Russia. Ankara has played off the Ukraine conflict to further project its power and increase its leverage. It sought to mediate between Russia and Ukraine and (with the UN) brokered the Black Sea Grain Deal between them in July 2022. This allowed safe passage for shipment of grain from Ukraine, a big exporter, through the Black Sea, whose maritime routes are controlled by Turkey. Ankara also used its leverage over the issue of Nato's expansion to secure concessions from the US and EU.

Other middle powers including India have derived similar benefits from their activist diplomacy in a multipolar world. Indeed, their growing role in shaping geopolitics has led some analysts to describe this as the 'new normal' at a time when the world is in a state of flux. -- Courtesy Dawn

Dealing with the Taliban

The 1990s saw the emergence of the Taliban and in the 2000s the TTP appeared to be distinct from the Taliban in Afghanistan. In this story we have had to shift our focus from our eastern borders to the western and vice versa; then you see the emergence of some patterns. You put on boots purportedly made to protect your feet but in actuality they may be erasing your footprints. All is fair in love and war, or is it? Then the chief threat starts coming from your own creations, and you end up losing hundreds of thousands of your own people. In over seven decades, nearly all voices of sanity have disappeared—or rather have been made to disappear.

By way of habitat loss, any potential species in society that could stand

up to extremism whether the TTP's or TLP's is either migrated or keeps silent. The insanity of extremism is not new, neither is it spontaneous; it is home-grown and self-nurtured. The Taliban and many other outfits operating now with impunity have been able to adapt and evolve in the past couple of decades. They have been receiving shots of home-made energizers, which promise good performance in time of need. But now the time of need is not controllable and the outfits themselves decide when and where to strike.

From the mujahideen to the Taliban these outfits can claim many achievements, including the disintegration of the Soviet Union and the defeat of the US. The creators of these outfits may also feel elated at the strategy their successive leaders have been following. But at what cost? Look at the plight of the Afghans—and of course Pakistanis themselves. The sky looks overcast for all of them from Kabul and Kalash to Karachi. Just peer down the main thoroughfare leading to the international arena of economic and human develop-

ment, and you don't see us anywhere.

What we see is streets in Afghanistan and Pakistan where stooped men and women beg for a bowl of rice. People in their 70s and 80s are left without care but fed with songs of nationalism and patriotism. What our children get in colleges and schools is not good quality education but an overdose of tales about past victories, which perhaps we never scored. Afghanistan and Pakistan are now tottering across a bridge leading to despotism and destitution. Afghanistan has already reached there and we are on our way; the Taliban and their creators have a lot to do with it.

The dynamic society that we could have had once is now strangled and hollowed out. Afghanistan's path after the Taliban victory two years ago, foreshadows what's coming in Pakistan. The Pyrrhic victory that former prime minister Imran Khan and his facilitators eulogized and welcomed in no uncertain terms has changed the fabric of society in ways both obvious and subtle. The hard-scrabble neighbourhood has sprung up in the past two years

during the Taliban boom, with aging infrastructure and declining economy. The system is strained and the increasing insularity of the Taliban is rubbing off on the youth of Pakistan.

It is a daunting list of failures that has led Pakistan to its sorry state now. No amount of sugar-coating or whitewashing can hide the stark contrast between what is on the ground and what the state wants us to believe. Had there been an incremental pace of reform in defence and foreign policies, Pakistan could also have witnessed corresponding economic and fiscal improvements. The state has scrunched all possibilities of activities and communication in society, other than the ones it approves. Those who have moved out of the country are called for their kin, and the caretaker prime minister says "so what?" with a sombre demeanour.

The youth are indignant and panicked; they feel abandoned and have no education and skills that can underpin their future. But the state is more interested in the housing societies and authorities that dot the outskirts of many of the larger cities in Paki-

stan; while a vast majority of Pakistani people cannot even afford mud constructions of their own, let alone a concrete structure. Just look at the millions that the floods affected not long ago, and ask yourself what gateway the state is providing them. Some of the abandonment of traditional state responsibilities may simply be a function of changing state priorities.

You prioritize backward groups over active citizenry and you get a conservative society devoid of initiative. Our communities have become more communal than inclusive; they suffocate individuality the way the Taliban have been doing in Afghanistan. The Talibanization of society presents a particular challenge that requires a drastic change in state priorities in policies from education and defence to foreign affairs. Just by reviving the memories of past sacrifices and victories—both real and imaginary—we are not heading anywhere. The state has already lost its grip on public imagination and now it is a formidable task to restore it. Cross-border infiltration by militants is in-

creasing by the day and tensions on the borders are a disturbing reality. Just by fighting on the security front, the situation will not change. The state of Pakistan believed that bilateral ties would improve after the Taliban takeover in Afghanistan. Independent observers including this writer had no such hope and kept writing about a possible upsurge in militant activities if the Taliban captured Kabul. Now we see that AfPak relations have become more dysfunctional than they were during the past two decades under the Hamid Karzai and Ashraf-Ghani governments.

The ruling structure in Pakistan has consistently miscalculated its ambitions and the balance is even now out of place. Those who cautioned against nurturing the mujahideen and the Taliban did not get a sympathetic ear from the state as it wanted a favourable dispensation in Afghanistan. Now those expectations have fallen flat and the Taliban takeover in Afghanistan has worsened the situation which some still refuse to acknowledge. -- Courtesy TheNews

Undoing exclusion

Lack of equal opportunities and innovation has suffocated the growth capacity of Pakistan, limiting investment to buying and selling of real estate and dollars by the elite. Inequality of opportunity (IOP) evident across provinces, gender, religion, and the rural-urban spectrum presents itself as a major impediment to growth in Pakistan. This IOP largely stems from poor governance and exclusive institutions that have over time perpetuated the culture of elite capture. It is an endemic situation that mars society by curtailing social mobility, thereby killing all incentive for development.

IOP across gender keeps women at the sidelines, excluding them from work and education prospects. Statistics from the World Bank show that of the 22 million out-of-school children in Pakistan, 12m are girls. Of those going to school, learning outcomes remain poorer for girls compared to boys due to lack of focus. Access to work opportunities also remains disproportionate for women.

The Labour Force Survey (LFS) 2021 shows that female labour force participation stands at a depressing 21.4pc; of this, around 94pc women are employed in the informal sector. Owing to cultural norms, female workforce participation goes down as household unpaid care responsibilities mount. Using the Pakistan Social And Living Standards Measurement Survey 2014-15, we can see that

on average, the number of weekly hours worked by women goes down by approximately 4.5 hours once they become mothers. This translates into widening pay gaps over the years, simultaneously isolating women from leadership positions.

IOP is also blatant across provinces; statistics from ASER 2021 show that learning outcomes remain poorest for Sindh, closely followed by Balochistan. This finding is mirrored in LFS 2021 which shows that 56pc people in Balochistan, and 46pc people in Sindh cannot read a simple sentence in any language with understanding. According to Unicef, 52pc of the poorest children in Sindh (58pc girls) are out of school; meanwhile in Balochistan, 78pc girls are out of school. Within provinces, an urban premium exists that favours those living in urban areas.

The recent cable car incident at Battagram highlights the hypocrisy of living in a country where on the one hand, inadequate infrastructure in poorer districts puts lives of school-going children at great risk; in contrast, you have cities like Lahore where multiple projects have been aimed at reducing commute time to the motorway. This bifurcation has increased the incidence of rural-urban migration, thereby resulting in a concentration of population in major cities. Using LFS 2021, we can see that around 58pc of all migrants have moved to Punjab in search of better health, education, and employment opportunities.

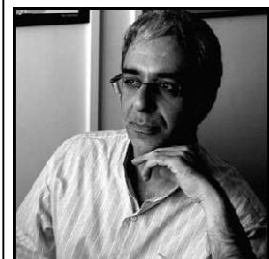
Favouring certain groups based on circumstances that are beyond one's control is an impediment to growth. It disincentivises individuals from investing in entrepreneurship and human capital formation. In a country where around 31pc of uni-

versity graduates are unemployed, lack of opportunities becomes a major cause of brain drain.

The goal should be to 'enable' marginalised groups, rather than to aid them unsustainably. This includes policies such as incentivising work-from-home models by providing tax breaks to businesses that facilitate it. This will make employment opportunities accessible to women and to persons living in indigenous regions. Remote learning opportunities also need to be created so that equitable education levels can be ensured for all. The biggest challenge in this regard will be to overcome the great digital divide which can be achieved through public-private partnership. Overcoming the digital divide is also crucial to allow us to fully reap the benefits of artificial intelligence, such as for education and health endeavours.

Additionally, financial inclusion needs to be ensured by creating incentives for women to open bank accounts and by making credit facilities readily available for marginalised groups. For this, it is vital to formalise the undocumented sector; however, it should not be done under the purview of raising taxes, but rather to support entrepreneurship by facilitating, counselling, and encouraging new business ventures. Instead of directing tax breaks and subsidies towards the same old cronies, subsidies should be given as a reward for innovation to new and emerging businesses. In conjunction, an impartial mechanism for registration of trademarks and copyrights should be ensured. Lastly, social programmes need to be expanded to ensure decent basic standards of living. In short, inclusivity is key to achieving SDGs by 2030. -- Courtesy Dawn

Unfriendly fats

I'm one of those people who scoff at health trends, especially when a new dietary villain is found every other day. That's because I remember when butter was bad for you and the magic bullet solution was touted to be margarine. Then they flipped on that without so much as an 'oops' and then we were told that margarine was the devil's spread and to be avoided. Then it was eggs that humans have eaten for millennia but which were now the devil's droppings and a surefire way to give yourself a heart attack. From full-fat milk to desi ghee, everything that received the alarmist treatment ended up being endorsed as actually good for you, considering the alternatives.

So, when my wife, who devours such news with the same gusto as I devour nihari, sent me an article about the dangers of trans-fatty acids (or trans-fats as they're usually called) my first instinct was to dismiss this as yet more of that 'West-centric wellness eat clean live love pray hippy-dippy' grift that's so virally popular these days.

But, to my infinite regret and a few dozen 'see I told you so's', it turns out that not only are trans-fats as dangerous as they're made out to be, they are also very much a desi problem, and not an upper-class elite desi problem but one that affects the masses more than it does others.

Trans-fats are found in just about everything we like to eat, from deep-fried

street food like samosas to breakfast cereals, bakery goods, cookies, chocolates and processed foods. The main culprit seems to be partially hydrogenated oils like Vanaspati ghee and other refined oils, along with margarine and bakery shortenings, all used in food preparation in Pakistan. In fact, in the WHO's Eastern Mediterranean region, Pakistan accounts for the second highest consumption of trans-fats, amounting to six per cent of our daily energy intake, while the recommended 'safe' level is meant to be less than 1pc.

The consequences are deadly and can be seen all around us. Pakistan has one of the highest incidences of diabetes in the world, with an estimated 27pc of adults suffering from this disease. Then there's heart disease, which is already a top killer in Pakistan, along with obesity and a variety of cancers—all of which are also on the rise across the country, with many going undiagnosed until it's too late.

There's more: take a look at the wall-chalkings in any town or city in Pakistan and you'll see advertisements of treatments for increasing male potency (or 'strength' as the Urdu euphemism puts it) plastered everywhere. It's no surprise then that excessive consumption of saturated fat is also linked to erectile dysfunction and trans-fats in particular are closely linked to male infertility. If that doesn't get your attention, I don't know what will.

The cost isn't just to our health—every incidence of disease means yet more financial burden on those afflicted—this is especially worrisome considering how overburdened our healthcare system is and how stretched household finances are. The medicines required to treat these illnesses are increasing in price and many are already beyond the reach of most people.

Take diabetes alone: if we continue as we are, the number of diabetics in Pakistan will likely reach 62 million by 2045. That would mean a staggering burden on those suffering; note that the International Diabetes Federation estimated that in 2021, the cost of treating diabetes in Pakistan was \$2,640m.

So, what can be done? One approach is of course to spread awareness in the hope of inducing behavioural change, but this can't be the main thrust as most people will continue the way they always have, and consume what they are already consuming, simply out of a lack of access to alternatives.

That leaves legislation and enforcement, and some progress has been made on this front: in 2020 the Pakistan Standards and Quality Control Authority imposed a limit of 5pc on trans-fatty acids in Vanaspati ghee, and then three years later set a limit of 2pc in Vanaspati ghee, margarine, bakery goods, biscuits and rusks etc. However, as always, enforcement is an issue and the industry has also successfully approached the courts to buy time. Moreover, this only covers the organised sector and cannot thus include the vast majority of the sources of trans-fats, such as street food and so on.

I realise that flagging a concern like this at a time of severe and deepening national crisis may seem a bit odd, but this is a literal time bomb that the whole nation is sitting on and, with so many issues, it is a crisis that disproportionately affects those in a lower socioeconomic stratum. The well-to-do not only have access to more information, but also have the fiscal ability to use alternatives. The poor, as usual, are on their own. -- Courtesy Dawn

Initial reports indicate that the accident has resulted in injuries to approximately 40 to 43 individuals in Lower Kohistan.

PDMA relief activities underway in flood-hit areas

LAHORE (APP): Provincial Disaster Management Authority (PDMA) Director General Imran Qureshi said on Monday that relief measures were going on in the flood affected areas of the province.

In a statement, he said more than 595 villages were affected by the flood in Sutlej River, out of which routine life was completely restored in 145 villages.

He informed that more than 1,000 rescue personnel participated in round-the-clock relief operations, adding that people were transferred to safer places by 236 boats in the affected districts.

The DG elaborated that 106 medical camps were set up to provide medical facilities to the affectees. Around 16

ambulances were alerted in the affected areas for emergency response, he added and said that more than 55,000 patients were provided treatment facilities in the medical camps. Apart from medical, 179 relief camps were also established in the affected districts, he maintained.

A total of 300,000 people were evacuated to safe places on an emergency basis while cooked food was provided to more than 150,000 people in the flood-affected districts in Sutlej River. More than 300,000 cattle were moved to safe places and around 90,000 cattle were given medical facilities in the flood-hit areas. The DG said that relief activities would continue until the issue of flood was resolved completely.

Energy Minister says: New electricity tariff to be introduced before Oct 31

KARACHI (INP): Caretaker Federal Minister for Energy, Power and Petroleum Muhammad Ali announced on Monday that the revised electricity tariff would be introduced before October 31. While addressing a press conference alongside Sindh Governor Kamran Tessori, Caretaker Energy Minister Muhammad Ali said the government is taking indiscriminate action against the electricity and gas thieves.

"We are making efforts to control everything. We will try to control the electricity tariff and provide low-cost power to industries from October 31. The inflated bills were received due to electricity theft, whereas, the tariff was hiked due to the increase in USD price."

The energy minister said that it is impossible to amend the previous agreements, however, the government would find a solution without violating the terms. He vowed that low-cost electricity would be provided to the industries in the winter season.

He admitted that no reduction was made to the prices of solar equipment, however, the government would formulate a strategy to promote solarisation.

Governor Tessori said that the energy minister has always fulfilled his promises. "I'd also met the premier to discuss the current situation. We are trying the support reviving the national economy."

"The [caretaker] government has a good team which would manage to

provide relief to the masses within the IMF agreement. The USD price has dropped below Rs300 and good days are not so far."

On Thursday, Caretaker Minister for Information and Broadcasting Murtaza Solangi said consultation with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) was underway for the relief in electricity bills.

Talking to a private television channel, the minister said some final decisions for the purpose were taken during the last meeting of the Cabinet presided over by Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar the other day.

He said the prime minister had directed the relevant stakeholders to hold a consultation with the IMF which was underway.

He expressed these views while talking to journalists, Syed Jahangir Shah was also present on this occasion.

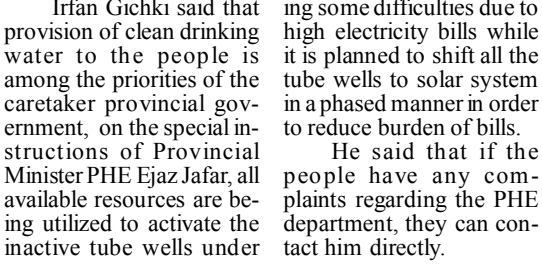

QESCO registered cases in respective police stations against 387 electricity thieves

QUETTA (APP): On the direction of the Government of Pakistan and the Ministry of Energy (Power Division), Quetta Electric Supply Company (QESCO) is engaged in operations against electricity thieves and defaulters in various operation circles in cooperation with the district administration and police throughout the province.

According to QESCO, so far, applications have been sent to the relevant police stations for registering cases against 387 electricity thieves in all areas of the province so that further legal action can be taken against them.

Similarly, operations were also carried out in the provincial capital Quetta city on Kirani Road, Sabzal Road, Hazarganji, Eastern Bypass Road, Nawan Killi Bypass, Kharot Abad, Murriabad, Haji Ghebi Road, Balochi Street and Kasi Road.

At least 37 people were arrested after disconnecting the illegal connections and their electronic devices were also taken into custody, out of which FIR has been registered against 35 thieves.

Apart from this, meters of various commercial plazas and domestic connections were also checked in the operation while one shop in Quetta Commercial Center, one shop in Pashtunabad and two petrol pumps in the city were also sealed for electricity theft.

The connections of the defaulters are also being disconnected.

QUETTA: The Pakistan Customs seized 2600 parcels of sugar from different vehicles during the routine checking near Ziarat cross and Lak pass area on Monday.

According to the spokesman of Customs, the parcels of sugar weighing 1,30,000 kilogram of sugar were seized from two trucks and different other vehicles being smuggled on the Quetta-Zhob route and

Lak pass area of Mastung. The Customs staff impounded the vehicles and started action against the alleged smugglers.

Further investigations are in progress.

It may be mentioned here that Pakistan Customs and other concerned departments have launched massive campaign against smuggling and hoarding of the sugar and Urea fertilizer in the province as elsewhere in the country.

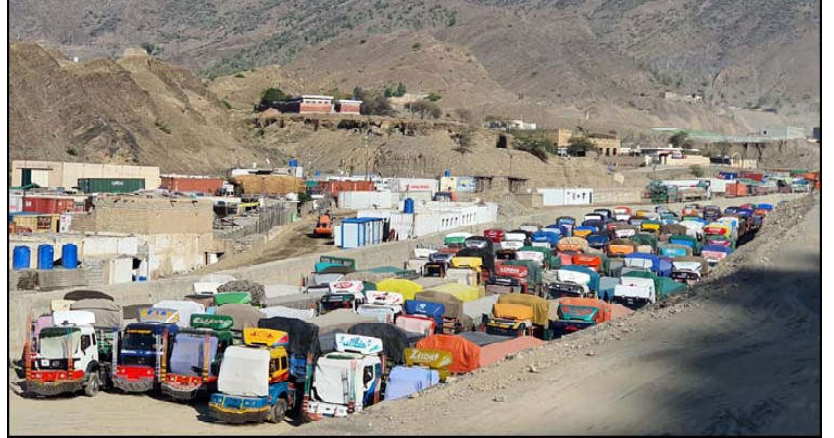

FIA raids illegal Money Exchange Dealer

ISLAMABAD (APP): Federal Investigation Agency's commercial banking circle on Monday, in continuation of the ongoing campaign against the hoarding of foreign currency, the Federal Investigation Agency's commercial banking circle raided illegal money exchange dealers in Rawalpindi and arrested four people.

The team led by Assistant Director Mehak Gul raided paracha traders in Rawalpindi and arrested four accused involved in illegal currency exchange businesses without having a license.

The FIA team registered a case under the Foreign Exchange Regulation Act against Abdul Rahman Parach, Bilal Kaleem, Tauseef Ahmad, and Muhammad Naveed.

The accused failed to satisfy the team on the recovered foreign currency worth 3 million.

Torkham border closure prolongs as authorities fail to sort out clash

KHYBER (INP): Torkham border could not be opened for the general public and business activities on the sixth consecutive day on Sunday as Pakistani and Afghan border security officials could not sort out the solution. Sources said both sides met after an exchange of fire on Wednesday last which led to closure of the border. Khyber Rifles Commandant Asim Kiyani, Lt Col Ahmad Mujtaba of Chitral Scouts, Lt Col Zainul Abideen and Maj Shahabuddin led Pakistan and Hafiz Asmatullah Yaqoobi from Gumrak (Customs), Qari Meraj of the border security forces, and Mulavi Takal represented Afghanistan in the meeting. Both sides discussed the border security situation and the Afghan officials alleged that Pakistani border forces started firing on Sept 6 while the estab-

lishment of new security post and old one was underway. The Afghan side dispelled the charges that they had started the firing.

Following agreements signed by both sides, the Afghanistan was bound to update Pakistan regarding establishment of new structure within a range of one hundred metres of the border. The Pakistan officials said they had no objection to the rebuilding of old post or security building. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA) said that the closure of the Torkham crossing and firing on Afghan security forces by Pakistan is against good neighborly relations. In response to a demand by the Afghan officials regarding reopening of the Torkham border, the Pakistani officials categorically said that a decision would be made after consultations with "higher authorities."

Govt refutes reports about non-provision of financial support to PIA

ISLAMABAD (Online): The reports appearing in a section of media regarding non-provision of financial support to PIA by the government are inaccurate and misleading. Government of Pakistan has supported the national airline in the past and will continue to do so in the future as well.

The Ministry of Finance and Ministry of Aviation are fully assisting PIA in arranging the finances required for its operational requirements. PIA, has only recently negotiated fresh credit facilities from financial institutions under the GOP guarantee limit provided to the airline by the Government of Pakistan. These credit facilities will help PIA to pay any overdue amounts.

Training Courses completed for New Gwadar Int'l Airport

GWADAR (INP): As skilled manpower is a key prerequisite to operate New Gwadar International Airport (NGIA), which is highly likely to be operational in September, China has completed "Training Courses" for government officials.

It is the first of its kind human resource training courses aiming to train public office holders in a bid to help them hone their technical, administrative and managerial expertise.

A Civil Aviation Authority official told Gwadar Pro, the Government of Pakistan did not bear any cost as all expense incurred in the process of conducting of training course has been executed under China's aid. He said that most of the officials from Civil Aviation Authority in the section of operation, manage-

ment, security, engineering & mechanical work have completed the course.

He further said that on July 27, former Prime Minister Shahbaz Sharif officially inaugurated major component of NGIA, a high-priority project of CPEC, in a watershed moment of the tenth anniversary of Belt and Road Initiative (BRI).

He unveiled completion of the airbase infrastructure of the airport, including runway, taxiway and apron.

NGIA marked a milestone cooperation between China and Pakistan under the framework of CPEC, fostering a saga of air transport infrastructure and economic growth that will change the fate of Gwadar, an emerging logistic hub and center piece of regional and international connectivity.
