Police have recovered weapons, mobile phones and two motorcycles from the posses-sion of the dead dacoits, The bodies of the dacoits and injured have been shifted to hospital.

Cop martyred as militants storm police camp in Dera Ismail Khan

DERA ISMAIL KHAN (INP): A policeman was martyred when militants, armed with sophisticated weapons, stormed a police camp near CPEC York Toll Plaza in Dera Ismail Khan early Sunday morning.

Sources said that loud explosions were heard as the militants also hurled hand grenades at the camp, which normally houses 15 to 20 policemen.

Kurram elders sign peace deal as death toll hits 50

DERA ISMAIL KHAN/ HANGU: The tribal elders from central and lower Kurram agreed to a peace deal on Sunday to end the six-day bloody clashes, which took 50 lives, and led to a blackout of electricity and internet and kept traf-fic off the roads in 70% area of the tribal district.

The agreement was signed by the elders of two main sects after their talks in Alizai Oila under the supervision of the Thal Scouts and the Kurram district administration. Both sides agreed to end the sectarian tension between the two warring tribes.

The signatory to the agreement were Aqeel Hussain, Shujaatullah, Anwar Hussain, from the one side and Famanullah,

Nasir Bangash and Syed Zulfiqar Shah from the other side. The agreement was made in the context of attacks on vehicles in

According to the agreement, it is learnt, both sides will make every effort to maintain peace in the area and the local elders will be responsible for peace in their respective areas; and if any outsider tries to sabotage the peace, the tribal elders will hand him over to the civil administration.

Under the other conditions agreed in the peace deal, display of weapons will be strictly prohibited; all bunkers will be emptied and no new bunkers will be built and people from all the sects will be responsible for peace in their respective

Agriculture sector need to be priories for improvement in economy

HYDERABAD (APP): Former federal minister and PPP leader Naveed Qamar has said that the share of agriculture in the economy was decreasing with time, we need to priorities agriculture sector for improving country's economy.

He expressed these views while talking to the media at the "Awaan-e-Zaraat" after a meeting of farmers' leaders here in Hyderabad. Naveed Qamar said that the problems faced by those related to the agriculture sector have been discussed in today's meeting, adding that the share of agriculture in the economy was decreasing with time due to weak policies.

He said that fertilizer policy needs to be prioritized and currently we do not have foreign exchange and have not signed any agreement with any big company in cotton cultivation. We also need to invest in water management, even in the past, the governments did not make a proagriculture policy, and therefore long-term results were not obtained. He said that how long wheat could be imported from outside, the question was how long they will continue to give subsidy on wheat, so there was a need to give such amount of wheat to the farmers that they do not

Federal government's criminal delay become fatal blow to PIA

ISLAMABAD (Online) Federal Government's criminal delay has become a disaster for Pakistan International Airline (PIA). The Ministry of Reli-

gious Affairs also became a participant in the recent PIA crisis. Despite the availability of Rs.550 million, the Ministry of Religious Affairs was unable to pay the PIA. According to PIA sources, if the Ministry of Religious Affairs makes payments, the problems of non-availability of

fuel can be solved. Federal Secretary of Religious Affairs could not be appointed even after 40 days. Aftab Akbar Durrani, Grade 22 Secretary of Religious Affairs, was transferred as Federal Secretary on September 18. Due to the absence of a Federal Secretary, the upcoming Hajj and other matters of the Ministry of Religious Affairs are also pending. Under the official Hajj

scheme, PIA was entrusted with the responsibility of transporting 50% of the pilgrims to the Holy Hijaz. 61461 Pakistani pilgrims traveled through PIA this year while 258 flights

were operated to bring pilgrims back home. 136 flights were operated from Jeddah and 122 from Madinah, the Ministry of Religious Affairs collected 250,000 rupees per person for air travel from

According to the documents, the Ministry of Religious Affairs could not pay the full amount to PIA even after 2 months of completing the Hajj operation.

Gazan apocalypse

With Tel Aviv's troops carrying out land incursions inside Gaza while its jets mercilessly pound the congested Strip, obliterating hospitals, residential buildings and shelters, it is clear that Israel is attempting to foist its 'final solution' on the Palestinian people in the name of going after Hamas. Since Oct 7, when Hamas staged raids inside Israel, over 7,000 Palestinians have been butchered by Israel, nearly half of them children. Tel Aviv has shown no mercy, wiping out entire families, targeting civilian infrastructure, and cutting off food, water, communication links, power and fuel to Gaza — all qualifying as war crimes. Yet Israel's powerful friends, including US President Joe Biden, doubt the Palestinian toll; they believe Israeli accounts that Tel Aviv did not bomb the Al-Ahli Hospital, and that it was a misfired Palestinian rocket that caused the atrocity.

In fact, it is the blind support of the West that has emboldened Israel to unleash genocidal force against Palestinian civilians, as it knows it will not have to pay for its crimes.

There is also disingenuous framing of the conflict by Israel and its friends in Western officialdom and media. The fact is that the Arab-Israeli conflict did not begin with the Hamas raid. For decades, Palestinians have faced death, humiliation and the usurpation of their ancestral land on a daily basis. And, while the targeting of civilians by both sides is condemnable, Oct 7 was the explosive reaction to years of pent-up rage, as Gaza's people had been living under a siege enforced by Israel long before the latest hostilities broke out.

Whatever spin Tel Aviv and its claque of supporters may be putting on the conflict, people of conscience the world over are demanding an end to the massacre of Palestinians.

The majority of states voted for a Jordanian resolution in the UN General Assembly calling for a truce. Moreover, hundreds of thousands have marched in cities as diverse as London, Sana'a, Baghdad and Paris demanding an end to the slaughter. Many, many Jews have clearly told Israel: 'not in our name'.

The Middle East stands at the edge of a precipice. If Israel continues its slaughter in Gaza, particularly through an expanded ground invasion, and if the US-led West flexes its military muscle in its support, the whole region can go up in flames.

Tel Aviv needs to immediately end its bloody campaign, while all actors must stand down and allow the grieving people of Gaza to bury their dead. The siege must be broken so that ample supplies of food, water and medicine can reach

But if Israel continues its merciless assault and the West continues to aid it, the Middle East will explode, and the reverberations will be felt across the world

Elusive peace

A popular view by academics and politicians alike is that Hamas's recent action of Oct 7 not only instigated Israel to exact the biggest ever death toll of Palestinians, even more than the Intifadas, but also undermined the peace process. However, this act did not take place in a vacuum. It was an act of resistance to the systematic state terrorism that Israel has been committing for decades against the Palestinian people.

For seven decades, Israel has used brutal force to suppress the Palestinians' right to self-determination, guaranteed by UN Resolution No 181 of 1947, which had decided to partition Palestine into two states: one Arab, the other Jewish. On Oct 7, 1947, when the General Assembly of the newly formed United Nations was discussing the draft resolution, Pakistan's representative, Zafarullah Khan, built a strong case for the right of Palestinians to form an independent modern state on the lands on

which they had lived for millennia At the centre of the debate was the British government's Balfour Declaration, which, on Nov 2, 1917, had announced its intent to establish "a national home for the Jewish people" in Palestine and asserted that "... nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine...." This commitment was never honoured. To date, the

Palestine was called David and, before him, the patriarch Jacob, later named Israel, lived in these territories. In recent history, the land has remained under the suzerainty of, among others, the Romans, Arabs, the Ottomans and then the British. It was the Zionist movement (those Jews who strove for an independent homeland), which brought Jews from Europe to occupy the Arab lands, pushing 700,000 native Palestinians out of their homes in an event remembered as the Nakba, the catastrophe that accompanied the creation of the state of Israel on May 14, 1948. Ideologically, this land has religious significance for the Jews, Christians and Muslims. The Muslims revere the Al-Aqsa Mosque, while for the Jews this land was home to their traditional ancestors and Hebrew

Geopolitically, it was Britain that initiated the idea of creating a Jewish state in Palestine, pulling in Jews from Europe and displacing the local population. Over the past 70 years, the US and Britain have treated Israel as the pivot of their Middle East

Given the above territorial, ideological, and geopolitical factors, peace continues to elude the land of Palestine. Neither the Arab-Israeli wars of the Palestinians' indig-

There are reports that Saudi Arabia was negotiating a peace settlement with the US, which wou-ld have ensured the right of the Palestinians to live in a state of their own. As is evident, the recent attack by Hamas on Israel on Oct 7 has halted Arab-

Israel normalisation. With protests breaking out in all Muslim lands, Europe, and even the US, it appears Israel's disproportionate reaction to the Hamas attack and the indiscriminate bombing of civilians in Gaza has shaken the conscience of the world yet, this is not enough. The United Nations Security Council met, where Russia, China and others tried to secure a ceasefire and a humanitarian corridor to Gaza. The US veto blocked practically any action by the UN. The unequivocal support that Israel has received from the US has emboldened it to disregard all human rights. Keeping Gaza under siege for weeks with no food, water, fuel or medicine, killing innocent civilians, including children, bombing hospitals and places of worship, and blocking humanitarian aid to besieged Gazans is tantamount to war crimes.
