Two civilians martyred; one child injured by unprovoked firing of Afghan sentry at Friendship gate

Independent Report QUETTA: An Afghan sentry employed at Friend Ship Gate of Chaman Border Crossing along Paki- stan-Afghanistan Border in Balochistan, opened un- provoked and indiscrimi- nate firing at pedestrians moving from Pakistan to Afghanistan.

The incident occurred at the outbound gate located on the zero line. Resultantly, two innocent Pakistani citizens including a 12 years old child embraced shahadat, while an-

other child was injured. Own troops exercised extreme restraint and avoided any exchange of fire in presence of innocent passengers to avoid collateral damage.

Dead bodies of the deceased have been shifted to DHQ Hospital Chaman and the injured child, who was immediately evacuated by security forces, is under treatment.

Afghan authorities have been approached to inquire the reason of such irresponsible and reckless

act, apprehend and hand over the culprit to Pakistani authorities. IAG is also expected to exercise control over its troops and impart discipline to act responsibly in order to avoid recurrence of such incidents in future.

Pakistan remains committed to contribute towards peace, prosperity and development through positive and constructive bilateral relations, however such unpleasant occurrences have the potential to harm the sincere intent and purpose.

Monitoring Desk LAHORE: PTI leader Usman Dar, who had allegedly gone missing according to his party, resurfaced on Wednesday and opined that the May 9 attacks were aimed at "removing the army chief".

"Of course, the incident was orchestrated to thwart the appointment [of the army chief]. I believe that Imran also had information from within the institution suggesting that the long march could potentially influence either the appointment or the removal of Gen Asim Munir," he said.

Anti-State Youtuber Adil Raja's call with RAW-operative leaked

Independent Report ISLAMABAD: As per details, Youtuber Adil Raja can be heard in the alleged audio leak talking to RAW operative Rohit Sharma, asking him to malign Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI).

It was revealed that Adil Raja hired people connected with the Indian intelligence agency Raw for his legal and other matters



The YouTuber also asked Rohit Sharma for contact numbers of Raw agents Lord Remi Rangers in the UK for 2.5 Lac pounds to dismiss case against him. The audio call proves the anti-state Youtuber's contact with the Raw operatives.

Rohit is also instructing him to accuse that person who launched FIR against Raja, for propagating against India and spreading terrorism in India. If he'll be able to launch fir against him raw will make sure that person remains behind the bars.

Raja was also booked in several cases in Pakistan related to inciting Pakistanis to rebel against the state. In his anti-state acts PTI followers intentionally and unintentionally was helping him.

GoB orders to lodge cases against those not returning official vehicles

Independent Report QUETTA: The interim government of Balochistan has decided to take action and register cases against those not returning 50 official vehicles of different departments in the province.

This was informed by the caretaker Provincial Minister for Information, Jan Achakzai in an official

statement issued here on Tuesday. According to Jan Achakzai, the government has finally decided to register FIRs against those who have not returned the official vehicles to the government yet.

He told that the FIRs would be registered within a week against those who not yet returned the official vehicles.

The caretaker Minister Information asserted that those running these official vehicles would be arrested as well.

He said that the FIRs would be registered once against if they failed to return the vehicles on failure of the given deadline even.

He said that those not returning the official vehicles would be taken to task anyway.

Will take stern action against elements involved in terrorist activities: Achakzai

QUETTA (INP): Balochistan Caretaker Information Minister Jan Achakzai has said that stern action will be taken against the elements involved in terrorist activities.

Commerce Minister terms GCC-Pakistan FTA as breakthrough for trade

ISLAMABAD, (APP): Federal Minister for Commerce, Dr. Gohar Ejaz here on Wednesday termed the recently signed Free Trade Agreement (FTA) with Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) as breakthrough for trade, making Pakistan the first country to secure such arrangement and providing it access to substantial market.

"This is very positive news for Pakistan exports towards gulf countries," the minister said while addressing a press conference. He was flanked by Federal Caretaker Minister of Information and Broadcasting, Murtaza Solangi, Caretaker Minister for Power and Petroleum Muhammad Ali and Caretaker Federal Minister for Interior Sarfraz Ahmad Bugti.

He said, GCC, the six-country bloc comprising

Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, was established in 2009 and it was after 14 long years that any country was having FTA with the council. The FTA was signed at 5th round of GCC meeting held last week.

The minister said that GCC was market of around \$1 trillion exports and \$550 billion imports, however Pakistan's share in imports from was it was \$19 billion dollar average as it was importing energy and petro-chemical products while the exports' share was just \$2.5 billion dollar.

The minister lauded Saudi Arabia for playing important role in materializing the agreement with six gulf countries, adding that all members of all countries

Some 200 illegal Afghan refugees arrested under Foreign Act, says Commissioner Quetta

QUETTA: The Commissioner Quetta Division, Muhammad Hamza Shafaqat has stated that the areas where Afghan refugees are living illegally have been identified.

He informed that some 200 Afghan refugees have also been arrested under the Foreign Act and cases registered against them duly.

This was informed by the Commissioner Quetta while addressing a hurriedly called press conference at his office here on Wednesday.

He said that due action has been started against the refugees living illegally in Quetta on directives of the

government.

He also said that it has been decided to shift the terminals of passenger coaches. The initiative would help reduce the traffic pressure in the city, he added.

Moreover, 11 crush plants have been closed in Quetta.

Similarly, 310 illegal petrol pumps have also been closed in the city, Commissioner maintained.

While on the other hand, action is also continued against the hoarding of sugar and urea fertilizer.

In this regard, 2900 tons of sugar and 2700 tons of urea have been recovered and impounded, he added.

OIC strongly condemns storming of Al-Aqsa Mosque, closure of Al-Ibrahimi Mosque

ISLAMABAD (APP): The General Secretariat of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) Wednesday strongly condemned the storming of the Blessed Al-Aqsa Mosque by the Israeli occupation forces and the blatant assault on worshippers as well as the arrest of a number of them.

The Muslim world body, in a statement, also condemned the closure of Al-Ibrahimi Mosque in the city of Al-Khalil (Hebron).

"The OIC General Secretariat considers this an extension of the repeated violations of Israel, the occupying power, of the sanctity of the holy places and freedom of worship, and a

blatant violation of the Geneva Conventions and international law," the statement added.

It said that the OIC held the Israeli occupation government fully responsible for the consequences of the continuation of these crimes and systematic attacks that fuel violence, tension, and instability in the region.

The OIC called upon the international community to assume its responsibilities to put an end to these serious violations, stressing the necessity of preserving the historical and legal status of the Islamic and Christian holy sites in the occupied city of Al-Quds.

Quetta (APP): Chairperson Executive Council (CEC), Principal Bolan Medical College (BMC) Bolan Professor Dr. Raz Muhammad Kakar along with MS Civil Hospital Quetta Dr. Ishaq Panizi inaugurated Accident and Emergency Department in Civil Hospital Quetta.

Dr. Ishaq Panizi of MS Civil Hospital Quetta said that in the first phase post graduate students of medicine and surgery department, medical officers and house officers started working in accident and emergency department.

Professor Dr. Raz Muhammad Kakar and MS Civil Hospital Quetta Dr. Ishaq Panizi were briefed by Director Accident and Emergency Department Dr. Hafeezur Rahman about the department.

Principal Bolan Medical College Professor Dr. Raz Muhammad Kakar met the PGs who performed surgery and medicine in Accident and Emergency Department.

Dr. Raz Muhammad Kakar said that soon post

graduate students of other departments, medical officers would start working in Emergency Services, Accident and Emergency Department.

In starting the Accident and Emergency Department, Director Accident and Emergency Department Dr. Hafeezur Rahman, Head of Departments Medicine, Surgery, Young Doctors Association and paramedical staff played an important role, he said.

He said that the doctors working in the Accident and Emergency Department would perform their duties according to the duty roster saying that Post graduate students working in Accident and Emergency Department, Medical Officers could service their duties under rotation.

In the accident and emergency department, patients will get first aid, burn dressing, laboratory tests, X-ray and ECG facilities, he said that with the start of emergency services in Civil Hospital Quetta, immediate health facilities would be available to the patients.

"I have always praised the army, our martyrs and I always appreciated them. On May 6 I had left to visit my family. I believe that the May 9 incident did not occur in a day," Dar responded.

"One mindset included Azam Swati, Hamid Azhar, Murad Saeed and Farrukh Habib. Although my friends, they were supporting the politics of confrontation," he alleged.

"Then there was a mindset which had people like Asad Umar, Omar Ayub, Ali Muhammad Ali, Shafiq Mehmood and I, who were talking about reconciliation with the army."

Dar clarified that while May 9 might appear to be a specific date, the circumstances leading to the riots had been brewing and could have erupted at any time.

During PTI meetings, discussions revolved around the potential targeting of state institutions, with Dar asserting that Imran endorsed this stance.

He stated, "There were talks about the possibility of attacking state institutions in the event of Imran's arrest, and we foresaw Imran's detention, which ultimately occurred on May 9."

When questioned about his willingness to testify against Imran in court, he responded, "I am prepared to appear in court and evaluate the situation."

He observed that the lives of PTI workers underwent significant changes following the May 9 incident.

The minister said that the caretaker government was committed to boost exports upto \$32 billion this year. He said, the export oriented would provide energy on priority basis in winter to help boost exports.

He also mentioned bumper cotton crop as 5 million bales were harvested till September and the figures would grow further and also highlighted boosting of rice exports by \$1 billion as good developments for economy.

Meanwhile speaking on the occasion Caretaker Minister for Power and Petroleum Muhammad Ali said an amount of Rs 16 billion has been collected from electricity defaulters so far during ongoing crackdown against the power pilferers and defaulters.

He said the government has launched crackdown against the power pilferers that would continue adding the government has also decided to change Board of Directors (BoDs) of all power distribution companies (DISCOs).

It was also decided to hand over the management of DISCOs to private sector on long term concession, he added.

The minister said despite various constraints, all out efforts were being made to ensure availability of gas to domestic, industrial and fertilizer sectors and carrying out minimum gas load management in the coming winter season.

"We have only two LNG terminals and limited natural gas but today we have finalized two LNG cargoes for December," he said. He said the two LNG cargoes would help address gas supply issue in December for the industry. Gas supply was also being improved for the fertilizer sector, he added.

He said, money came back to interbank market and the situation has changed now adding the currency would further stabilize.

Terror attack at Kulachi police station foiled

DERA ISMAIL KHAN (APP): The Dera police foiled a terror attack at the Kulachi police station on Wednesday, forcing terrorists to flee.

According to police officials, 8 to 10 armed assailants attacked the Kulachi police station around 11:00 a.m. The terrorists fired two rocket launchers and then opened indiscriminate fire at the police station. However, the police were on high alert and retaliated forcefully.

Immediately after the attack, a heavy contingent of police and security forces reached the site and cordoned off the area. No police loss was reported in the attack. The police also started a search and strike operation in the area to arrest the terrorists.

ECP, political parties' consultative meeting on next Wed

ISLAMABAD (APP): The consultative meeting between the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) and several political parties, initially scheduled for today, (Wednesday, October 4), has already been rescheduled to the upcoming Wednesday due to the unavailability of specific members, said an ECP spokesperson.

Contradicting a news report currently being aired on various TV channels, the ECP spokesperson in a statement clarified that the meeting is set for the next Wednesday, October 11th, at 2 PM, at the same location, the Election Commission Secretariat, Islamabad.

ECP issues Code of Conduct for international observers, media

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Election Commission of Pakistan has issued a concise 30-point Code of Conduct for international observers and media during elections, emphasizing impartiality, respect for local laws and culture, responsible reporting, and security and violations may lead to accreditation withdrawal by the Commission.

The code of conduct instructs international observers to rigorously adhere to local laws, and show respect for Pakistan's sovereignty and cultural norms.

It forbids actions that might sway voters, acceptance of gifts from political entities, and making personal remarks about the election. Additionally, it provides guidelines for responsible reporting and underscores the significance of security measures.

Any individual or member of a local group or international election observation mission, who is observing and reporting on the electoral process must thoroughly read and comprehend this Code of Conduct. They are also required to sign a pledge that is attached to this Code.

International observers and media personnel visiting Pakistan are required to follow the visa application procedures outlined by the government and must not exceed the authorized visa duration. Their conduct should respect Pakistan's sovereignty and the fundamental rights and freedoms of its people.

International observers

and media representatives in Pakistan must comply with the nation's constitution and laws, as well as respect the authority of the Election Commission and its officials. They are obligated to maintain impartial, objective, and highly accurate observations and reporting.

Observers must heed instructions from the Election Commission and state authorities, maintaining a respectful demeanor toward them. Additionally, they should adhere to government and security agency advisories aimed at ensuring their safety during their stay in Pakistan.

Observers must demonstrate professionalism and cultural respect while displaying their official identification badges or accreditation cards issued by the Election Commission of Pakistan, complying with requests from electoral officials and relevant authorities.

Observers must maintain complete political impartiality throughout the election process, refraining from any bias or preference toward political parties or candidates.

They should adhere to photography rules and restrictions, while retaining the right to ask questions and seek clarification without obstructing any pre-election, election, or post-election procedures. Observers are also expected to collaborate harmoniously with fellow observers, media personnel, and polling staff.

Observers must consult with the Election Commission of Pakistan to select areas for election observation while prioritizing their security. Nevertheless, they should aim for balanced observation and reporting in their area choices. If needed, observers may employ Pakistani interpreters, but they must furnish all necessary information about these interpreters during the accreditation card application process.

Interpreters hired by observers should remain impartial and unprejudiced. They have the freedom to observe and report all aspects of election management, including the actual polling day, without interfering in the proceedings at polling stations.

Furthermore, observers must avoid personal and professional relationships that might create conflicts of interest with their roles as observers and reporters.

Observers must refrain from accepting gifts or favors from any individuals, organizations, or political parties involved in the electoral process. They are prohibited from wearing, carrying, or displaying partisan symbols or colors. Furthermore, observers should avoid making personal comments about their observations or conclusions to the media and should not engage in activities that could give the impression of favoring or opposing any political party or candidate.

114 INGOs officially registered with Ministry of Interior, Senate body told

ISLAMABAD (Online): Government has introduced "INGO Policy, 2015" to oversee operations of INGOs in Pakistan, overall 114 INGOs officially registered with the Ministry of Interior. This was told by ministry of interior to the Senate Standing Committee on Economic Affairs. The meeting of the committee was convened on Wednesday at Parliament House under the chairmanship of Senator Faisal Saleem Rehman.

The committee meeting commenced with a comprehensive briefing from the Ministry of Interior, Economic Affairs Division and

Ministry of Foreign Affairs on foreign-funded International Non-Governmental Organizations (INGOs) operating in Pakistan, encompassing thematic areas and geographical coverage.

Ministry officials briefed that "INGO Policy, 2015" was introduced to oversee the operations of International Non-Governmental Organizations (INGOs) in Pakistan. According to this policy, all international NGOs operating in Pakistan are required to undergo registration with the Ministry of Interior, designated as the regulatory authority for INGOs.

This registration pro-

cess involves consultation with various key stakeholders, including the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA), the Economic Affairs Division (EAD), the Security & Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP), the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR), the Inter Services Intelligence (ISI), and the Intelligence Bureau (IB). Currently, there are a total of 114 INGOs officially registered with the Ministry of Interior. MOFA officials highlighted that, following extensive consultations with relevant stakeholders, the NGO policy was approved by the Federal Cabinet in November 2022.

CDA planning to initiate residential scheme for Overseas Pakistanis

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Capital Development Authority (CDA) is planning to launch a new state-of-the-art residential scheme only for overseas Pakistanis at Mauza Kuri in the federal capital.

The new scheme, sprawled across 14,000 kanal of land along Kuri Road, adjacent to Park Road, will be reserved exclusively for overseas Pakistanis," an official in the CDA told APP.

The official said that

the plots within the scheme would be marketed and sold to overseas Pakistanis in US dollars, contributing to the country's foreign exchange reserves.

FIA says: Rs 3.86 bln recovered during raids this year

ISLAMABAD (APP): A total of more than Rs 3.86 billion worth of domestic and foreign currency was recovered during the raids this year including 650334 US dollars in currency exported, and other foreign currency worth more than 309 million rupees included.

This was informed to the Director General Federal Investigation Agency in a briefing here on Wednesday and added that more than 3 billion and 35 million Pakistani rupees are included in the exported currency.

It was informed in the meeting that more than 28 plazas/markets/shops were also sealed during nationwide raids.

The meeting was chaired by Director General FIA Mohsin Hasan Butt, Additional Director Generals, Zonal Directors and other senior officers also participated in the meeting, said a press release here.

Briefing, Director General Mohsin Hasan

Butt on the ongoing crackdown regarding Hundi reference and currency smuggling nationwide crackdown continues against elements involved in illegal currency exchange.

During this year, 390 raids were conducted against elements involved in the illegal exchange of money and currency and this year, 382 cases were registered and 557 accused were arrested whereas an investigation of 51 inquiries was also completed.

During this year, 250 accused were arrested by KP zone, 68 by Lahore zone, 24 by Gujranwala zone, 48 by Faisalabad zone, 43 by Multan zone.

Islamabad zone arrested 20, Karachi zone 64, Hyderabad zone 23 and Balochistan zone arrested 17 accused, all the arrested accused were involved in currency exchange without license. The assistance of law enforcement agencies were also obtained for the arrest of the accused.

Anti-smuggling drive

That caretaker Interior Minister Sarfraz Bugti openly admitted on Monday that security personnel are involved in large-scale smuggling of currency, oil, and other commodities across Pakistan's borders with Iran and Afghanistan should be appreciated.

Mr Bugti not only acknowledged that security officials played a role in the illegal cross-border movement of currency and commodities but also indicated that the army chief had warned his men that those involved in the practice would face court-martial and jail. The clampdown on smugglers and hoarders was launched last month after the army chief's back-to-back meetings with the business community in Lahore and Karachi where he pledged to crack down on illegal activities "to rid Pakistan of the substantial losses it continues to suffer due to pilferage".

The next several weeks will be a test of the civil and military authorities' resolve to expose and punish the elements involved in this illicit cross-border trade as the government intensifies a nationwide crackdown to curb the smuggling out of dollars and commodities such as wheat and sugar, and the influx of cheap petroleum and other items from Iran and Afghanistan. However, our porous borders along Balochistan and KP are not the only routes being used by smugglers to conduct their illegal trade. Indeed, these routes are used to 'import' and 'export' commodities such as sugar, oil, tyres, urea and even vehicles in big numbers.

But high-value products such as branded perfumes, expensive watches and designer purses are mostly being brought from Dubai and other Gulf nations into the country by khepiyaas through major airports and seaports in connivance with Customs officials and personnel of other agencies. These items are mostly smuggled in without the payment of taxes or are hugely under-invoiced.

Similarly, it is easier to take dollars out of the country via an airport than any other way. No wonder Peshawar's proverbial Bara bazaar, which used to be the only source of smuggled foreign goods for affluent middle-class families until the late 1980s, has spread across the length and breadth of the country.

The shelves of most shops are stacked with such products because no one asks the powerful trader community to provide documentary proof that taxes were paid on the 'import' of such items.

No anti-smuggling drive can deliver complete success without making it difficult for the traders to display and sell smuggled and under-invoiced goods, in addition to dismantling the nexus between traders and civil and security officials posted along the borders and ports.

Smuggling is eating into the economy, weakening it and imposing enormous costs on the manufacturing industry, jobs and public well-being. We can only hope that the current mobilisation against illegal cross-border trade will not be called off midway as has been the case in the past.

The bloodbath in Mastung last week was yet another grim reminder of the relentless rise of militant violence that is threatening national security.

The suicide attack on a Rabiul Awwal congregation in the Balochistan town left almost 60 people dead. At least five people were killed in a targeted attack in KP on the same day, swelling the number of fatalities.

It was one of the bloodiest days of the current year that has already recorded the highest number of casualties among security forces in the past eight years. Terrorist attacks have become almost a daily affair. The return of terrorism presents a most serious challenge to a nation mired in multiple crises.

The spate of killings across the country demonstrates the expanding capacity of militant groups to carry out increasingly audacious operations.

While the administration silently watches the situation drift toward anarchy, armed marauders carry out their deadly attacks with impunity. The pattern and scale of violence indicate that the militants are better armed than before and well organised.

A report recently released by the Islamabad-based Centre for Research and Security Studies (CRSS) reveals a staggering 57 per cent escalation in militant violence nationwide over the last quarter.

It's an extremely alarming situation, raising questions regarding our counterterrorism strategy that appears to be faltering as militants of all stripes continue to operate. The latest wave of violence highlights the inability of the security agencies to deal with the rising militant threat.

Almost 1,100 people, including 386 security personnel, lost their lives to militant violence in the first nine months of the year,

according to the CRSS report. The report notes that the number of fatalities from terrorist attacks this year has increased, with KP and Balochistan having suffered 92pc of all fatalities since the beginning of the year.

While a reinvigorated Tehreek-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) has reportedly been involved in most of the terrorist attacks, more worrisome is the growing presence and activities of the Islamic State-Khorasan group. Several recent militant raids have been traced to the group. Although no one has claimed responsibility, the suicide attack in Mastung last Friday bears all the hallmarks of an IS-K attack.

It is not for the first time that Mastung, which houses madrassahs known for their association with outlawed extremist sectarian outfits, as well as transnational militant groups, has been drenched in blood. There has been a marked escalation in sectarian violence, with the town becoming the hub of religious radicalism.

One of the most radical madrassahs was established by the family of

Khalid Shaikh Mohammed, an Al Qaeda leader and mastermind of the 9/11 terrorist attacks. The connection was revealed after a suicide attack on a Muharram procession in Quetta in 2004 was traced to the family.

The investigations showed that the mastermind of the attack were Mosaib al Baluchi and Dawood Badani, close relatives of Khalid Shaikh Mohammed, who were later arrested and taken to Guantanamo by American forces. It was the first time that an Ashura procession was attacked by militants here, lending a new and dangerous dimension to sectarian terror in the province.

Over the years, Mastung, located some 50 kilometres from Quetta, has become the main centre of extremist sectarian groups. The latest attack also marked an escalation in attacks on rival Sunni groups. In 2017, a suicide bomber struck the convoy of a JUI-F leader Abdul Ghafoor Haideri, who was then deputy chairman Senate, killing several people.

Many madrassahs in the region have become the focus of the outlawed Lashkar-i-Jhangvi which

has now reportedly taken up the banner of IS-K. The latest attack on the Rabiul Awwal procession indicates the growing influence of the hard-line Salafi version of Islam, that has its origins in the Middle East.

There has also been a marked rise in IS-K activities in KP. In the past three months, the terror group has claimed several attacks in the province. It had claimed responsibility for a suicide bombing that killed at least 54 people at a political rally held by the JUI-F in July this year in Bajaur district that borders Afghanistan. The former tribal region has long been a sanctuary for Islamist extremists, including TTP and IS-K.

The recent clashes in Bajaur are believed to be a spillover of the conflict between IS-K and the Afghan Taliban in Afghanistan. A large number of local JUI members, who fought alongside the Afghan Taliban, have returned home after the end of the war. The conflict has now spread to other areas in KP and Balochistan, giving a new twist to the ongoing militant violence.

The emerging nexus

between some TTP factions and IS-K is most alarming. There have been a few reports of a tactical alliance between some Baloch separatist groups and IS-K, too. If correct, the coalition of various militant groups will render the situation more complex and challenging for the security agencies.

As political instability and uncertainty grow in the country, and as the economy declines, the terrorists are poised to benefit from a situation that is on the cusp of anarchy. The most recent wave of terrorism has once again exposed the lack of a cohesive policy as security forces struggle against the audacious militant attacks that have taken the lives of scores of security personnel and ordinary people in the last few months.

The need of the hour is an effective and sustainable counterterrorism strategy that can eliminate the terrorist elements who are threatening the country's security. Pakistan must immediately review its national security policy to correct the lapses that have led us to this pass. -- Courtesy Dawn

IFIs at a crossroads

In October, as the world's attention turns toward Morocco for the Annual Meetings of the World Bank Group and the International Monetary Fund (IMF), it is an historic moment to contemplate the legacy of these two leading global lending institutions. Over the decades, they have played a significant role in shaping the economic destiny of underdeveloped and developing nations. This review embarks on a journey to evaluate their achievements, successes, failures, and most importantly, their contributions to Pakistan and South Asia. We delve into areas such as infrastructure development, poverty alleviation, disaster management, and ponder on persistent questions about wealth distribution and the fundamental mission of

these institutions: to uplift struggling economies and their institutions.

One of the most palpable contributions of the World Bank in Pakistan and South Asia has been in the realm of infrastructure development whilst the macro-economic stability and relief was ensured by the Fund.

Poverty alleviation is at the heart of the mission of the two institutions. In regions like South Asia, where a substantial portion of the population lives below the poverty line, the impact of the World Bank's initiatives cannot be understated.

Microfinance projects, vocational training programmes and social safety nets have provided a lifeline for countless families, pulling them out of the abyss of poverty. Yet, the task is far from complete, and the roots of poverty run deep. Comprehensive strategies are needed to address the multifaceted nature of poverty in the region.

In a world where natural disasters wreak havoc, the IMF and the World Bank have played a pivotal role in disaster management. South Asia, with its vulner-

ability to earthquakes, floods, and cyclones, has been a beneficiary of the institution's support in disaster preparedness, early warning systems, and post-disaster recovery efforts, and extended special financial financing facilities.

These initiatives have saved lives and helped communities rebuild.

However, one pressing concern casts a shadow over these achievements — wealth distribution. Critics argue that, in some instances, the benefits of development projects have disproportionately favoured the privileged few or multinational corporations, rather than reaching the intended beneficiaries — the downtrodden communities.

A total of \$42 trillion in new wealth has been created since 2020, with \$26 trillion, or 63 per cent, of that being amassed by the top 1.0 per cent of the ultra-rich globally, according to an Oxfam report. The remaining 99 per cent of the global population collected just \$16 trillion of new wealth. It suggests that the pace at which wealth is being created has sped up, and so has its concentration; as the world's richest 1.0 per

cent amassed around half of all new wealth over the past 10 years. This is a very alarming development.

South Asia is no different than the rest of the world. For it, the ratio of the average income of the poorest 10 per cent of the population to the richest 10 per cent is 6.5 per cent. In other words, the average income for the richest is more than 16 times the average for the poorest. The ratio is 7.5 per cent for Bangladesh, 8.6 per cent for India and 11.1 per cent for Sri Lanka. The ratio of the average incomes of the poorest 20 per cent of the population to the richest 20 per cent is 4.8 per cent for Pakistan and Bangladesh, 5.5 per cent for India and 6.8 per cent for Sri Lanka. The Gini coefficient — a measure frequently used to indicate the extent of inequality — is the worst for Pakistan: 29.6 as against 32.4 for Bangladesh, 35.7 for India and 38 for the world as a whole.

This raises questions about the effectiveness of monitoring mechanisms and the necessity for stricter regulations to ensure that the fruits of development are equitably shared amongst all segments of the

society. This also emanates from the fact that the belief in the policies of the two institutions hovering around trickle-down effects on the economy as gospel perhaps needs a rethink. There certainly is a question mark on this approach and case studies like India where a bottom-up approach seems to have been working better than the traditional approach for growth must be considered in future policymaking.

As we convene in Morocco to celebrate the accomplishments of the IMF and the World Bank and consider their future, it is clear that the path forward is fraught with challenges. The wealth gap remains a critical issue, and these institutions must redouble their efforts to ensure that development benefits reach the marginalized communities that need them the most. Stronger regulations, transparent governance, and rigorous monitoring mechanisms are essential to this endeavour. Better engagement with new emerging players, like China, post the Ukraine war is the need of the hour for the Bretton Woods Institutions. At least 65 countries owe

China more than 10 per cent of their external debt. This is the extent of Chinese integration into the global financial system which can't move on without a collaborative and open-minded approach and dialogue for which the upcoming congregation in Morocco is an ideal opportunity.

The annual meetings in Morocco provide an invaluable opportunity for reflection and introspection. The challenges of poverty, inequality, environmental sustainability, and equitable wealth distribution demand a renewed commitment to the core mission of these institutions — to foster growth that is inclusive, sustainable and transformative — at the back of digitization and formalizing economies.

As the world watches Morocco, we must collectively aspire to a future where economic growth is not an end in itself but a means to uplift humanity, leaving no one behind, with new thinking, new perspective, new templates for fixing the complex landscape of emerging economies including those in South Asia. -- Courtesy TheNews

De-risking climate

The IPCC A6 Synthesis Report, which draws together the scientific body's work over the past eight years, stresses that even under a very low greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions scenario, global warming is likely to exceed 1.5 degrees Celsius this century, increasing the risk of food insecurity, extreme weather and conflict. At current warming levels, communities are already experiencing landslides, flash floods, storm surges, wildfires, droughts and the drying up of springs among other disruptions caused by climate change.

The conversations and meetings this year leading up to COP28 so far have not injected new hope for either a fair or safe world. From the Bonn talks in May to the UNGA Climate Summit in September, the emphasis has remained on the need to do more, without any concrete action to achieve the elusive target of decarbonising the economy through deep, rapid and immediate cuts in emissions.

Environmental ministers from G20 nations, representing countries that account for 80pc of GHG emissions failed to agree on ways to curb emissions and address other crucial matters at the Delhi Summit. The lack of consensus after a year filled with climate-induced disasters and repeated calls for action sends a strong signal of what to expect from the critical COP negotiations.

The second meeting of the High-level Political Forum under the auspices of

the UNGA of the recently concluded SDG Summit marks the midpoint of the goals set for 2030. The mismatch between actions and transformative shifts needed to avert the climate crisis and absence of some of the big emitters does not lend hope of any momentum in the accelerator agenda. The SDG theme of peace and security for the year has failed to reignite optimism, deepening misgivings about multilateral processes and fair outcomes.

The recently published first global stocktake synthesis report, which is a culmination of two years of data collection from scientists, technocrats and business people, recognises the role of the Paris Agreement in driving near-universal climate actions, but falls short of projecting the grim reality. It urges the need for prioritising the phasing out of fossil fuels and working with all levels of government to scale up tried and tested solutions while investing in new, innovative technologies.

All eyes will now be on Dubai to see how the presidency leverages the stocktake to course correct and transition to a safer trajectory with a rapid response plan. As always, finance will dominate the negotiations, and the issues of drastic cuts in emission, doubling adaptation finance and operationalising the loss and damage fund alongside the need for reform in the global financial architecture will be key determinants in setting the future agenda.

So far, all the climate reports have one thing in common. All serve as a wake-up call for moving past statements, advisories and prose that use climate as a glossary to list the threats that are already being experienced by people, but fail to provide timely solutions.

The pivot shift from

Paris to Dubai comes at a time when much has changed since the 2015 Paris Agreement. The need for keeping temperatures below 1.5°C, capping peak emissions by 2025, reducing GHGs by 2030 to stay within the safe threshold of planetary boundaries, higher costs for mitigation and adaptation, the war in Ukraine and the changing geopolitical landscape are all new elements that have added greater urgency to finding solutions.

While the cost of making transformative changes may be high, the price of inaction will come with a greater cost to human life, plunging millions into poverty and deepening inequality.

The stocktake 2023 is not merely about assessing where countries stand on Nat-io-nally Determined Contributions, it is also about using current trends to anticipate threats to human security and making a call on how we see humanity. If all lives matter, then negotiators need to redefine the battle lines and engage with the intent of de-risking climate security. This will require all countries to engage on climate at the international and regional level, putting other differences and disputes aside and working together with a single-point agenda that pivots around human security. It is time to move beyond power, politics, policy and profit to look at the human angle of the unfolding tragedy and remember the moral compact that served as the backbone of the Paris Agreement to bring parties together.

With the clock ticking, it is time to cut to the chase and decide if all lives are equal or other considerations play a role in the human security calculus. The bar on expectation is diminishing fast, pushing some nations closer to the edge. It is time for an honest reset. -- Courtesy Dawn

Open-ended conflict

Early last month, Nato Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg offered an extraordinary revelation at a meeting with European parliamentary committees. "The background," he said, "was that President Putin declared in the autumn of 2021, and actually sent a draft treaty that they wanted Nato to sign, to promise no more Nato enlargement."

"That was what he sent us. And [it] was a precondition for not [invading] Ukraine. Of course, we didn't sign that."

Until then, any Western politician who hinted at any kind of provocation behind Russia's military overreach risked being labelled an apologist for Vladimir Putin. The unreasonably hawkish Stoltenberg obviously does not fall in that category, and he went on to remind his audience about how Moscow's venture had backfired, with Nato spreading its wings to Finland and, potentially, Sweden, apart from fast-tracking eventual Ukrainian membership.

Western diplomats, including the more enlightened minds at the US State Department, have been aware since at least the 1990s that Nato's eastward expansion was a red line for Moscow. Mikhail Gorbachev was verbally promised it wouldn't occur, and regretted not insisting on a written assurance. Even Boris Yeltsin, effectively a US puppet, bristled at Nato's ambitions. By the time Putin replaced him in 1999-2000, key Eastern

European states had already switched their satellite status from ex-Soviet to American via Nato membership, and the Baltic republics followed.

Putin seemed willing to accept this as a fait accompli, but Nato's membership offers to Georgia and Ukraine seemed like overkill. From Moscow's vantage point this wasn't all that different to how Washington would feel — or react — if any future Sino-Russian military alliance sought to woo Canada or Mexico.

In his discourse, Stoltenberg proudly framed Nato's rejection of Putin's overture as a suitable riposte to a belligerent dictator. The idea of a more diplomatic response that might have averted a bloody war appears not to have troubled his conscience.

None of this detracts from the fact that Russia was the aggressor in February 2022, and Ukraine the victim. The provocation that Stoltenberg has belatedly acknowledged by no means adds up to any justification for Putin's "special military oppression", which has consumed tens of thousands of lives and heaped untold misery on Ukrainians in the regions bordering Russia. Nor should anyone ignore Putin's contentious and often ridiculous excuses for pretending that the mediaeval origins of the Russian empire in the Kyiv region somehow sanctify his ambitions. However, it's not altogether absurd to perceive Ukraine as simultaneously a victim of Nato's unreconstructed preoccupations. Once its raison d'être disappeared with the demise of the Soviet Union and its hegemonic arena of influence, a new enemy had to be found. Al Qaeda and its offshoots offered a convenient distraction for a few years, but once that petered out, Russia and a changing China under Xi Jinping conveniently resurfaced as the leading adversaries.

Pakistan played a co-

starring role in the so-called war on terror (arguably as a sidekick to both the hero and the villain), and it is even said to have had a cameo in the latest conflict. It has lately been claimed (though denied by the FO) that it has been supplying weapons to Ukraine since last year, and that this was crucial for its access to the latest tranche of IMF funds, apart from the usual 'structural adjustment'.

That is by no means implausible, given Pakistan's pre-existing defence trade ties with Ukraine — it has even been suggested that many of the weapons sent back originated from Ukraine. What sounds dodgier is the claim that the notorious 'cipher' was part of a US plan to oust Imran Khan just so that Pakistani shells and missiles could be delivered to Ukraine. The diplomatic missive was received well after the no-confidence motion was in train. The de-thronement was manipulated as much as the enthronement, but most probably not at Uncle Sam's behest. It was just another failed military experiment, and the future is unwritten. The only potential solution — a decisive army exit from politics — is unlikely to be on the cards anytime soon.

Anyhow, the Western alliance is likely to be more bothered about the emerging signs from Poland, which has pulled back from its crucial support for Ukraine's war effort over a spat about grain imports, and Slovakia, where a pro-Russian politician is in pole position to form the next government. Add to that the US congressional fiasco whereby aid for Ukraine was stripped of the deal that averted a government shutdown.

Facilitating some kind of peace rather than egging on the dogs of war would be the best bet for all concerned parties, but don't expect Stoltenberg to acknowledge that until it's too late. -- Courtesy Dawn

The sources said only in AJK's capital district of

Muzaffarabad, over 1.17 lakh children would be administered Polio vaccines and vitamin 'A' drops during the drive till Oct 6 without any pause.

At least 3995 mobile teams of paramedical staff have been constituted to visit door to door to administer the polio vaccine and vitamin 'A' drops during the campaign where a total of 448 fixed centers at local government hospitals and subordinate health facilities in 309 Union Councils, have been set up by the State Polio Eradication Committee of the AJK State Health Services Department with the coordination of the World Health Organization (WHO), the sources said.

The fixed centers have been set up at the state-run hospitals.

SFA, SSWMB to start project for recycling of left over food items

KARACHI (APP): Sindh Food Authority (SFA) in collaboration with Sindh Solid Waste Management Board (SSWMB) will start collection of leftover food items from Burns Road Food Street for their recycling into fertilizers.

Minister spells out govt strategy to meet energy needs

ISLAMABAD (APP): Caretaker Minister for Energy Muhammad Ali has spelled out the government strategy to meet the future oil and gas needs in an efficient manner by stepping up hydrocarbon exploration activities in potential areas across the country.

"We are coming up with a policy for tight gas, policy for shale gas, we have already announced bids for onshore exploration and in December for offshore exploration," he said in an interview with the Emirates News Agency (WAM) on sidelines of the ADIPEC Conference at Abu Dhabi.

He said Pakistan has

a strong presence at ADIPEC this year, with around 10 companies from the exploration, oil marketing, and related sectors. "Indeed, it's a promising start, and on the very first day, we have seen a remarkable response. All our companies are actively engaged, and there's substantial interest in their offerings. The presence here is off to an excellent beginning," he said.

Muhammad Ali laid emphasis on decarbonisation and electrification, saying that they were critical components of Pakistan's energy strategy for the future. "While these aspects may not have received sufficient

attention in the past, there is now a strong focus on them.

Initiatives include energy conservation, electrification efforts, and the re-purposing of natural gas for power generation to electrify appliances and vehicles," he said. He said that on the decarbonisation front, the Climate Ministry was actively engaged in setting up carbon fund while the Energy Ministry was developing a comprehensive carbon policy.

"The ultimate goal is to unite all stakeholders and maximize the potential of these initiatives," he added.

He outlined three key priorities for the energy sector.

He underscored CPEC's transformative impact on Pakistan's economy, with a substantial \$24.4 billion investment, and said that the ML1 Project will be launched soon.

Stage-II of Kurram Tangi dam project to generate 65 MW

ISLAMABAD (APP): Kurram Tangi Dam Project will generate low-cast 65 megawatt (MW) electricity besides storing 1.2 million acre feet (MAF) water for agriculture purpose.

The proposed project would be constructed on Kurram River in North Waziristan District of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, about 14 Km upstream of Kurram Garhi Headworks and 32 Km North of Bannu City, sources told APP here Wednesday.

They said the project would irrigate 38,000 acres of new land in addition to supplementing 278,000 acres of existing land.

Water and Power Development Authority (WAPDA) has already signed an agreement worth Rs.776.3 million to a joint venture for consultancy services for Stage-II of Kurram Tangi Dam Project. The joint venture is comprised of four firms – one from Turkey and three from Pakistan – with DOL SAR as the lead firm. The contract comprises of consultancy services for detailed engineering design, preparation of updated PC-I, PC-I for land acquisition and resettlement plan, and tender documents of the project. They said the Asian Development Bank was providing financial assistance for the consultancy services of the Stage-II which would complete in 22 months period. It is worth mentioning that WAPDA has already been implementing Stage-I of Kurram Tangi Dam Project. The Stage-I will irrigate 16,380 acres of land and generate about 18.4 MW of electricity.

Rupee gains Rs 1.04 against US Dollar

ISLAMABAD (APP): Pakistani Rupee on Wednesday witnessed the 21st consecutive recovery session as it gained Rs1.04 against the US dollar in the interbank trading and closed at Rs 284.68 against the previous day's closing of Rs 285.72.

However, according to the Forex Association of Pakistan (FAP), the buying and selling rates of the dollar in the open market stood at Rs 282.25 and Rs 285 respectively.

The price of the Euro decreased Rs 1.23 to close at Rs 298.33 against the last day's closing of Rs 299.56, according to the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP).

The Japanese Yen went up by 01 paisa to close at Rs1.91, whereas a decrease of Rs1.25 was witnessed in the exchange rate of the British Pound, which traded at Rs343.97 as compared to the last closing of Rs345.42.

The exchange rates of the Emirates Dirham and the Saudi Riyal declined by 28 paisa each to close at Rs77.50 and Rs 75.89 respectively.

PSX stays bullish, gains 323 points

ISLAMABAD (APP): The 100-index of the Pakistan Stock Exchange (PSX) witnessed bullish trend on Wednesday and gained 323.03 points, showing positive change of 0.69 per cent, closing at 47,079.83 points against 46,756.80 points the previous day.

A total of 330,249,094 shares valuing Rs.7,304 billion were traded during the day as compared to 213,188,395 shares valuing Rs. 6,094 billion the previous day.

As many as 342 companies transacted their shares in the stock market; 172 of them recorded gains and 134 sustained losses, whereas the share price of 36 companies remained unchanged. The three top-trading companies were WorldCall Telecom with 150,526,082 shares at Rs.1.39 per share, Pak Refinery with 12,978,337 shares at Rs.15.89 per share and BankIslami Pak with 11,208,643 shares at Rs.17.59 per share.

SNGPL conducts raids against gas theft, other violation cases

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Task Force of Sui Northern Gas Pipeline Limited (SNGPL) on Wednesday conducted raids against gas theft and other violation cases in various localities of the federal capital including Murree, Fateh Jang, Attock, and Wah Cantt. During the ongoing campaign FIRs against number of individuals involved in tampering with commercial meters were registered besides the imposition of heavy fines on the violators, said a press release.

The Official Spokesman of SNGPL said that a fine of over Rs 0.5 million was imposed on commercial consumers in a single raid.

The spokesman revealed that under the Gas Theft Control and Recovery Act 2016, stringent penalties are being enforced against

those causing damage to Sui Gas pipelines or related installations and those involved in gas theft.

Under this Act, individuals involved in damaging gas pipelines can face up to 14 years in prison and a fine of Rs 10 million. Similarly, individuals involved in damaging commercial or industrial meters can be sentenced to 10 years in prison and fined Rs 5 million, while those involved in maliciously wasting gas can face 7 years in prison and a fine of Rs 5 million.

Individuals involved in damaging the gas distribution network through sabotage can be sentenced to 10 years in prison and fined Rs 3 million, and those involved in damaging gas transmission lines through sabotage can be sentenced to 14 years in prison and fined Rs 1 million.

Shipping activity at Port Qasim

KARACHI (APP): Shipping activity was reported at the port where three ships namely, Maersk Kinloss, MSC Elaine and Zoe Schulte carrying Containers and Chemicals, berthed at Container Terminal and Engro Terminal respectively on Tuesday.

Meanwhile three more ships, Ocean Bright, Hyde Park and Mirela carrying Steel Coil, Chemicals and Coal also arrived at outer anchorage of the port during last 24 hours.

A total of seven ships were engaged at PQA berths during the last 24 hours, out of them three ships, MSC Elaine, Maersk Kinloss and Spottalare expected to sail on today afternoon.

Cargo throughput of 128,804 tonnes, comprising 98,748 tonnes imports cargo and 30,056 tonnes export cargo, including containerized cargo carried in 4,904 Containers (3,136 TEUs Imports and 1,768 TEUs export) was handled at the port during last 24 hours.

There are eleven ships at Outer Anchorage of Port Qasim, out of them four ships, Sky Blue, Al Soor-II, Mirela and Hyde Park & another ship MSC Jemima carrying Palm oil, Gas oil, Coal, Chemicals and Containers are expected to take berths at Multi-Purpose Terminal, Oil Terminal, Bulk Terminal.

Railways charge officials to recover outstanding dues from federal, provincial depts

ISLAMABAD (APP): Pakistan Railways has charged its officials concerned to initiate the procedure to recover outstanding dues from the federal and provincial departments.

The Ministry of Railways has asked the federal and provincial departments to pay their outstanding dues worth billion of rupees on account of using its land and other services, within the least possible time as the department was facing economic issues, an official in the ministry told APP.

About the amount payable against the official said that over Rs 8,375 million (over 8 billion) are payable by different departments on account of using its land and various services.

He said the federal departments had to pay an amount of Rs 709.084 million, provincial departments Rs1980.217 million and autonomous and private bodies Rs 5685.736 million.

To a question, he said Pakistan Railways has upgraded as many as 167 vulnerable un-manned level crossings to manned level crossings, out of 550 which are identified by the department over the entire railway network.

Turkiye says Ankara attack assailants trained in Syria

ANKARA: Turkiye said on Wednesday that two suspected Kurdish militants who died while staging a weekend attack in Ankara had been trained in Syria.

Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan said Turkiye now reserved the right to strike a broader range of Kurdish targets in both Syria and Iraq in retaliation for Sunday's attack.

Turkish police shot dead one of the assailants while the other died in an apparent suicide blast outside Turkiye's interior ministry. Two policemen were injured in the incident.

"As a result of the work of our security

forces, it has become clear that the two terrorists came from Syria and were trained there," Fidan said in televised comments.

"From now on, all infrastructure, large facilities and energy facilities belonging to (armed Kurdish groups) in Iraq and Syria are legitimate targets for our security forces."

A branch of the Kurdish PKK militia — listed as a terror group by Turkiye and its Western allies — claimed responsibility for Sunday's attack, the first in Ankara since 2016. Turkiye conducted air raids against PKK targets in Iraq hours later. Fidan's comments suggest that

Turkiye could expand its air strikes to include war-torn Syria.

Syria's Kurds have carved out a semi-autonomous area in the country's north and east.

US-supported Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) — the Kurds' de facto army in the area — led the battle that dislodged Islamic State group fighters from the last scraps of their Syrian territory in 2019.

But Turkiye views the Kurdish People's Protection Units (YPG) that dominate the SDF as an offshoot of the PKK.

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan has repeatedly threatened to expand attacks against the YPG.

US House ousts Speaker Kevin McCarthy in historic first

WASHINGTON: The US House of Representatives voted on Tuesday to oust Speaker Kevin McCarthy from his job, as infighting among his fellow Republicans plunged Congress into further chaos just days after it narrowly averted a government shutdown.

The 216 to 210 vote marked the first time in history that the House removed its leader, driven by a relatively small group of right-wing Republicans. No clear successor has emerged.

The rebellion was led by Representative Matt Gaetz, a far-right Republican from Florida and McCarthy antagonist who accused the party leader of not doing enough to cut federal spending.

It was the latest moment of high drama in a year that has seen the Republican-controlled House bring Washington to the brink of default and the edge of a partial government shut-

down.

McCarthy's party controls the chamber by a narrow 221-212 majority, meaning that it could afford to lose no more than five votes if Democrats united in opposition.

That happened on Tuesday, as eight Republicans voted with 208 Democrats to remove McCarthy from his post.

In debate on the House floor, Gaetz and a handful of allies criticized McCarthy for relying on Democratic votes to pass temporary funding that headed off a partial government shutdown.

"We need a speaker who will fight for something — anything — other than staying on as speaker," said Republican Representative Bob Good.

McCarthy's supporters, including some of the chamber's most vocal conservatives, said he had successfully limited spending and advanced other conservative

US moves to reunite Afghan children

WASHINGTON: The United States assured Afghans on Tuesday that the reunification of Afghan children who remain separated from their parents abroad remained a top priority for the Biden administration.

On Sept 25, the US Department of State released an updated version of the Family Reunification Form, which allows Afghan parolees under the age of 18, who entered the United States without their parents, to apply for relocation of their parents and eligible siblings still living overseas.

"The United States has an enduring commitment to the people of Afghanistan," US State Department Spokesperson Matthew Miller said. The United States, he said, would also continue its efforts to provide information and tools to those individuals seeking to reunite with their family members.

"Family reunification remains an extremely high priority for Afghans themselves and for the communities who care about them," the US official added.

EU takes step towards overhauling migration system

BRUSSELS: European Union countries on Wednesday sealed a deal on how to handle irregular migration at times of exceptionally high arrivals, taking a step towards overhauling the bloc's asylum and migration rules before a pan-European election next year.

Envoys of the bloc's 27 member states reached the agreement on Wednesday after overcoming the latest spat between Italy and Germany over charity ships picking people up in the sea as refugees and migrants from the Middle East and Africa try to cross the Mediterranean for Europe.

The 27 countries will now negotiate further with the European Parliament. They hope to have a functioning migration system in place ahead of a 2024 Eu-

ropean Parliament election that takes place across the union of some 450 million people.

"Now we can move on with the negotiations," said Swedish Migration Minister Maria Malmer Stenergard. "It is important to get the pact in place, to ensure order at the EU's external borders and reduce flows."

Under the agreement, countries such as Italy that receive many Mediterranean arrivals could speed up asylum procedures and ask for swift help from EU peers, including financial aid and relocations. The EU has been seeking to reform its asylum system since more than a million people reached its shores in 2015, catching the bloc by surprise and overwhelming countries of first arrivals such as Greece and Italy.

Teen guns down 2 in Bangkok shopping mall

BANGKOK: A 14-year-old boy was arrested on Tuesday after a shooting at a packed Bangkok mall that left two people dead and five wounded, and sent hundreds of panicked shoppers running in terror into the streets.

Witnesses spoken about chaotic scenes as shots rang out at the up-market Siam Paragon mall in the heart of the Thai capital around 4:30pm (0930 GMT).

The shooting comes just days before the first anniversary of the deadliest massacre in modern Thai history, when an ex-policeman armed with a gun and knife attacked a nursery in the country's north, murdering 24 children and 12 adults. National Police Chief Torsak Sukwimol told reporters that two women — one Chinese, one from Myanmar.

Nobel Chemistry prize awarded for discovery of quantum dots used in LED lights

NEW YORK: Scientists Mounqi Bawendi, Louis Brus and Alexei Ekimov won the 2023 Nobel Prize in Chemistry for "the discovery and synthesis of quantum dots", which illuminate computer monitors and television screens and are used by doctors to map tumours.

"The Nobel Laureates... have succeeded in producing particles so small that their properties are determined by quantum

phenomena. The particles, which are called quantum dots, are now of great importance in nanotechnology," the Nobel Committee for Chemistry said in a statement.

"Researchers believe that in the future they could contribute to flexible electronics, tiny sensors, thinner solar cells and encrypted quantum communication." Nanoparticles and quantum dots are used

in LED lights and can also be used to guide surgeons while removing cancer tissue. The more than century-old prize is awarded by the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences and is worth 11 million Swedish crowns (\$997,959).

Earlier on Wednesday, the academy appeared to have inadvertently published the names of the three scientists it said had won this year's Nobel Prize in chemistry.

At least 23 Indian soldiers missing in flash flood

NEW DELHI: The Indian army said on Wednesday that 23 soldiers were missing after a powerful flash flood caused by intense rainfall tore through a remote valley in the mountainous northeast Sikkim state.

"Due to sudden cloud burst over Lhonak Lake in North Sikkim, a flash flood occurred in the Teesta River... 23 personnel have been reported missing and some vehicles are reported submerged under the slush," the army said in a statement. "Search operations are underway."

The remote area lies close to India's border with Nepal, and Lhonak Lake sits

at the base of a glacier in the snowy peaks that surround Kangchenjunga, the world's third-highest mountain. The army said water released upstream from the Chungthang dam meant the river was already more than 4.5 metres (15 feet) higher than usual. A video released by an Indian army spokesman showed a thick torrent of raging brown water sweeping down a thickly forested valley, with roads washed away and power lines ripped down.

Flash floods are common during the monsoon season, which begins in June and normally withdraws from the Indian sub-continent by the end of September.

Foreign troops must leave Maldives, president-elect Muizzu says

NEW DELHI: Foreign military forces cannot stay in the Maldives, president-elect Mohamed Muizzu told a rally celebrating his victory in closely watched weekend presidential elections that are expected to redraw ties with India and China.

Muizzu, who beat incumbent President Ibrahim Solih in a second-round runoff on Saturday, is backed by a coalition known to be close to China, and championed an "India Out" campaign a few years ago, against a small unit of Indian military. Trump 'gagged' after tirade against court official

NEW YORK: The judge overseeing Donald Trump's civil fraud trial on Tuesday imposed a gag order — promising sanctions for any violations — after the former US president used social media to lash out against the judge's top law clerk.

Justice Arthur Engoron of the New York state court in Manhattan told lawyers for Trump and New York Attorney General Letitia James, who brought the fraud case, that attacks on his staff were "unacceptable, inappropriate and will not be tolerated under any circumstances."

Acting on the second

day of testimony in the trial, the judge forbade both sides from speaking about his staff, and threatened "serious sanctions" if anyone did. "Consider this statement a gag order," Judge Engoron added.

James has accused Trump, his two adult sons, the Trump Organisation and others of inflating asset values over a decade to secure favourable bank loans and insurance terms, and exaggerating Trump's own riches by more than \$2 billion. The trial could lead to the dismantling of Trump's business empire as he seeks to regain the presidency in 2024.

Mexico's Sheinbaum handily leads 2024 presidential race, poll shows

Iranian girl in critical condition after alleged encounter over hijab

DUBAI: An Iranian teenage girl is in critical condition in hospital, two prominent rights activists told Reuters on Wednesday, after falling into a coma following what they said was a confrontation with agents in the Tehran metro for violating the hijab law.

Armita Geravand's case is highly sensitive, raising concerns the 16-year-old might face the same fate as Mahsa Amini, a 22-year-old woman whose death in a coma last year in the custody of morality police sparked months of nationwide protest. While authori-

ties have denied claims by rights groups that Geravand went into a coma on Sunday after a confrontation with officers enforcing the Islamic dress code, Iranian-Kurdish rights group Hengaw posted her picture unconscious at a Tehran hospital where she was taken after the incident.

There was no immediate response from Iran's interior ministry to a request for comment about the incident. "We are following her case closely. She is in a coma at the Intensive Care Unit of the hospital and her condition is critical."

Venice mourns after 21 killed in bus accident

MESTRE: Flags flew at half-mast over Venice on Wednesday after 21 people including a toddler were killed when a bus careered off an overpass and caught fire.

"The bus flipped upside down. The impact was terrible because it fell from over 10 metres (32 feet) landing next to railway tracks below, said Mauro Luongo, Venice's fire brigade commander.

The dead are thought to be mostly tourists returned from Venice's historic centre to a camping site on Tuesday evening. Fifteen others were injured in what Venice Mayor Luigi Brugnaro described as "an apocalyptic scene".

Firefighters said the bus was electric, despite the Italian interior minister ear-

lier saying it ran on methanol.

They spent hours extracting bodies from the charred remains of the bus, which was finally removed from the site in the early hours of Wednesday.

"Among the difficulties was the fact that the bus was electric so it had batteries. Unfortunately, they caught fire on impact," said Luongo. "That's why operations took a little longer to remove the vehicle."

Luca Zaia, the governor of the Venice region, confirmed the official death toll was 21, "including a one-year-old child and a teenager".

Five Ukrainians were among the dead identified so far, alongside a German, a Croatian, a Frenchman and the Italian driver, he said.

First Amendment protects Khalistan Referendum campaign, says US

LONDON: The State Department on Tuesday said that the global Khalistan Referendum campaign run by pro-Khalistan Sikhs For Justice (SFJ) advocacy group is protected under the First Amendment of the US Constitution.

During a media briefing at the State Department, a spokesperson was asked to comment on the fact that there were tens of thousands of Sikhs living in US and there was a US-based advocacy group "Sikhs For Justice" managing the Khalistan Referendum in several Western democracies and what was Washington's stand on this as India has derided the campaign. The spokesperson

said he would not comment on the specifics but "broadly across the board" campaigns like Khalistan Referendum are protected under US laws.

He added: "Individuals have the right to freedom of speech, the right to peacefully assemble in the United States all of which are in line with our First Amendment protections and adherence, of course, to any appropriate federal and local regulations."

The spokesperson was also asked the question following the fallout from the assassination of pro-Khalistan Hardeep Singh Nijjar by the Indian government agents in Canada's biggest Gurdwara in British Columbia.

Azerbaijan's Aliyev to skip EU talks with Armenia, angry with France - state media

BAKU: Azerbaijan's President Ilham Aliyev has decided against attending an EU-brokered event in Spain where he could have held talks with Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan, Azerbaijan state media reported on Wednesday.

Aliyev had been considering taking part in a five-way meeting in Granada, Spain, on Thursday with the leaders of France, Germany, Armenia and EU Council President Charles Michel.

The five were due to discuss the future of the Nagorno-Karabakh region after Baku took back full control in a 24-hour military operation launched on Sept. 19, and to review the progress of long-running but troubled peace talks between Azerbaijan and Armenia.

Azerbaijan's state-run APA news agency, citing unnamed sources, said Aliyev had decided against attending however. There was no official confirmation that Aliyev would not go.

APA said Aliyev had wanted Turkey to be represented at the meeting, but that France and Germany

had objected, and said that Baku felt "an anti-Azerbaijani atmosphere" had developed among the meeting's potential participants.

In particular, APA cited what it said was discontent in Baku around a statement made by Michel and what it regarded as "pro-Armenian statements" by French officials and France's decision, announced on Tuesday, to supply Yerevan with military equipment.

French Foreign Minister Catherine Colonna held talks with Armenia's Pashinyan in Yerevan on Tuesday, the first trip there by a Western government minister since Azerbaijani forces retook Karabakh.

Azerbaijan's foreign ministry on Wednesday condemned what it said were unfounded comments by Colonna, who had voiced support for Armenia and its territorial integrity.

APA said that Azerbaijan would not attend any future talks that included France, but remained potentially open to possible three-way meetings with the EU and Armenia.

Study finds more people are moving into high flood zones, increasing risk of water disasters

NEW YORK: Far more people are in harm's way as they move into high flood zones across the globe, adding to an increase in watery disasters from climate change, a new study said.

Since 1985, the number of the world's settlements in the riskiest flood zones has increased 122%, compared to 80% for the safest areas, according to a study in Wednesday's journal Nature by researchers at The World Bank. The authors looked at settlement extent and expansion using satellites instead of population, with the world's built-up regions growing 85% overall from 1985 to 2015.

"People are on a search for better lives and better jobs and then sort of get stuck in bad lands because that's what they can afford," said study co-author Stephane Hallegatte, a World Bank senior climate adviser and expert on disaster economics. He said they know it's dangerous when they arrive.

The problem is driven by middle- and low-income

countries, the study found. Richer countries like the United States and parts of Europe are seeing more growth in safer areas than flood-prone ones and the poorest nations haven't quite developed as heavily in flood-prone areas, it said.

China and Vietnam both saw their settlement extent more than tripling in the past 30 years, increasing far more than their dry land areas. Most countries, especially in East Asia, saw more settlements in regular flood zones and ultra high flood zones than in dry areas.

Libya, which suffered from devastating flooding last month, had an 83% increase in settlement extent in the worst flood zones. Pakistan, also the victim of catastrophic flooding both last year and this year, had an 89% increase.

What's happening is that as a nation grows a bit wealthier there's a change from rural to urban and people leave the country to go to cities, which are often near waterways that flood in places, said study lead author Jun Rentschler, a World Bank economist.



16 transformers removed 327 more electricity connections of defaulters disconnected

Independent Report QUETTA: In all 327 more electricity connections of the defaulters were removed and 16 transformers removed during the crackdown continued against the defaulters and pilferers all over the province including Quetta.

The spokesman of QESCO informed that at least 5304 power connections have so been found involved in the power pilferage in the province while 1277 applications have been submitted against the pilferers in the police stations and Levies thanas.

Out of them, 380 FIRs have been registered against the power pilferers in the province as yet, the spokesman informed.

He said that aggregate Rs. 73 crore have so far been recovered on account of the pilfering and arrears of the electricity utility bills.

Over 64 crore rupees have been recovered from some 23,000 defaulters of the bills, he mentioned adding that over 9 crore have been recovered on account of the fine charged to the power pilferers.
