Invites President Xi to visit Pakistan

Pakistan blindly trusts China; nothing to be allowed to undermine our partnership: PM

President Xi underlines Pakistan an iron-brother, partner in peace and development; Pakistan, China emphasize steady pace of CPEC, vow to make it corridor of sustainable growth

BEIJING (APP): Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar on Thursday, calling the bilateral partnership made in "heaven", said that Pakistan blindly trusted China and that the country would not allow anything to undermine the bilateral strategic partnership.

The prime minister, in his opening remarks while meeting with Chinese President Xi Jinping, said Pakistan firmly supported One China policy and would show it through its actions,

not mere words.

The meeting took place on the sidelines of the Third Belt and Road Forum, attended by leadership and representatives of around 140 nations.

"Pakistan will not take an inch back when it comes to our relations with China," he remarked as the two leaders met to discuss the bilateral and regional matters.

President Xi warmly received the prime minister as he arrived to hold the meeting accompanied by

his delegation members, including Shamsah Akhtar, Sarfaraz Bugti, Gohar Ejaz and others.

The prime minister thanked the Chinese leader for inviting him to attend the "historic" Belt and Road Forum and also congratulated him for the "resounding" success of the event.

He said President Xi's address at the Forum was "profound, deep and visionary", which offered a lot of opportunities for the countries like Pakistan.

"I used to hear the phrases of (Pak-China friendship) 'sweeter than honey' and 'iron clad brotherhood', but I realise that this moment is for Pakistan when you say 'when China does well, the rest of the world does well.'

"This is the moment for Pakistan to come and seize the opportunity," he remarked.

He said eight proposals President Xi had put forth at the Forum were actually a roadmap for not just physical connectivity

but also an important stabilising factor in international order.

Prime Minister Kakar said the Belt and Road Initiative was a "pragmatic" and "practical" answer to the global political, economic and civilisational challenges faced by many nations.

He said China's unprecedented progress was a role model which transformed the lives of the millions of its people, also hav-

CPEC to bring about Pakistan's economic prosperity, regional connectivity: PM

BEIJING (APP): Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar on Thursday, terming CPEC a landmark project in the history of Pakistan-China relations, said it would bring about economic progress and prosperity in Pakistan and contribute to regional connectivity and development.

The prime minister, in a meeting with Chairman of China International Development Cooperation Agency Luo Zhaohui, lauded the vision of connectivity and partnership under China-Pakistan Economic Corridor and its fruits over the last ten years in terms of economic milestones for Pakistan.

LAHORE (APP): Governor Balochistan Abdul Wali Kakar met Governor Punjab Muhammad Balighur Rehman and discussed matters of mutual interest besides promoting inter-provincial relations during a meeting at the Governor's House here on Thursday.

Welcoming his counterpart to Lahore, Governor Punjab Muhammad Balighur Rehman said that Balochistan is the largest province of the country in terms of area, adding that development and prosperity of Balochistan is essential for the development of the country. He said a sizeable number of scholarships and seats have been reserved for the students of Balochistan in the universities and medical colleges in Punjab.

The Governor Punjab also apprised Governor Balochistan about the steps taken as chancellor in universities. He said that consortiums have been formed in seven important areas in the universities, adding, the aim is to strengthen linkages between academia and industry and to suggest recommendations for improvement in these key areas.

Six terrorists killed, four soldiers martyred in Waziristan gun fight

RAWALPINDI (INP): Six terrorists including a high-value target named Hazrat Zaman alias Khawarey Mullah have been killed by security forces in an operation at general area of Gharyoum in North Waziristan district.

According to the Inter Services Public Relations, the ringleader was actively involved in multiple terrorist activities in the area and was highly wanted by the law enforcement agencies.

However, three military personnel including Lance Naik Tabbasum UI Haq, Sepoy Naem Akhtar and Sepoy Abdul Hameed also embraced shahadat while fighting gallantly against terrorists in another operation at general area of Asman Manza in South Waziristan District, Sepoy Farman Ali also embraced shahadat in the line of duty. Sanitization is being carried out to eliminate any terrorists found in the area.

CM says GoB not reduces age limit for government jobs

ISLAMABAD (APP): The caretaker Chief Minister Balochistan, Mir Ali Mardan Khan Domki has stated that final decisions has not been made yet on the matter of reduction of upper age limit for obtaining the government jobs in the province.

Rather, the matter has been kept for further consideration in the next meeting of provincial cabinet.

In a tweet on his social media account (X) issued here on Thursday, the caretaker Chief Minister said that the agenda point of the upper age limit for the government jobs was presented by the Services and General Administration Department in the cabinet's last meeting.

The interim cabinet had reviewed the matter from all aspects and the concerned department (S&GAD) presented its view on it.

However, no final decision was made on the matter, the Chief Minister made it clear.

However, the important nature public matter would be considered in the next meeting of interim cabinet, he maintained.

Pakistan sends 100 tons humanitarian aid for Palestinians

ISLAMABAD (APP): Pakistan on Thursday sent humanitarian assistance for the people of Palestine including medicine, tents and blankets.

A chartered aircraft carrying 100 tons of essential medical supplies, tents and blankets departed from Islamabad for Egypt this afternoon, the Foreign Office said. From Egypt, the supplies will be transferred to the people of Gaza.

At least 3,785 Palestinians were killed in Gaza in Israeli strikes since Oct 7, the health ministry in Gaza said Thursday.

It comes as four more residential buildings were struck by Israeli air raids, the Palestinian Ministry of Foreign Affairs said in a post on X.

Schedule announced for LB elections in Quetta

QUETTA (APP): Provincial Election Commissioner Balochistan Sharifullah on Thursday said that the Election Commission of Pakistan has announced the schedule for the local government elections to be held on November 30 in Quetta.

As per the schedule, the returning officers will issue the public notice on 30 October 2023. While the nomination papers will be received from the candidates from November 2 to 4nAfter which the list of names of nominated candidates can be released on November 6, he said. He said that similarly, from November 7 to 9, the returning officers would scrutinize the nomination papers of the candidates, while the last date for filing appeals against the acceptance or rejection of nomination papers by the Returning Officers is November 11.

President visits Palestine Embassy; calls for ceasefire, humanitarian corridor

ISLAMABAD (APP): President Dr Arif Alvi on Thursday visited the Embassy of Palestine and expressed solidarity with the Palestinian people who are being subjected to indiscriminate killings by Israel.

He urged the international community to condemn Israel's brutalities and its disproportionate reaction which killed thousands of innocent people.

He called for an immediate ceasefire and the opening up of a humanitarian corridor to send aid to the people lacking food, electricity and water.

The president also met Ambassador of the State of Palestine Ahmed Jawad Rabei, and expressed soli-

arity with the Palestinian people on behalf of the Government and the people of Pakistan.

He said that Pakistan would always stand by Palestine and only accept a solution that was acceptable to the Palestinians.

President Alvi said that the United Nations should debate the atrocities that happened in Palestine, and the UN Security Council should pass a resolution to stop Israeli atrocities.

He said that such brutal actions created more possibilities of hatred leading to more wars, adding that the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) should raise a strong voice in support of Palestine.

Israel-Hamas war: Pakistan has no intention to send Army to Gaza: FO

ISLAMABAD (APP): Pakistan on Thursday expressed its disappointment over the results of the emergency meeting of the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) held on Wednesday and called for an immediate end to the bombardment and inhumane blockade of Gaza.

"We are nationally disappointed by the results of the UNSC debate. The Security Council should play its designated role to bring an immediate end to the bombardment and blockade leading to a humanitarian catastrophe," the Foreign Of-

fice spokesperson Mumtaz Zahra Baloch said in her weekly press briefing.

The spokesperson was referring to the use of veto power by the United States at the UN Security Council to block a resolution calling for Israel to allow humanitarian corridors into the Gaza Strip, a pause in the fighting and the lifting of an order for civilians to leave the north of the besieged territory.

China, Russia and the UAE had convened the meeting to discuss the worsening situation in Gaza. The

IHC grants protective bail to Nawaz Sharif till Oct 24

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Thursday granted protective bail to Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz's (PML-N) Quaid Muhammad Nawaz Sharif till October 24, and stopped the authorities from arresting him on his arrival in Pakistan from abroad.

The IHC bench comprising Chief Justice Aamer Farooq and Justice Miangul Hassan Aurangzeb announced the verdict on the petitions seeking protective bail for the former prime minister in Al-Azizia Steel Mills and Avenfield property references.

At the outset of hearing, NAB Prosecutor Rafay Maqsood said that the IHC had stated in its judgment that the former prime minister could request the court to open his appeal again at any time after his return.

The National Accountability Bureau (NAB) had no objection if Nawaz Sharif wanted to surrender,

he said, adding he had adopted the stance after taking instructions from the NAB Prosecutor General.

Justice Miangul Hassan Aurangzeb said that the bench was granting protective bail to Nawaz Sharif on the statement of NAB prosecutor, otherwise, it would have decided the matter as per case merit. The court subsequently granted protective bail to the former prime minister stating that NAB had not raised any objection on it. It also stopped the Bureau from arresting Nawaz Sharif on his arrival in Pakistan till October 24, so that he could surrender before the court.

Later, the court, in its written order, also observed that NAB Deputy Prosecutor General Naem Tariq Sakhera presented the stance of Bureau after taking instructions from the prosecutor general that it had no objection on the protective bail of ex-prime minister.

Early diagnosis crucial to save 35,000 breast cancer deaths in Pakistan every year: President

ISLAMABAD (APP): President Dr Arif Alvi on Thursday said more than 100,000 women in Pakistan were diagnosed with breast cancer every year, of which 35,000 could not survive due to detection of the disease at late stages.

He said the diagnosis of breast cancer at stage 1 had higher survival rates compared to stages 3 and 4 of the disease.

In an interactive session with journalists of print and electronic media here at the Aiwan-e-Sadr,

the president along with his wife Samina Alvi stressed breaking social taboos about breast cancer and importance of the media's role in sensitizing the general public.

President Alvi emphasized a preventive rather than curative approach as the government lacked ample resources to bear the unaffordable costs of medical treatment including the scanning and oncology procedures of breast cancer.

He called for educating women on how to con-

duct monthly self-examinations to locate an abnormal nodule and not to hesitate to seek urgent medical help.

President Alvi recalled that last year, the Pakistan Telecommunication Authority on his suggestion relayed 120 million call-waiting messages about breast cancer.

He urged the journalists to join the cause of fighting breast cancer by highlighting the topic in their write-ups and television programmes.

The president men-

tioned that he and Samina Alvi for the last five years had been raising consistent awareness campaigns on breast cancer from the platform of the Presidency.

He stressed continuity in policies on health and education despite changes in governments to ensure a healthy and balanced society.

He also emphasized focusing on health courses of short duration to produce a larger number of healthcare workers to cater to needs of the population.

Jawad web-based application for recovery of dues of Overseas Pakistani workers

ISLAMABAD (APP): Special Assistant to the Prime Minister (SAPM) for overseas Pakistanis Jawad Sohrab launched the OPF web portal for the recovery of dues of overseas Pakistani workers to facilitate the Pakistani diaspora.

This service expedites the disbursement of dues such as salary, death & disability compensation and other allowances of the workers, according to a press release here on Thursday.

Addressing the formal launch of the web-based application for Outstanding Dues Management of overseas Pakistanis

workers at Overseas Pakistan Foundation (OPF) which was completely developed in-house, the Special Assistant to the Prime Minister for Overseas Pakistanis, Jawad Sohrab Malik emphasized upon maximum utilization of technology to improve service delivery to Overseas Pakistanis.

He said the Internet has revolutionized the service

delivery paradigm as it has transformed the way businesses operate worldwide. Moreover, it has also led to the development of new technologies, thus, providing an opportunity to better manage business processes using state-of-the-art technology. The implementation of a web-based system has significantly enhanced the efficiency of OPF officials in processing outstanding dues cases of overseas Pakistanis.

Now, all applications are directly entered into the system at their point of origin, which are the offices of the CWAs in Pakistan missions abroad. This eliminates the previous need to send hard-copy applications to OPF for manual data entry, a process that used to take approximately 30 days. With the new system in place, this cumbersome transfer of applications in physical form has been reduced to a few minutes only.

Furthermore, the entire application workflow

has been streamlined through automation. The new system provides real-time access to applications, allowing for seamless movement within different departments.

The web-based online system also allows all stakeholders to access up-to-date information on pending dues cases, worker details, payment disbursement status, document verification, etc. Additionally, it empowers senior management to track applications online and monitor the progress of incoming applications.

The SAPM stated that in line with the vision of the Prime Minister of Pakistan, the Ministry of Overseas Pakistanis and Human Resource Development is striving hard to extend maximum facilities and assistance to overseas Pakistanis who have a strong bond with their homeland and the present government is on its threshold to explore all avenues to facilitate them.

Dr. Nadeem directs to improve PNC performance

ISLAMABAD (APP): Caretaker Federal Minister for Health Dr. Nadeem Jan has issued instructions to improve the performance of the Pakistan Nursing Council (PNC) through innovative steps.

Chairing a meeting here Thursday, the minister directed to establish a one-window cell for the registration of paramedics on urgent basis. He said that immediate steps should be taken for digitization of Nursing Council. He said that Lady Health Workers should be brought under Pakistan Nursing and Midwifery Council. There should be a focal person for HEC in Pakistan Nursing and Midwifery Council to ensure communication and

consultation with HEC in matters related to the curriculum, the minister said. He assured that Ministry of Health will provide assistance in preparation of regulations under PNMC Act 2023. The international organizations should be contacted for technical support to PNMC, said the Minister.

Dr. Nadeem Jan said effective steps should be taken to increase the number of nurses in hospitals according to international standards. A comprehensive strategy is being devised to enhance the efficiency of nurses, he said and directed that special steps should be taken regarding the education and career planning of nurses.

Universities urged to advance research on dream analysis

ISLAMABAD (APP): Clinical psychologist Professor Dr. Asghar Ali Shah has urged the universities to advance research on dream analysis as it would be significant progress in psychology and mental health treatment.

Talking to APP here on Thursday, Dr. Asghar explained that dreams can provide valuable insights for addressing psychological issues.

He noted that patients often find it easier to share dreams with therapists rather than actual events.

Israeli barbarism

It is difficult to put into words the outrage one feels when looking at the broken, lifeless bodies of Palestinian men, women, and especially children — all victims of Israel's latest murderous assault on Gaza.

If any other country had been guilty of committing these atrocities, the international community, particularly the self-professed guardians of the rules-based Western order, would have been calling for harsh accountability. But not so for Israel, for whom the rules are always put aside by its benefactors.

While the people of Gaza have been enduring hell on earth ever since the events of Oct 7, Tuesday's air strike targeting the Al Ahli Hospital marks a new low in this uneven, brutal conflict. This monstrous crime, in which at least 500 people were reportedly killed, has Israel's footprints all over it, even though Tel Aviv has denied responsibility.

Instead, Israel blames the Palestinian Islamic Jihad, saying the armed group misfired a missile that hit the health facility. The outfit says the accusations are "baseless".

While facts are often obscured in the fog of war, it should be remembered that the Israeli military is well-versed in the art of obfuscation, and that Tel Aviv has a rich history of carrying out massacres of Palestinian civilians, from 1948 onwards.

No one, except for its ardent supporters, is likely to believe Israel's denial of responsibility, since its hands have been covered in the blood of Palestinian non-combatants for decades now. In the most recent hostilities, over 3,300 have been murdered by Israel, including 1,000 children. Were these 1,000 minors all Hamas operatives?

What is just as reprehensible as Israel's unrestrained barbarity is the Western hypocrisy in this conflict. Many Western leaders have made a beeline for Tel Aviv in solidarity with the murderous regime, the latest amongst them Joe Biden.

While offering lukewarm condolences over the hospital outrage, Mr Biden warmly embraced the Israeli prime minister while observing that the "other team" was likely responsible for this odious crime. Gloating over his high-profile visitor's presence, Benjamin Netanyahu termed the conflict a struggle "between the forces of civilisation ... and barbarism". Certainly, Tel Aviv's brutal behaviour over the decades, and today, qualifies as barbaric.

It is highly unlikely the West will muzzle Israel. And the Muslim world must take a stand that goes beyond rhetoric, and stops the slaughter in Palestine.

During an OIC meeting in Jeddah on Wednesday, the Iranian foreign minister proposed an oil embargo and sanctions on Israel, as well as called on Muslim states with relations with Tel Aviv to break these off.

There are echoes here of the 'oil weapon' deployed by Arab states during the 1973 Middle East conflict. Certainly, these measures should be considered in solidarity with Palestine's battered population.

The global landscape for international climate finance has in recent years undergone a transformational change. Fundamentally, it has moved away from grants to lending and investments. It has become overly complex, complicated, and competitive for Pakistan's lethargic policymaking processes.

The present government machinery is constrained when it comes to optimally accessing and exploiting opportunities without first clearly understanding the nature of available finances, their intended purpose, and the distinct roles and responsibilities of national and provincial institutions. To do this, Pakistan will need to adopt a reform agenda that is driven by the need for climate-smart development.

It will, however, require burying some old thinking habits and shedding some myths. As Pakistan has extremely narrow fiscal space, it is imperative to diversify the sources of financial inflows. Forging partnerships with private-sector enterprises to access domestic and international climate finance has become essential, particularly since climate risks to the economy add to macroeconomic volatility.

Let's identify four myths that have restrained Pakistan's access to climate finance:

Myth 1: Pakistan's climate vulnerability is so high that the world community is obligated to extend a helping hand.

In reality, there is no international mechanism to support countries facing climate disasters. The 2005 Paris Declaration on Aid Effectiveness that had committed 0.7 per cent of gross national income (GNI) as official development assistance has no comparable instrument in the realm of climate disasters.

Developed countries do not accept any historical responsibility to support victims of climate-in-

duced disasters and they have gradually reduced their humanitarian assistance budgets. So, portraying Pakistan as one of the most vulnerable countries will not always attract international finances. In fact, the opposite may be true: showing half the country under floodwaters can scare away potential investors.

Myth 2: Pakistan can invoke the 'polluter pays' principle that was adopted at the Earth Summit in Rio in 1992 for accessing international finance when the Loss and Damage finance facility is operationalised.

The principle has indeed found place in several multilateral environmental agreements and has evolved as an important legal doctrine in several domestic jurisdictions. But presently, it has little to no utility in multilateral contexts.

The Paris Agreement has not accepted the principle of historical responsibility nor have Western countries agreed upon the notion of compensation under any arrangement. In any case, the size, governance structure, and eligibility criteria for accessing the proposed Loss and Damage fund are still up in

the air.

Myth 3: Developed countries are duty-bound to support Pakistan under the principle of Common But Differentiated Responsibilities, also adopted at the Earth Summit.

The assumption that Pakistani policymakers brought home then was that international support would be in the form of grants. The subsequent evolution of the global climate finance architecture has all but buried the CDR principle. The DNA of climate finance has undergone profound changes. It now emphasises blending and leveraging private-sector finances.

We in Pakistan did not recognise it, but the world system began to move away from CDR even before the Kyoto Protocol came into force in 2005. The most significant step was taken by president George W. Bush in 2002 when he committed \$10 million to the World Bank for multilateral development banks to proactively develop responses to the financing needed for climate costs. This paved the way for all MDBs to jointly set up four specialised funds on

clean energy, renewable energy, forestry, and climate resilience, under the umbrella of Climate Investment Funds (CIFs).

Managed by all six MDBs, the CIFs have emerged as important instruments to test and mobilise non-grant climate finances. Collectively, the CIFs have supported investments in 72 countries, mobilising over \$12 billion by using a combination of grants, concessional finance, co-financing, and private-sector leveraging to finance their projects.

Having served as a civil society representative from Asia on its board and on its advisory group on learning and evaluation, this writer has observed firsthand how CIF projects have included co-financing from an array of public and private sources including MDBs, bilateral official agencies, international and national development banks, recipient government national and municipal budgets, and commercial and investment banks.

The CIF funds offered important learning for the MDBs' climate portfolio. In fact, the World Bank, ADB and other MDBs

now record the climate-related co-benefits of their lending. Building on the CIFs' experience, the Green Climate Fund has also used a combination of grants, concessional finance, co-financing, and private-sector leveraging to finance their projects.

Myth 4: A well-written grant proposal by consultants can help create perennial streams for financial flows.

About a dozen government institutions at the federal and provincial levels are vying for donor support to set up climate centres, but in an uncoordinated fashion. Working in silos will not help them create a coherent financing framework or a national climate finance strategy, complete with sectoral investment plans and specifying national/provincial roles and responsibilities.

In the present situation, the country cannot afford desperate measures. Instead, what Pakistan needs is a set of deliberated, measured steps enabling it to develop its own capacity rather than outsourcing its thinking on climate finance. -- Courtesy Dawn

Can you build your own major?**Dr Ayesha Razzaque**

When you become aware of a problem, you can take one of two approaches: you can either take on the problem head-on or you can paper over it. In Pakistan, we tend to go with the latter.

When a government agency is not doing its job, set up another one. That is how we have ended up with the byzantine nightmare of a bureaucratic maze comprising ministries, departments, institutes, and agencies from the center to the provinces with overlapping mandates. The higher education sector is no exception to this.

Last week, the sitting caretaker federal minister of IT & Telecom, and Science & Technology tweeted that Pakistani institutions produce close to 75,000 IT graduates every year (the Pakistan IT Industry Association - P@SHA - puts the number of 'IT graduates' at only 25,000) but less than 10 per cent are (immediately) employable. Whether this 10 per cent figure is backed by any data or is anecdotal, I do not know but it does ring true and is roughly in line with experiences one hears from employers. The purpose of education is more than getting hired for a job, but since that is all successive governments always talk about and the conversation rarely ever moves beyond that, let us stick with that for the moment.

Ten per cent employability is how the job market rates technology graduates. If the ability to find a job is the goal, then employability or the graduate employment rate after six months and associated statistics (average starting salary, etc) are what we ought to track, are the only metrics that matters and (like I have asserted on numerous occasions) that universities ought to report to convince prospective students of their programmes' quality.

Taking on this problem head-on would entail addressing the quality of undergraduate education programmes offered by universities to achieve greater success for graduates in the job market. Papering over it would entail doing anything but that, which is what has been announced. Instead, what is being planned is yet another standardized quality test that will supposedly assess graduates' employability.

I find it notable that at a time when there is increasing realization that one's fitness for work is about so much more than academic achievement and subject matter knowledge but professionalism, communication, teamwork and work ethics. That is why many employers hire for the right attitude rather than technical ability. Employability is determined by the job market and I will go so far as to say that no government bureaucracy or procedure it comes up with, least of all ours, can assess employability even remotely.

Paradoxically, the prize for those who pass, those deemed good enough to find a job on their own strength, will be placement in industry. Instead of fixing the root cause of weak four-year undergraduate programs, the government

will fund further training courses. This sounds little different from the vocational training programs National Vocational and Technical Training Commission (NAVTTTC) was conducting and subsidizing under the 'Kamyab Jawan' programme that found many takers among university graduates.

What prevents universities from delivering educational programmes leading to graduate career success? It certainly is not a lack of regulatory oversight. The Higher Education Commission (HEC) recently published version 1.1 of its policy governing undergraduate programmes. Its most important aspect is that reaffirms the end of legacy two-year BA/BSc degrees, reclassifies them as Associate bachelor's degrees, and establishes four and five-year degrees as the new standard for bachelor's degrees. This is a welcome development.

The Pakistan Engineering Council (PEC) and the more recently established National Computing Education Accreditation Council (NCEAC) are together responsible for standard setting and accreditation of most technology


programs - the former for all manner of engineering and the latter for computer science (and allied) programmes. In an effort to earn more accreditation badges (eg, the Washington Accord, ACM) over the last few years, there has been significant growth in the number of constraints on these programmes. The effect this has had is to reduce the degrees of freedom universities have in designing their programmes. This is quite obvious in the NCEAC's 2023 curriculum requirements document, which goes on to list quite detailed structures of no less than 10 different programmes.

Clearly, our direction of travel has been towards greater involvement of regulators and lesser freedom for universities to decide what they want to teach. This is how even the most well-meaning attempts at innovation are arrested. One might argue that the regulator providing some "model program structures" could be useful for universities that lack the ability to create their own. To that I ask, is a university that is unable to develop its own curriculum worthy of its title?

Many universities have added schools of Individual Studies or similarly named schools or colleges that offer build-your-own-majors. Ng reports that between 2019 and 2021, individualized majors in the US grew by 3.0 per cent nationwide. The University of Texas at Austin saw a 41 per cent increase year-over-year in individualized majors in 2020-21.

The build-your-own-major movement hands the reins of power and responsibility of which courses to study from the university/regulator to the student. Building one's own major will not be the right choice for every student.

A carelessly or hastily designed major can handicap a student's prospects in the job market. That is why this path is only recommended for students whose interests are interdisciplinary, have a sense of what they want to do and are confident in their understanding of future trends. However, our regulations are not only decades away from allowing students such a degree of freedom but are, in fact, moving further away from it. -- Courtesy TheNews

Abraham's seed**F.S. Aijazuddin**

Sabbath caught Israel again off guard.

It should not have. Over the past five years alone, Israel has invested over \$80bn on its military defence. It must be galling, therefore, for the Israeli defence ministry to discover that 5,000 Hamas rockets could penetrate its expensive security shield with such precision.

In May 1987, an audacious German teenager, Matthias Rust, flew his Cessna aircraft from Helsinki and landed in Moscow's Red Square. The Soviet defence minister Sokolov and other top officials were forced to resign. The Israeli defence minister Yoav Gallant has no intention of going anywhere, except into the Gaza Strip, with a vengeance.

Netanyahu has told the residents of the Gaza Strip to leave before they are bombed into non-existence. It is a cruel warning, as callous as if the Nazis had called on the Jews living in the Warsaw Ghetto in 1940 to find alternative accommodation. The final death toll in that ghetto was estimated to be "300,000 killed by bullet or gas, combined with 92,000 victims of starvation and related diseases".

The two million trapped in the Gaza Strip have nowhere to go. Their exodus is not through a Red Sea parted by Moses. It has to be through once Pharaonic Egypt, or the Mediterranean patrolled by two US aircraft carriers, or into oblivion. The US, the UK and some European countries have learnt to Israel's defence. US Secretary of State Antony Blinken went overboard in Tel Aviv by declaring in Netanyahu's presence "I am a Jew". It was more than J.F. Kennedy's symbolic assertion: "Ich bin ein Berliner", and far beyond what Henry Kissinger would have admitted. Kissinger sublimated his Jewishness throughout his tightrope negotiations between the Arabs and Israel.

Russia has grown from its lair, warning the West that it too has interests in the area. The Iranian foreign minister has cautioned Israel that "violence could spread to other parts of the Middle East". The Iranians and the Saudis are holding talks "to prevent a broader surge in violence across the region". Interestingly, China has remained relatively silent. Is it waiting for the situation to deteriorate until its intervention as a peacemaker becomes inevitable? For once, public demonstrations in world capitals have supported the Palestinians that go beyond the token keffiyeh. The slogan 'Jesus Charlie' chanted in Paris has been replaced by 'Je suis Palestinien[ne]'.

Meanwhile, an Armageddon waits in the wings.

Some who spot a comedy in every tragedy will have a field day on the predicament of Scotland's First Minister Humza Yousaf. His mother-in-law is trapped in Gaza, unable to escape. Forty years ago, the British cricketer Ian Botham remarked caustically that Pakistan was "the kind of place to send your mother-in-law for a month, all expenses paid". Humza Yousaf must wish his mother-in-law had chosen anywhere — even Pakistan — for her foreign trip.

Those who have a reverence for God in whichever form will recall the Bhagavad Gita's opening verses. In them, Arjuna on the battlefield of Kurukshetra expresses despair at seeing his kinsmen mixed with friends and honoured elders: "Some this side, some that side ranged; and, seeing those opposed, such kith grown enemies [...] If we slay kinsfolk and friends for love of earthly power, Ahovai! What an evil fault it were!" Is the Gaza Strip to become a Semitic Kurukshetra, a battleground-turned-graveyard for the warring seed of Abraham? -- Courtesy Dawn

Pak earns \$448 million from IT services' export during July-August 2023

ISLAMABAD (APP): Pakistan earned US \$448.971 million by providing different Information Technology (IT) services in various countries during the first two months of the current fiscal year 2023-24.

This shows a growth of 5.15 per cent as compared with the US \$427.000 million earned through the provision of services during the corresponding months of the last fiscal year 2022-23, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) reported.

During the months under review, the export of computer services grew by 4.65 per cent as it surged from US \$345.470 million last year to US \$361.518 million during July-August 2023.

Among the computer services, the exports of software consultancy services witnessed an

increase of 196.04 per cent, from US \$0.328 million to US \$0.971 million this year while the export of hardware consultancy services also increased by 4.60 per cent, from US \$121.733 million to US \$127.329 million.

The export of repair and maintenance services decreased by 3.74 per cent from US \$0.187 million to US \$0.180 million whereas the export and imports of computer software services witnessed an increase of 10.17 per cent, from \$96.529 million to \$106.350 million.

Meanwhile, the export of information services during the months under review dipped by 27.94 per cent from US \$0.680 million to US \$0.490 million.

Among the information services, the exports of information-related services decreased

Exports increase by 25.54% to over Rs 2 trillion in Q1

ISLAMABAD (APP): The exports from the country in the rupee term witnessed an increase of 25.54 percent during the first quarter (Q1) of the current fiscal year as compared to the corresponding period of last year, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) reported.

Exports during July-September (2023-24) were recorded at Rs.2,013,533 million as against Rs.1,603,869 million during the corresponding period of last year, showing an increase of 25.54 percent, according to provisional data released by PBS.

On a year-on-year basis, the exports during

September 2023 increased by 31.27 percent and were recorded at Rs. 737,295 million compared to the exports of Rs.561,643 million in September 2022.

On a month-on-month basis, the exports increased by 6.06 percent when compared to the exports of Rs. 695,136 million in August 2023.

The main commodities of exports during August 2023 were commodities of exports during September, 2023 were knitwear (Rs. 103,029 million), readymade garments (Rs. 74,608 million), bed wear (Rs. 69,234 million), cotton cloth (Rs. 51,891 million), oil seeds, nuts and kernels (Rs.46,571 million), cotton

yarn (Rs.33,815 million), rice others (Rs.32,324 million), towels (Rs.25,116 million), rice basmati (Rs.19,008 million) and madeup articles excluding towels and bedwear (Rs.16,922 million).

On the other hand, imports during July-September (2023 FY2023-24) totaled Rs. 3,560,763 million as against Rs. 3,650,269 million during the corresponding period of last year, showing a decrease of 2.45%.

On a year-on-year basis, imports into Pakistan during September 2023 amounted to Rs.1,189,167 million as against Rs.1,219,956 million in September 2022.

Gold rates dip by Rs.200 to Rs.206,300 per tola



No place is safe in Gaza after Israel targets areas where civilians seek refuge, Palestinians say

DEIR al-BALAH: Even the "safe zones" of Gaza aren't safe for Palestinians.

Intense Israeli strikes Tuesday destroyed homes, hit a U.N. school sheltering the displaced and killed dozens of people in south and central Gaza.

"The situation is very, very difficult with artillery shelling and aerial bombardment on homes and defenseless people," said Abu Hashem Abu al-Hussein, who initially welcomed displaced families into his home in Khan Younis, but then fled to a U.N. school, where he hoped to find safety himself.

Israel had told Palestinians over the weekend to evacuate northern Gaza and Gaza City in advance of an expected ground invasion of the territory following an

attack by Hamas militants last week that killed at least 1,400 Israelis.

An estimated 600,000 people complied, packing what belongings they could and rushing to the south, where they squeezed into overcrowded U.N. shelters, hospitals, and homes in the approximately 14-kilometer (8-mile) long area south of the evacuation zone.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu accused Hamas on Tuesday of preventing people from "getting out of harm's way," and he again urged Palestinians to head "south to safe zones."


For some on Tuesday, there was no safety to be had there.

After midnight Tuesday morning, an explosion shattered Moataz al-Zre'e's windows. He

rushed outside to find his neighbor Ibrahim's entire home had been razed. The house next door was damaged also. At least 12 people from two families were killed, including three people from a family displaced from Gaza City.

"There was no (Israeli) warning," he said. Al-Zre'e's sister was gravely wounded and five of his paternal cousins were also injured following the attack. "Most of the killed were women and children."

Stunned residents took stock of the damage from another strike in Khan Younis. Samiha Zoarab looked around at the destruction in shock, as children rummaged through piles of rubble around the destroyed home, which lies amid a dense cluster of buildings.

China is building up its nuclear weapons arsenal faster than previous projections, a US report says

WASHINGTON: A Pentagon report on China's military power says Beijing is exceeding previous projections of how quickly it is building up its nuclear weapons arsenal and is "almost certainly" learning lessons from Russia's war in Ukraine about what a conflict over Taiwan might look like.

The report released Thursday also warns that China may be pursuing a new intercontinental missile system using conventional arms that, if fielded, would allow Beijing "to threaten conventional strikes against targets in the continental United States, Hawaii and Alaska."

The China report comes a month before an expected meeting between Chinese leader Xi Jinping and President Joe Biden on the sidelines of next month's Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summit in San Francisco.

Trinidad asks Canada to help stem worsening Caribbean violence

NEW YORK: Prime Minister of Trinidad and Tobago Keith Rowley urged Canada on Thursday to help Caribbean countries reinforce their security by helping with coastal patrols as the region deals with worsening gun violence.

Rowley spoke at a summit in Ottawa where leaders from Canada and Caribbean bloc Caribbean nations are expected to discuss climate change, economic development, migration, security and the conflict in Haiti.

"We have a worsening violent crime situation," said Rowley. "We are regarding it as a public health issue. There are few diseases killing as many in the Caribbean as arms and ammunition."

Rowley told a security session attended by his Canadian counterpart Justin Trudeau that more cooperation between Canada

and Caricom would be beneficial, and specified the need for better coastal patrols.

"It may very well be that in conversation with your people, we might be able to find some assistance in that," he said.

Rowley described an "explosion" in the use of illegal firearms, including assault rifles, contributing to the violent killings of around 50 people per day around the region.

Rowley said he had stressed the ease with which U.S.-made firearms are entering the Caribbean with U.S. representatives, and urged Canada to help by assisting with access to small coastal patrol crafts, cyber-security and police training. Trudeau pledged training for police in Haiti as they battle armed gangs estimated to control large parts of the country, as well as funding for equipment and vaccines.

Egypt rejects any displacement of Palestinians into Sinai, says Sisi

CAIRO: Egypt's President Abdel Fattah el-Sisi said on Wednesday that Egyptians would reject the forced displacement of millions of Palestinians into Sinai, adding that any such move would turn the peninsula into a base for attacks against Israel.

The Gaza Strip is effectively under Israeli control and Palestinians could instead be moved to Israel's Negev desert "till the militants are dealt with," Sisi told a joint news conference in Cairo with German Chancellor Olaf Scholz.

The border between Egypt's Sinai Peninsula and the Gaza Strip is the site of the only land crossing from the Palestinian territory that is not controlled by Israel.

Israel's unprecedented bombardment and siege of Gaza has raised fears that its 2.3 million residents could be forced southwards into Sinai.

WHO says medical aid 'loaded and ready to go' into Gaza

LONDON: Five trucks of medical supplies are ready at the border between Gaza and Egypt, the World Health Organization said on Thursday, welcoming Israel's announcement that it will not block the entry of aid into the Palestinian territory.

"Our trucks are loaded and ready to go," WHO director general Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus told a press conference. He said he hoped the supplies would be delivered as soon as the Rafah crossing opened, "hopefully tomorrow."

The delivery of aid is set to be the first after Israel said it would impose a "total blockade" on the narrow Gaza Strip that is home to 2.3 million people.

Protests across Muslim world after hospital strike

BEIRUT: Thousands rallied across the Arab and Muslim world on Wednesday to protest the deaths of hundreds of people by a Gaza Israeli attack on a Gaza hospital.

The strike provoked outrage and condemnation around the world, with protests on the streets of Iran, Jordan, Lebanon, Libya, Morocco, Tunisia, Turkiye, Yemen and the Occupied West Bank.

"Death to America, death to Israel," hundreds of Hezbollah supporters chanted at a rally in Beirut's southern suburbs. "The Israelis will try to target more hospitals, rescue workers, civil defence volunteers and Gaza's residents without flinching, in order to push Gaza's people out," senior Hezbollah official Hashem Safieddine told the demonstrators.

Protesters took to the streets of the West Bank city of Ramallah and Nablus, shouting "Free, free Palestine".

While in Tunisia, thousands of pro-Palestinian protesters rallied outside the French embassy, condemning Western support for Israel. Some waved Palestinian flags while others demanded the ambassador be expelled, accusing France of being among the Western "allies of the Zionists", AFP journalists reported.

Some 5,000 Jordanians gathered outside the Israeli embassy, demanding the expulsion of Israel's diplomatic mission. Security forces blocked off roads leading to the embassy but the size of the demonstration looked set to swell due to the anger in Jordan, which is home to many Palestinian refugees.

In the Syrian capital Damascus, hundreds of people with Palestinian flags gathered near parliament, many wearing T-shirts bearing the image of President Bashar al-Assad. "Martyrdom or victory," one banner read.

In Tehran in the early hours of Wednesday, protesters gathered outside the British and French embassies, an AFP correspondent said. "Death to France and England," protesters shouted, throwing eggs at the walls of the French embassy compound in the Iranian capital. The gatherings ended peacefully.

Japan invites Australia to join two military exercises for first time

TOKYO: Japan said on Thursday it had invited Australia to join two regular command post-military exercises conducted with the United States for the first time.

Japan's Minister of Defence Minoru Kihara said he discussed Australia's participation in the drills during talks in Tokyo with his counterpart from Canberra, Richard Marles.

"We are expanding defence cooperation with Australia in all areas. Our goal is that in times of emergency, we are able to work closely together," Kihara told reporters after the meeting.

The two countries also agreed to cooperate in defence equipment joint development.

Marles welcomed Australia's closer security ties with Japan, according to a transcript of his remarks released by the Canberra government.

Scientists test Fukushima fish after nuclear plant water release

IWAKI: A team of international scientists collected fish samples from a port town near Japan's crippled Fukushima nuclear plant on Thursday, seeking to assess the impact of the plant's recent release of treated radioactive water into the sea.

The study by the U.N.'s nuclear watchdog is the first since the water release began in August, a move that drew criticism from local fishermen and prompted China to ban all imports of marine products from Japan over food safety fears.

Scientists from China, South Korea, and Canada observed the col-

lection of fish samples delivered fresh off the boat at Hisanohama port, about 50 kilometres south of the plant which was destroyed in the 2011 earthquake and tsunami.

The samples will be sent to laboratories in each country for independent testing, the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) said.

"The Japanese government has requested that we do this and one of the reasons they want us to do this is to try and strengthen confidence in the data that Japan is producing," said Paul McGinnity, a research scientist with the IAEA overseeing the survey.

Hong Kong protester shot by police sentenced to nearly four years jail

HONG KONG: A man who was shot by Hong Kong police during mass pro-democracy protests in 2019 was sentenced to 47 months imprisonment by a district court on Wednesday on multiple charges, including rioting and perverting the course of justice.

Tsang Chi-kin was sentenced to 40 months for rioting, and 7 months for allegedly assaulting a policeman with a white stick on October 1, 2019, when hundreds of thousands took to the streets as part of protracted anti-China, pro-democracy protests, sparking a crisis for Beijing's Communist leaders.

Russia's Lavrov meets North Korea's Kim, slams 'dangerous' US policy

SEOUL: Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov met with North Korea's Kim Jong Un on Thursday, after slamming US policy towards the nuclear-armed state as "dangerous".

Lavrov hailed North Korea as a "close neighbour and long-time partner" in a meeting that lasted a little over an hour, Russia's foreign ministry said in a statement.

The veteran envoy's two-day visit is expected to lay the groundwork for a trip to the country by Russian President Vladimir Putin, who was invited by Kim last month at a high-profile summit in Russia's

far east. Earlier in the day, Lavrov lashed out at what he termed a "dangerous" US policy towards North Korea while touting the "new, strategic level" of relations between Moscow and Pyongyang.

"Like our North Korean friends, we are seriously worried about the intensification of military activity of the United States, Japan and South Korea in the region and by Washington's policies," Lavrov told journalists, according to Russian news agencies.

"We oppose this unconstructive and dangerous line," he said.

Lebanon's Hezbollah says it is stronger than before as border clashes rage

BEIRUT: Lebanon's Hezbollah warned its adversaries on Wednesday it was "thousands of times stronger" than before, as its fighters exchanged fire at the border with Israeli forces in violence fuelled by the war between Hamas and Israel.

The United States has warned Iran, which backs Hezbollah and the Palestinian group Hamas, against getting involved in the crisis, and deployed two aircraft carriers which it says aim to deter any state or non-state actor seeking to escalate the war.

Hezbollah official Hashem Safieddine, in a speech to thousands of supporters, said US President Joe Biden, Israeli Prime Minister Ben-

jamin Netanyahu and "malicious Europeans" should be careful.

"The response to the mistake you might make with our resistance will be resounding," he said.

"Because what we have is faith, and God is stronger than you, all your battleships, and all your weapons," he said, speaking at a rally called in response to a strike that killed hundreds of people at a Gaza hospital.

Hezbollah and Israel have been trading fire at the frontier on an almost daily basis since Hamas attacked Israel on Oct. 7 and Israel responded with fierce air strikes on Gaza.

Hezbollah said two of its fighters were killed in south Lebanon on Wednesday and a third was in a serious condition.

Egypt repairing roads at Gaza crossing ahead of aid delivery

CAIRO: Machinery to repair roads has been sent through the Rafah border crossing from Egypt into the Gaza Strip in preparation for the delivery of some of the aid stockpiled in Egypt's Sinai Peninsula, two security sources said on Thursday.

Rafah is the only crossing not controlled by Israel but has been out of operation since the first days of the conflict in Gaza following Israeli bombardments on the Palestinian side of the border.

The United States and Egypt have been pushing for a deal with Israel to get aid delivered to Gaza, and the White House said on Wednesday that it had been agreed for up to 20 trucks to pass through, with hopes for more trucks later.

Most of Gaza's 2.3 million residents depended on aid before the current conflict started on Oct. 7, about 100 trucks daily were providing humanitarian relief to the enclave, according to the United Nations. More than 100 trucks were waiting close to

the crossing on the Egyptian side on Thursday, though it was not expected that aid would enter before Friday, Egyptian security sources said. More aid is being held in the Egyptian city of Al Arish, about 45 km (28 miles) from Rafah.

Western governments have been negotiating for the evacuation of foreign passport holders from Gaza, something Egyptian officials have conditioned on aid getting in. Details of potential evacuations are unclear. On Wednesday, after talks with US President Joe Biden, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office said Israel would not block aid for civilians entering Gaza from Egypt, as long as those supplies do not reach Hamas. It said it would continue a blockade of humanitarian aid from Israel into Gaza until hostages held by Hamas were returned.

Israel's bombardment and siege of Gaza is in retaliation for a devastating Hamas incursion into Israel on Oct. 7 during which 1,400 people were killed and hostages were taken.

Scientists surprised by source of largest quake detected on Mars

WASHINGTON: Nasa's InSight lander detected the largest quake yet recorded on Mars, one with a 4.7 magnitude — fairly modest by Earth standards but strong for our planetary neighbour.

But a search for an impact crater came up empty, leading scientists to conclude that this quake was caused by tectonic activity — rumbling in the planet's interior — and giving them a deeper understanding about what makes Mars shake, rattle and roll.

"We concluded that the largest marsquake seen by InSight was tectonic, not an impact. Pakistan regrets US veto on UN Security Council action on Israeli-Palestinian conflict

UNITED NATIONS (APP): Pakistan Wednesday expressed regret over the United States veto on a U.N. Security Council resolution earlier in the day that would have called for "humanitarian pauses" to deliver life-saving aid to millions of traumatized people in embattled Gaza.

The resolution, sponsored by Brazil, had wide support and would have also condemned all violence against civilians. The vote in the 15-member Council was 12 votes in favour to one (United States) against, with Russia and China abstaining.

"Pakistan supports an immediate ceasefire," Ambassador Munir Akram, permanent representative of Pakistan to the UN, told an emergency meeting of the Security Council, which followed the vote. China, Russia and the UAE convened the meeting to discuss the worsening situation in the Gaza. Referring to today's vote, Ambassador Akram said, "Although the Brazilian resolution needed considerable improvement in our view, we were surprised at the Council's inability to adopt it due to the veto cast by a permanent member."

He added, "A heavy responsibility rests on those who have contributed to the prolongation of consistent bombing of Gaza's citizens that is taking place."

The Pakistani envoy also regretted that the Security Council was unable to issue a call for a ceasefire, due to the opposition and insufficient support for the resolution proposed by the Russia a day before, and for the Russian amendments to the Brazilian resolution calling for a ceasefire this morning.
