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Evidence of foreign weapons use against Pakistan by terrorists expose

RAWALPINDI (Online): Evidence of the use of foreign weapons brought from Afghanistan in terrorist attacks in Pakistan again came to light. According to security sources, the Pakistani army has been fighting the war of terrorism against the Tehrik Taliban Pakistan (TTP) for the past two decades. Weapons are also available. The supply of arms to TTP has caused significant damage to the security of the region, especially as terrorism has increased in Pakistan. The Baloch Liberation Army also attacked FC camps in Nushki and Panjgur districts in February 2022, using the same weapons. TTP also used American weapons in

the July 12, 2023 attack on Zhob Garrison. On September 2023, TTP terrorists armed with the latest American weapons attacked two army check posts in Chitral. In the Mianwali Air Base attack on November 4, the weapons recovered from the terrorists were foreign-made, including RPG-7, AK-74, M-4 and M-16/A4 were used on December 12 in Dera Ismail Khan. Night vision goggles and American rifles were also used by the terrorists in the terrorist attack in Daraban area. In the terrorist incident in Tank on December 15, modern American weapons were found with the terrorists. In the attack, 3 policemen were martyred and 5 Terrorists went to hell, terror-

ists used M16/A2, HE Grenades, AK-47. On December 13, customs and security forces recovered modern American weapons from a vehicle coming from Afghanistan to Pakistan. Arms were covered in sacks of onions. The weapons included modern American made M4, American rifle, grenades. Pakistan's smuggling of advanced American weapons from Afghanistan and the TTP's use of American weapons against the security forces and the Pakistani people are a big question mark on the claims of the Afghan Transitional Government not to use them against its own land, Pakistan. According to Eurasian Times, US-made weapons are also being

used in the operations of TTP terrorists in Pakistan. Pentagon said the U.S. delivered a total of 427,300 combat weapons to the Afghan military, with 300,000 remaining at the time of withdrawal, which has seen a massive increase in terrorism in the region over the past two years. United States provided \$18.6 billion in equipment to the Afghan National Defense and Security Forces between 2005 and August 2021. These weapons helped the TTP carry out cross-border terrorist attacks after the U.S. withdrawal. All these facts indicate that the Afghan regime is not only arming the TTP but also providing a safe haven for other terrorist organizations.



ECP resumes DROs, ROs training ahead of General Elections

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) has resumed nationwide training for District Returning Officers (DROs) and Returning Officers (ROs), with a focus on election procedures, rules, and other administrative aspects. An ECP spokesperson stated that the training, led by senior commission officers, will conclude for ROs on Monday (December 18) and for DROs on Tuesday (December 19). The extensive training for 144 District Returning Officers (DROs) and 859 Returning Officers (ROs) commenced on December 13 but was initially paused due to Lahore High Court orders prompted by a petition from PTI objecting to selecting election supervisory staff from the executive. However, it later resumed following orders from the Supreme Court of Pakistan.

PPP won't make alliance with PTI: Asif Zardari

PESHAWAR (INP) - Former President Asif Ali Zardari on Sunday said that the PPP would not make an alliance with the embattled Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI). He expressed these views during a meeting with Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Governor Ghulam Ali and party leaders at the Governor House. The discussion also touched upon matters concerning the allocation of tickets. The former president asked a prompt resolution of internal party differences. As per sources, the PPP co-chairman Zardari particularly urged party leaders not to form an alliance with Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) in the upcoming elections. He stressed that de-

terminations regarding alliances with other parties would be determined by the local leadership. Earlier on Saturday Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) declared its departure from "old-school politics", as it commences its election campaign on Dec 27 with an inaugural gathering in Garhi Khuda Bakhsh, Larkana. Following an important party meeting chaired by PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari, prominent PPP leaders Sherry Rehman, Shazia Marri, and Sharjeel Inam Memon addressed a press conference, announcing that Bilawal himself would lead the party's campaign from Dec 27 - the day marking the 16th anniversary of the tragic passing of former

prime minister Benazir Bhutto. "PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari has underscored that the party's electoral campaign will pivot towards positivity rather than negativity, breaking away from conventional political practices," Sharjeel Inam Memon said. The PPP leaders told media that the PPP chairman and the parliamentary committee expressed appreciation for the Supreme Court's decision on an appeal filed by the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) against an order of the Lahore High Court that suspended a notification regarding the appointments of district returning officers (DROs) and returning officers (ROs) from within the bureaucracy.

Pakistan to observe day of mourning on demise of Amir of Kuwait

PM Kakar to travel to Kuwait to convey condolences on death of Amir Sheikh Nawaf

ISLAMABAD (APP): Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar has declared Monday, December 18 as a day of mourning in Pakistan as an expression of fraternal solidarity on behalf of the people and government of Pakistan, with the royal family, the government, and people of Kuwait on the sad demise of Amir of Kuwait His Highness Sheikh Nawaf Al Ahmad Al Jaber Al Sabah. The national flag shall fly at half mast throughout the coun-

try on the day. Meanwhile Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar on Monday will undertake a one-day visit to Kuwait. He will convey to the Royal Family, the government and the people of Kuwait the sympathies and condolences of the Government and people of Pakistan on the sad demise of Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Nawaf Al Ahmad Al Jaber Al Sabah, Foreign Office Spokesperson said on X on Sunday.

FM urges UN to ensure implementation of resolutions on Kashmir

ISLAMABAD (INP): Caretaker Foreign Minister Jilil Abbas Jilani has called on the UN Security Council to ensure full implementation of its resolutions on Jammu and Kashmir dispute. According to a press release of the Foreign Office, the Foreign Minister in his letters to the leadership of the United Nations, Organization of Islamic Cooperation and the European Union has invited their attention to the illegality of the recent judgment by the Supreme Court of India on the status of Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir. The Foreign Minister also called on the interna-

tional organizations to urge India to end the grave and systematic human rights violations in IIOJK and to reverse all its illegal and unilateral actions undertaken since 5 August 2019. In these letters, the Foreign Minister underscored that under international law, domestic legislation and judicial verdicts cannot be invoked to determine the final status of an internationally-recognized disputed territory. He also condemned the unlawful measures of the Indian authorities to consolidate their occupation of IIOJK and persistent suppression of the rights of the people of Jammu and Kashmir.

Media urged for factual reporting on CPEC, countering propaganda

ISLAMABAD (APP): Speakers at the training workshop here on Sunday called upon the Pakistani media to engage in objective and factual reporting on the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) and counter the negative propaganda against the game-changer project. The journalists are the source of information for the public and their impartial reporting can convey authentic information about CPEC to the people of Pakistan, they said. The speakers expressed these remarks during a three-day training workshop organized by the Center for Democracy and Climate Studies (CDCS) for the journalists of Baluchistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. Bao Zhong, Counsellor of the Political and Media Section, Embassy of China to Pakistan while

LAHORE (INP): Legal expert and disgruntled PPP stalwart Sardar Latif Khosa has joined the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI). Latif Khosa, the former Punjab governor, confirmed his decision to join the PTI during a press conference in Lahore on Sunday. The PTI also officially announced his membership on X, erstwhile Twitter, sharing a video of Latif Khosa being welcomed into the party, draped in the customary flag.

SC to hear Imran, Qureshi's bail plea in cipher cases

ISLAMABAD (Online): Supreme Court (SC) will hear the cases of Imran Khan and Shah Mahmood Qureshi's cipher bails on December 22. A three-member regular bench headed by Justice Sardar Tariq Masood will conduct the hearing. Notices have been issued to the parties. Trial of the most important bails will be held despite the winter holidays. It may be recalled that the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) had filed a challan in the court on September 30, allegedly asking Imran Khan and Shah Mahmood Qureshi to reveal the secret text of the cipher under Sections 5 and 9 of the Official Secrets Act. He was declared the main accused in the case of losing the cipher. FIA cited 27 witnesses in the challan, main witness Azam Khan has already testified before FIA against Imran Khan.

Effective CT plan

The state has failed to evolve an effective counterterrorism strategy to deal with the resurgent militant threat, with the result that the outgoing year has seen an alarming rise in terrorist attacks, and an unacceptable loss of life, particularly among security personnel.

Just days after at least 23 army men were martyred in Dera Ismail Khan in the highest casualty attack this year, five more security personnel fell in the line of duty on Friday in separate attacks in KP's Tank and Khyber districts.

In the Tank attack, three policemen were martyred after militants stormed the local police headquarters. In Khyber, two FC men were martyred when terrorists struck a checkpoint. The fact that these attacks took place so soon after a major act of terrorism reflects a considerable security and intelligence lapse.

The area in focus — the southern part of KP and neighbouring districts in Balochistan and Punjab — has become a new hotbed of militancy, particularly after the Afghan Taliban returned to power in Kabul in 2021, though it should be remembered that this region was amongst the locations from where the banned TTP initially sprang. A new actor has emerged from the nebulous world of militancy in the form of Tehreek-i-Jihad Pakistan, believed to be a TTP front. This outfit has been involved in some of the deadliest attacks this year.

While it is true that militant groups often take on new monikers, their leadership, networks and goals remain largely the same. Therefore, CT efforts should not be distracted by names, and focus on the leaderships of these groups, their sources of funding and supplies.

The state has directed much of its wrath at the Afghan Taliban government for failing to rein in anti-Pakistan terrorists believed to be active across the Durand Line. While Kabul's rulers certainly cannot be absolved of their duty to prevent militants from jeopardising Pakistan's security, the responsibility for securing our territory is ours alone, and we cannot blame others for our lapses.

By all means, Kabul must be told that Afghan soil cannot be used to harbour terrorists, and diplomatic pressure should continue if the Taliban fail to deliver. But implementing an effective CT strategy is the government's duty. It should not be forgotten that many of those involved in acts of terrorism are locals, while the socioeconomic marginalisation of the vulnerable geographic area has also fuelled radicalisation. Therefore, a rejuvenated NAP is required to quell the violence, while longer-term efforts are needed to address the deprivation of the affected areas. Pakistan can ill afford a new full-blown militant insurgency. Unless steps are taken now to address the threat, that is exactly what stares us in the face. The caretaker set-up and the incoming government must deal with this threat resolutely.

Pak-US relations

At the outset, it is important to recognise that the US has already chosen its strategic partner in South Asia: India. The US requires India's cooperation in pursuit of its priority national security objective: strategic competition with China and containing the latter's economic rise. The US might perceive Pakistan to be a hurdle in two respects: its close friendship with China and its mutually hostile ties with India. This bigger picture is not likely to change soon.

To complicate matters, perceptions about Pakistan in the US and the latter's image in Pakistan have been deeply bruised by the US-led 'war on terror'. Many Pakistanis believe that America dragged Pakistan into a war that was not ours; one which caused enormous human and financial losses to our country. There is a view that America befriends Pakistan only when it requires help to advance its security agenda. For its part, the US perceives Pakistan as a country that impeded its military victory in Afghanistan by providing sanctuaries to the Taliban. US officialdom also accused Pakistan of playing a double game.

Nevertheless, the US, it appears, would still like to engage with Pakistan for two reasons. First, it would not like to see Pakistan completely slip into China's sphere of influence. Secondly, the US might adopt a more balanced approach to South Asia because of India's tendency to exercise its strategic autonomy, in-

cluding ties with America's rivals, such as Russia.

However, the process of boosting ties with the US will be incremental, with no likelihood of high-level structured engagement at this stage. Nor is any major initiative expected from either side.

Fortunately, people-to-people relations between the two countries has survived the roller coaster nature of government-to-government ties. Both countries will benefit from investing in areas that enjoy popular support in Pakistan. For instance, IT professionals would want to strengthen their links with Silicon Valley. Pakistani students would welcome enhanced opportunities for higher education in American universities. And the US healthcare system has been a preferred destination for Pakistani physicians for several decades.

Meanwhile, US agriculture experts are held in esteem for their contribution to creating crop varieties in Pakistan in the early life of the country. Even today, agriculture remains a potential area of bilateral cooperation. Corporate America might also want to invest in Pakistan's rich mines and minerals industry, particularly in Balochistan.

It would be in our interest to attract investments into the country from the West to build their stakes in the stability of Pakistan. This can be done by facilitating further people-to-people ties and opening new special windows or economic zones for businesses from the West with incentives comparable to those offered to any other foreign investor in Pakistan.

The revival of close economic relations with the US should not be a zero-sum exercise in the context of Pakistan's ties with China, which remain deep-rooted. It would be a folly to view these two important relationships as

an either-or choice for Pakistan. It is heartening that the leadership of the US and China have announced that there will not be another Cold War and that they would not like to see the world divided into camps.

Pakistan's pivot to geo-economics will also be facilitated if we maintain close ties with all countries, including the US and China, to help Pakistan bolster its economic growth and development. Those who argue that Pakistan should pick its side and not sail in two rival boats are not factoring in the point that in a multipolar world, multi-alignments are the order of the day.

In seeking to enhance our relations with the US, it would be important to reorient this bilateral relationship from a counterterrorism and security-centric angle to the mutually beneficial fields of trade and investment, underpinned by strong people-to-people ties.

China, which has been a reliable development partner all these years, is not likely to resent Pakistan's close economic ties with the US. Yet, it would be in our interest to keep Chinese and other investors in Pakistan on board with our desire to diversify the sources of investment in the country. The latter would also be better served by adopting transparency and equal opportunity approach for all investment projects.

The Special Investment Facilitation Council has opened an attractive 'single window' for investments by facilitating entrepreneurs in the sectors of agriculture, mines and minerals, IT, and energy. It would be useful if, besides investment partners from the Gulf countries, corporate America also took advantage of the SIFC to invest in Pakistan, given its high-dividend market. -- Courtesy Dawn

Bad business

In my lectures about audience metrics — who and how audiences view and share stories — I always bring up Freaks and Geeks, a 1999 TV show that was cancelled after just one season.

The show enjoys cult status today but met a terrible fate for various reasons, including a difficult relationship between the creators and the network. Its air time was unsuitable — Saturday 8pm when teenagers, the prime target audience, did not watch TV. It was competing against Who Wants to be a Millionaire, a popular game show which drew 18 million viewers followed by a new show, Friends, which had 14m. The 12 episodes of Freaks and Geeks, which had an erratic schedule as it went on a few weeks' break, had 6.7m views, so the network didn't think it was worth renewing.

Every year I bring up this show, fewer students know about it, but inevitably every student who watches it returns to tell me they loved it. And ask why it didn't work. Popularity is not an indicator of quality. It is also not the same as truth.

This may help us understand why the well-known anchor Mehdi Hasan's show on the American cable network MSNBC was cancelled. The British political commentator is known for his tough style of interviews; he challenged guests, was progressive and humanised Palestinians — things you don't see on TV news, at least not in the US. This is why most people believe Hasan's pro-Palestinian stance caused the show's cancel-

lation.

Ayman Mohyeldin's programme will be extended to two hours to replace Hasan's show so one can't cite anti-Muslim discrimination. Hasan himself has not spoken on the issue other than to echo the MSNBC press release on the issue. Many 'media insiders', however, say his show was axed because it had poor ratings.

Of course, it did. It aired on the weekends when rarely anyone watches TV, a medium with fewer takers. This is probably hard to believe given how you've likely come across at least a few of Hasan's clips on social media — where he's obliterating Israel's point of view. The audiences for TV and social media are different, with different expectations. Advertisers, however, have one expectation.

Advertisers don't want controversial TV anchors challenging dominant views. Neither do media owners who want to protect their business interests that audiences may know about. When it was owned by General Electric, MSNBC was pro-Iraq and even fired Phil Donahue, who was anti-war and promoted those voices, when few dared to question the Bush administration. An internal company memo described Donahue then as a "difficult public face for NBC in a time of war" giving "a home for the liberal anti-war agenda at the same time that our competitors are waving the flag at every opportunity". Then too they cited poor ratings as the reason for his show's cancellation but we know General Electric was a huge defence contractor.

Donahue reflected on his firing 10 years later. "They were terrified of the anti-war voice," he said in 2013. "Anti-war voices were not popular. And if you're General Electric, you certainly don't want an anti-war voice on a cable channel that you

own; Donald Rumsfeld is your biggest customer." He also described how audiences perceived anti-war voices. "We were scolds. We weren't patriotic. American people disagreed with us. And we weren't good for business." News media is a profit-driven business. That model, which does not practise journalism in the public interest, creates a less-informed citizenry. In his book Democracy Without Journalism the media scholar Victor Pickard writes how journalism is at the mercy of the marketplace. News organisations supported by advertising will continue to be in trouble especially in the face of economic uncertainty. The market decides the news agenda and how much news audiences will receive. He also says social media companies profit from disinformation.

It's why we need to amplify voices calling for public journalism. Pickard's book reminds us that such models exist and he advocates for government intervention in ensuring the public has access to information that allows for democracy to function. A government supporting free press may sound like anathema but Pickard writes how governments have invested in communication systems, like the postal system, that gave people access to information. Governments fund public broadcast systems everywhere; it can work provided journalism reflects the communities it is meant to serve, not the media owners. We will soon — hopefully — have a new government. I request them to read Pickard's prescription: create a robust public fund to support a public media system, one that is run by partnership of policymakers, academics and journalists who want to strengthen democracy, not the market, not the owners, not the politicians' rich friends. -- Courtesy Dawn

Business community, experts hail govt's economic strategies

ISLAMABAD (APP): Despite challenges, the comprehensive strategies implemented by the caretaker government have led to notable economic progress, evident through various indicators and recognized by both the business community and experts.

The business community and economic experts described the reduction in oil prices stability of the exchange rate and outstanding performance of Pakistan Stock Exchange (PSX) as positive for the country's economy.

Talking to APP, they said, the petrol price has come down from Rs 331.38 in January 2023 to Rs 267.34 now, showing a decrease of Rs.65 rupees,

adding it would result in a decrease in the inflation rate; further strengthening the exchange rate and lead PSX towards more positive performance, besides helping in promoting local market and external sectors of the economy.

President of Federation Pakistan Chamber of Commerce and Industry (FPCCI), Irfan Iqbal Sheikh told APP that the government had decided to give the benefit of the fall in international prices to the industry and the domestic consumers.

The President of FPCCI said that it will have a good impact on domestic industry including internal and external sectors.

Sheikh said that stability in the exchange rate, which has crossed the limit of Rs 300 and is now between Rs 280 and Rs285, is proof of the success of the government's administrative measure.

He said that there has been an upward trend in the stock exchange for the last few months, which is pleasing.

The President said that the government needs to take more measures to give industry businesses a chance to grow in the country.

Talking to APP, President ICCL, Ahsan Zafar Bakhtawri said that the reduction in petrol prices will reduce inflation in the country and more buyers will come to the market.

Transport fares reduced in Faisalabad

FAISALABAD (APP): The district administration has made reduction in transport fares from 3 to 5 percent for passengers of various routes.

North Korea fires suspected ballistic missile, condemns US for raising tensions

SEOUL: North Korea fired an unidentified ballistic missile on Sunday, Japan's Coast Guard and the South Korean military said, as Pyongyang condemned US-led military shows of force as tantamount to "a preview of a nuclear war".

The missile was launched towards the sea off North Korea's east coast, according to the South Korean Joint Chiefs of Staff.

About 20 minutes after initially reporting the launch, the Japanese coast guard said the missile had already fallen.

It appeared to have fallen outside Japan's exclusive economic zone (EEZ), broadcaster NTV

reported. No further details were immediately available.

The launch came after warnings from officials in Seoul and Tokyo that nuclear-armed North Korea was preparing to test-fire a missile, including one of its longest-range inter-continental ballistic missiles (ICBMs) this month.

All of North Korea's ballistic missile activities are banned by United Nations Security Council resolutions, though Pyongyang defends them as its sovereign right to self-defence.

Less than half an hour after the launch, North Korean state media carried a statement from the defence ministry criticising "military gangsters" in the United States and South Korea for raising tensions with drills, displays of force and nuclear war planning.

The statement by an unnamed ministry spokesman cited the arrival of the US nuclear-powered submarine USS Missouri in the South Korean port city of Busan on Sunday.

"The armed forces of the DPRK will thoroughly neutralise the US and its vassal forces' attempt to ignite a nuclear war and thus reliably ensure peace and security in the Korean peninsula," the statement said, using the initials of North Korea's official name, the Democratic People's Republic of Korea.

61 migrants drown in shipwreck off Libya: IOM

LIBYA: Sixty-one migrants, including women and children, drowned following a shipwreck off Libya, the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) in Libya said.

IOM, in a post on social media platform X, quoted survivors as saying the boat, carrying around 86 people, departed the Libyan city of Zwara, about 110 km (68 miles) from the capital, Tripoli.

"The central Mediterranean continues to be one of the world's most dangerous migration routes," IOM said.

Severe storm strikes coastal city in Argentina, at least 13 dead

BUENOS AIRES: At least 13 people have been killed in Argentina, a local city mayor said on Saturday, following a severe electrical storm that struck along the South American country's Atlantic coast.

The city is near the southern tip of Buenos Aires province, one of Argentina's top grain-producing regions.

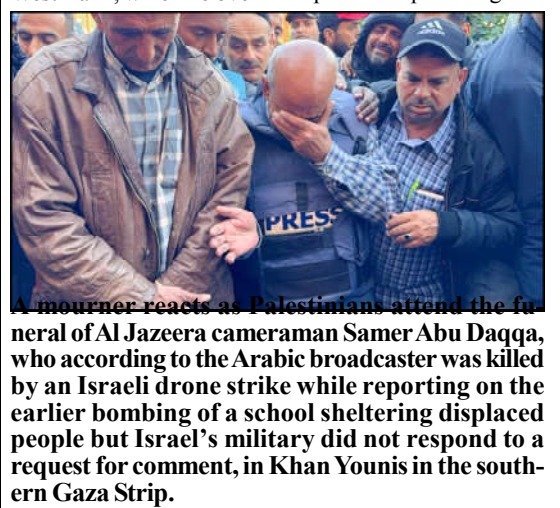
US wants shakeup of Palestinian Authority to run Gaza

WASHINGTON: A succession of top US officials have travelled to the West Bank in recent weeks to meet with Mahmoud Abbas in the hope he can overhaul his unpopular Palestinian Authority enough to run Gaza after the crisis.

An architect of the 1993 Oslo peace accords with Israel that raised hopes of Palestinian statehood, Abbas has seen his legitimacy steadily undermined by Israeli settlement building in the occupied West Bank, which he oversees. Many Palestinians now regard his administration as corrupt, undemocratic and out of touch.

President Joe Biden has made it clear that he wants to see a revitalised Palestinian Authority which Abbas has run since 2005 — take charge in Gaza once the crisis is over, unifying its administration with the West Bank.

Jake Sullivan, Biden's national security adviser, met with Abbas on Friday, becoming the latest senior US official to urge him to implement rapid change.



Zuma says he will not vote for ANC in South Africa's election

Russia is not interested in extending Black Sea grain deal - RIA

MOSCOW: Russia has no interest in extending the Black Sea grain deal, the RIA news agency reported on Sunday, citing Russia's agriculture minister Dmitry Patrushev.

He added that to a large extent this is a political decision, but Russia will continue to export its grain, as it has its buyers.

"Our grain export volumes, taking into account the winding down of the grain deal, have by no means fallen, they even slightly increased," RIA quoted Patrushev as saying.

Russia withdrew in July from the deal which had allowed Ukraine to safely export grain from its Black Sea ports.

Russia says it quit the deal because the arrangement was not delivering grain to the poorest countries, and because it still faces barriers to its own exports of grain and fertiliser.

Italy's Meloni takes aim at influencer Ferragni over misleading claims

ROME: Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni on Sunday criticised those who make money from misleading charity claims, in a clear reference to a recent antitrust sanction against the country's top influencer Chiara Ferragni. On Friday, Italy's antitrust authority imposed a 1.075 million euro (\$1.17 million) fine on companies controlled by Ferragni as a result of a probe into misleading advertising on Christmas cakes last year.

Ferragni, a businesswoman and fashion influencer with nearly 30 million followers on Instagram, said the fine was unjust and she would appeal it.

"The real models to follow are not the influencers who make a lot of money by wearing clothes and showing bags ... or even promoting expensive cakes that make people believe they are charitable," Meloni said, without explicitly mentioning Ferragni.

Australia confident of end to China wine tariffs early in 2024

SYDNEY: Australia's government on Sunday said it was confident punitive tariffs on Australian wine introduced by China in 2021 would be lifted early next year.

Mushaal Mullick says: 'Special Kashmir advisory body' to be formed soon for peaceful solution of Kashmir cause

ISLAMABAD (APP): Special Assistant to Prime Minister for Human Rights and Women Empowerment, Mushaal Husseini Mullick Sunday announced that a special Kashmir advisory committee would be constituted soon on every district level to mobilize and for peaceful solution of Kashmir cause.

Talking to PTV news channel, she said that a multi-faceted board comprising top national and international diplomatic experts would play their active role for this advisory committee on Kashmir issue, adding, the committee would offer comprehensive recommendations to the Government in response to the Indian Supreme Court's decision.

She also urged youth to tap modern tools of IT to help influence the world against war crimes and human rights violation of Kashmiris, adding, youth should devote their time and energies for the promotion of Kashmir cause and raise their voice for the oppressed and subjugated

people of Indian Illegally Occupied & Kashmir (IIOJ&K).

She said the innocent people of Kashmir had been made alien in their own homeland where occupation forces were killing, torturing and maiming the youth, while the women were being dishonored.

She asked students to intensify their political, diplomatic and moral support to their brothers and sisters in IIOJK, who were struggling for their inherent right to self-determination, adding, overseas youth should send online petitions against Indian government who are busy in demographic changes in Kashmir.

She also demanded international organization to pay attention and demilitarize Kashmir under UN's resolution, adding, "Human rights violations and demographic changes will not disappear if a government blocks access to international observers and then invests in a public relations campaign to offset any unwanted

Petrol price declines by Rs 64.04 per litre in three months

ISLAMABAD (APP): The caretaker government has decreased the price of petrol by Rs. 64.04 per litre and diesel by Rs. 52.99 per litre during the last three months.

A chart shared by the Ministry of Energy and Petroleum on the official social media account shows that the price of petrol at Ex-depot was Rs. 331.38 per litre in October, and now, the price has decreased to Rs. 267.34 per litre in the current month, directly benefiting consumers and alleviating the financial burden on fuel expenses. Similarly, the price of diesel in October was Rs. 329.18 per litre and has now dropped to Rs. 276.19 per litre, providing consumers with a benefit of Rs. 52.99. The drop in the price of petroleum products is expected to contribute significantly to easing the financial impact on consumers.

Thorough investigations needed into supply of US weaponry to terrorists: Durrani

ISLAMABAD (INP): Former federal minister and senior politician Muhammad Ali Durrani has said that source and trafficking of the latest American weapons and technology to terrorists in the war against Pakistan was matter of grave concern.

Demanding thorough investigations into the matter, he questioned, "Where are the terrorists fighting against Pakistan obtaining the latest American weaponry?" In a statement issued here on Sunday, Muhammad Ali Durrani said that it was imperative to undertake these investigations to root out terrorists and eliminate the scourge of terrorism.

The United States of America (USA) should assist Pakistan with cutting-edge technology which was in the interests of both the US and global security, he emphasized. "The possibility of another 9/11 cannot be ruled out if the supply of the latest weaponry to terrorists is not cur-

tailed," he urged. Durrani said that the availability of sophisticated arms to terrorists is a matter of concern for regional and global security.

"A new war is being orchestrated against Pakistan through the latest American arms," he said. In such circumstances, the US should support Pakistan with latest technology in the war against terrorism. "It is the interest of the US to play a role for peace in the region," he said.

The former minister said that American weapons and technology are being used against Palestinians by Israel and against Pakistan by terrorists. The presence of such weaponry and technology among terrorists raises numerous questions that cannot be ignored, he added. Senator Durrani said that the responsibility lies with the United Nations and especially with the United States to prevent the supply of new technology and weapons to terrorists.

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) is scheduled to resume the hearing of the plea filed by PTI founding member Akbar S. Babar against intra-party elections on December 18 (Monday).

The Commission revealed the cause list for the PTI intra-party case, setting the hearing for December 18. A five-member ECP bench will examine objections and issues raised against PTI's intra-party elections with key applicants such as Akbar S. Babar, Raja Tahir Nawaz, and Naureen Farooq. Barrister Ali Zafar, representing PTI, is expected to present the concluding arguments before the bench.

The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) has summoned Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) chairman Gohar Ali Khan and several other party members, including Chief Election Commissioner Niazullah Niazi, Umar

Ayub, Haleem Adil Sheikh, Yasmin Rashid, Ali Amin Gandapur, and RO Central Secretariat Sardar Masroof, in the intra-party election case.

The notice highlighted that the PTI intra-party elections did not seem to align with the party's constitution, Rules 2020, and the Election Act 2017. It emphasized that the ECP issues a certificate only when all the legal prerequisites for conducting intra-party elections under the Election Rules 2017 are met.

On December 2, following the ECP's instructions, PTI conducted its intra-party elections, resulting in the election of Barrister Gohar Khan as the party's new chairman.

PTI's founding member, Akbar S. Babar, referred to the intra-party polls as a drama. In a video statement, he expressed concern that the PTI has jeopardized the party and its election symbol, the 'bat.'

ISLAMABAD (APP): Wafaqi Mohtasib (Federal Ombudsman), Ejaz Ahmad Qureshi has directed the investigation officers and the heads of federal agencies to ensure timely implementation of Wafaqi Mohtasib decisions since no slackness would be tolerated on this count.

He said that 178000 complaints have so far been decided since January 2023 and the number of complaints may touch an all-time high figure of 190000 by the year-end.

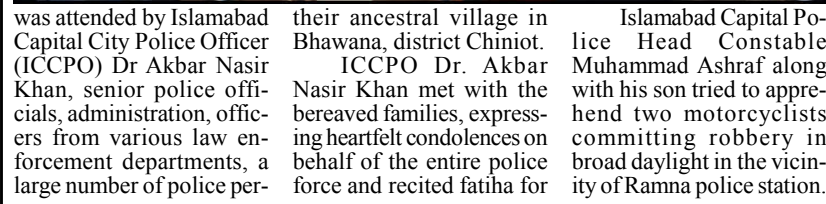
The funeral ceremony

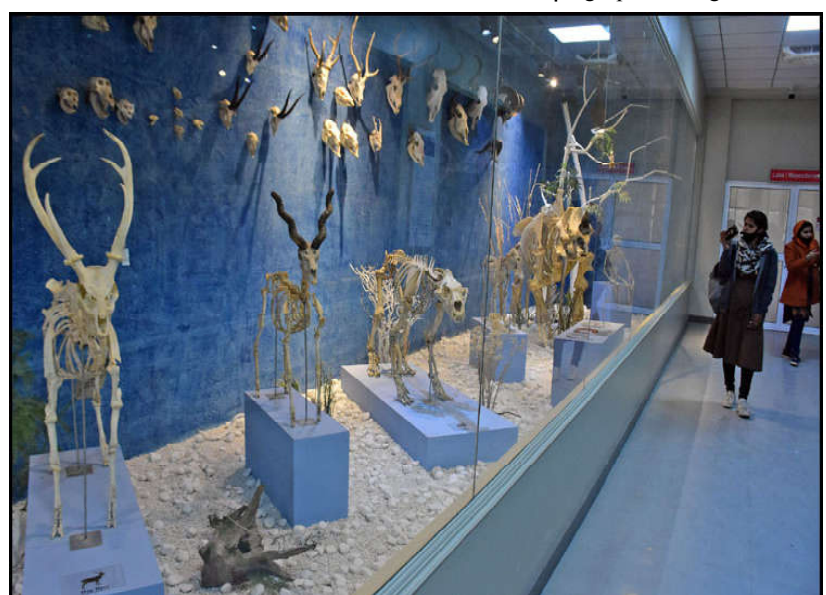
Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) Islamabad has registered a data of 229 house servants of 551 houses from Secretariat Police Station jurisdiction.

Commuters demand extension in Blue Bus plying route

ISLAMABAD (APP): A number of daily commuters residing in different housing societies located near the Islamabad Expressway on Sunday demanded an extension in the route covered by Blue Metro Bus Service up to the PWD interchange as a huge chunk of road widening and construction work had been completed on one of the busiest arteries of the twin cities.

The residents of Korang, Pakistan, Jinnah Garden, PWD, Sohan, and other adjacent societies told APP that the authorities have unveiled the blue bus service route plan from Rawat but deferred it due to the condition of the road and the subsequent construction and expansion work from Korang Bridge to Rawat.

But now that the road widening work has been completed in this area, a considerable number of

daily commuters should also be facilitated by the bus service. The mass transport facility should also reach the periphery of outer areas located within 30 km of the main downtown, they opined.

Their demand coincides with the Capital Development Authority's decision to roll out 160 electric buses on 13 different routes in the capital city.

Haji Abdul Qadoos, a trader in PWD, said that the introduction of blue bus service on the Expressway was a significant initiative to provide much-needed transport facilities to the masses, but after the completion of hassle-free traffic movement on the newly constructed multi-lane road from Korang Bridge to Naval Anchorage Housing Society, its route should be immediately expanded to PWD interchange.
