CM forms technical body to evaluate rates of Karachi Safe City project equipment, software

KARACHI (APP): Caretaker Sindh Chief Minister Justice (Retd) Maqbool Baqar presided over a decisive meeting on the Karachi Safe City Project here at CM house on Monday and in principle, approved the project subject to the rationalization of the rates of different equipment and software and the payment of taxes.

"I want to start work on the much delayed and needed project, but as the custodian of public funds, it is my responsibility to

ensure transparent utilization. Therefore, the NRTC must satisfy me and my team regarding the estimates," he said and constituted a technical committee under Secretary Home Iqbal Memon to evaluate equipment prices and compare them with the market price.

The committee would select its technical members from universities, and they would be empowered to delete duplications and insert missing items. However, the Chairman of P&D, Shakil Mangnejo, would continue

his sessions with the NRTC team on different components of the project and their prices. The chief minister discussed every item and its cost with the NRTC representatives, and they agreed to reduce the cost of the equipment and software and delete the items included in duplication.

"In principle, we have decided to approve the PC-I [by the P&D], but even then, a technical committee, to be selected from the universities' experts headed by the Home Secretary,

Rules out any negotiations PM asks terrorists to make 'unconditional surrender'

Says no person would be allowed to take the law into his hands, only the State had the legitimate right to use armed power through its security forces

ISLAMABAD (APP): Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar on Monday warned terrorist groups in the country to make an "unconditional surrender", saying the State would not negotiate with them.

"The State will not show any leniency towards the terrorists who committed violence and killed innocent citizens," he said in an interaction

with the families of martyrs here at the Interior Ministry, where he earlier launched the country's new visa policy.

PM Kakar categorically said that no person would be allowed to take the law into his hands, adding that only the State had the legitimate right to use armed power through its security forces.

"No one should have any doubt about the stance

of the State against terrorists," he said. "All organs of the State have the clarity to remain persistent against militancy."

He said any damage incurred in the past by giving a lenient space to the militants would be mitigated.

The prime minister said if someone wanted to denounce terrorism must seek forgiveness from the families of the martyrs,

who had paid the ultimate price.

"We cannot compensate those who lost their loved ones, but can make a gesture to acknowledge and honour their invaluable sacrifices," he added.

PM Kakar said the reward for the martyrs' souls rested with Allah Almighty, however, it was the responsibility of the society to honour them with a distinguished status.

'Travesty of justice': Pakistan rejects Indian SC's verdict on Kashmir

India has no right to make unilateral decisions on the status of this disputed territory against the will of the Kashmiri people and Pakistan: FM Jilani

ISLAMABAD (APP): Pakistan on Monday categorically rejected the judgement, announced by the Supreme Court of India on the status of Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IIOJK), terming it "another manifestation of the pliant judiciary under India's ruling dispensation."

Foreign Minister Jilil Abbas Jilani, during a press conference at the Ministry

of Jammu and Kashmir, termed Jammu and Kashmir an "internationally-recognized dispute, which remained on the agenda of the UN Security Council for over seven decades."

Jilani said the final disposition of Jammu and Kashmir was to be made in accordance with relevant United Nations Security Council Resolutions and as per the aspirations of Kashmiri people.

President strongly rejects Indian SC verdict

ISLAMABAD (APP): President Dr Arif Alvi on Monday strongly rejected the Indian Supreme Court's (ISC) decision to uphold the revocation of the special status of the Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IIOJK).

He expressed dismay over the decision, saying the Indian judiciary had succumbed to the fascist Hindutva ideology giving decisions suited to the Indian government.

He added that such

decisions could not legitimize the occupation of Jammu and Kashmir as the Jammu and Kashmir issue was an internationally recognized dispute that remained on the agenda of the UN Security Council for over seven decades.

While condemning the decision, the president said that it was unfortunate that Indian courts had a history of giving decisions against Muslims as in the cases of Babri Masjid, Samjhuta Express.

Future plans

Nawaz Sharif is planning ahead. Perhaps confident of his chances in the next election, he seems keen to want to avoid the run-ins he has had with security establishments during past stints in power.

In general, it seems like he wants to take a strong stance on civilian supremacy and wants some guarantees that he will be able to run the country unhindered this time around. It is a carefully calculated power move.

The state seems to have all but run out of options, and Mr Sharif is leveraging the opportunity to push back on the issues that are most important to him. For example, he has repeatedly tested the waters by reiterating his demand for the accountability of those who 'conspired', in his view, to push him out of power in 2017.

Demanding such accountability just months ago could have rapidly backfired on the PML-N. Younger brother Shehbaz Sharif would always be quick to soothe nerves each time Mr Sharif publicly put forth this demand.

Not so more recently, while Mr Sharif has gradually grown more insistent on this 'accountability drive'. "Who ruined the country? Who brought the country to this point today? Why are the poor starving today? [...] All these things are eating up the country," Mr Sharif noted while addressing party leaders on Friday.

On Saturday, with Shehbaz Sharif by his side, he went further, "Those who have brought the country to this point, they should also be held accountable. They should be asked how you meted out such treatment [to] this country."

In the same gathering, the former prime minister also defended his position on the Kargil issue, while stressing the need to improve ties with neighbouring countries, especially India.

He also recalled the visits of Atal Bihari Vajpayee in 1999 and Narendra Modi in 2015, rhetorically asking if anyone had come to Pakistan before them. It was clear that the three-oust prime minister was keen to assert himself from the outset this time around.

It is encouraging to see that Nawaz Sharif remains committed to a strong civilian government and an independent foreign policy, and he is fully entitled, as a former chief executive, to pursue accountability and push the overreaching arms of the state back into their respective domains.

However, Mr Sharif should perhaps not consider himself the 'ideal' candidate just yet. It is clear that he still has a weak understanding of the Pakistani economy, which seems heavily influenced by the thoroughly discredited ideas of Ishaq Dar.

Therefore, while his ideas about civilian supremacy and assertive policymaking are commendable, until both he and his party figure out what good fiscal management entails, there is not much they can offer inflation-weary Pakistanis desperate for growth and meaningful change.

Taxing agri incomes

Pakistan's inability to generate enough revenue means it invariably finds itself at the mercy of international lenders. Currently, we are signatories to an IMF deal that binds the government to increase overall revenue generation and improve the tax-to-GDP ratio which, in our case, is among the lowest in the world. This cannot be possible unless the state starts taxing all sectors of the economy equitably. This includes the rural sector, where great potential lies in efficiently taxing agricultural output. Agriculture accounts for about one-fifth of Pakistan's \$350 billion economy. If the sector was contributing its fair share, a fifth of the current year's tax collection target of Rs9,415bn would be coming from farm output. However, actual collection is a tiny fraction of the ideal amount. There is a need to correct the common misconception that agriculture is exempt from income tax. It is not. Income from agriculture is taxed like any other income as per the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001. The only difference is that this tax is collected by provincial authorities and not the Federal Board of Revenue. Farmers and other interest groups advance various arguments against agriculture income taxes. They generally feel that since they are already heavily taxed indirectly, they should not be made to pay income taxes as well. They also complain of controlled commodity prices, which is an implicit tax on their incomes. However, while such complaints are not unreasonable, the

doubling of wheat prices in 2022 has rendered price controls ineffective. In any case, other commodities like cotton and rice are free for export; in fact, the latter is encouraged for export under government policy. Sugar, among the major crops, is the only exception. It remains subject to strict government controls and usually faces export restrictions. To offset this, sugar import is heavily taxed in order to benefit local industry and large farmers.

Many tax experts feel agricultural taxes are unenforceable due to a lack of documentation of the economy and its vast geographic spread. Perhaps this is the reason why our colonial overlords levelled presumptive taxes on agricultural revenue and based it on land rental value instead of actual production or productivity potential. However, assuming there is sufficient commitment at the policy level, taxing agriculture should no longer be an issue in the age of satellite imagery and machine-learning technologies. In fact, farmers should advocate for such an approach if they want agriculture in Pakistan to formally be considered part of the larger economy and documented as a part of national supply chains.

It is preposterous that agricultural revenue collection is still done manually by revenue staff as it was 100 years ago. In the prevailing system, if someone does not pay or is overcharged, there is no way of monitoring or to redress the injustice. Therefore, the time has come for the entire system to be modernised. In this regard, the lead has to come from the IMF, international lenders and bilateral donors, as our domestic system seems too subservient to vested interests which are unlikely

to allow tech-enabled transparency in the farm and rural economies.

International lenders and development partners should provide grants to digitalise the farmlands and make land records easily searchable. As a second step, all imagery of farmlands should be made available year-round to individual farmers (irrespective of their landholding size) as well as to the government. The imagery service should enable farmers to assess the condition of their crop on a periodic basis (ideally, daily), and help the government monitor and aggregate crop data. This will greatly help the government in its tax collection, as not much can be hidden in this digital age. Lastly, machine-learning can help the government and farmers interpret this satellite imagery in depth and even assess the yield potential of various crops at the time of harvesting if the systems used to analyse the imagery are properly trained in this task.

Given Pakistan's resource constraints, agricultural taxation as well as fiscal transfers need to be technology-based. At the farmer level, those who refuse to pay taxes must be penalised, for example by not being able to sell or gift their property to fellow family members without first clearing their dues with the government. This is only possible when farm and land records are diligently digitalised. Technology will also help net the large farmers, who account for merely four per cent of all cultivators but own nearly 40pc of all farmland. It will help recover hundreds of billions of rupees in agricultural income tax while also enabling modernisation of farming practices. — Courtesy Dawn

Conflict and climate

Promises are meant to be broken. That's why we should respond to the outcome of COP28 with a healthy dose of scepticism. The headlines will focus on the language agreed regarding the fate of fossil fuels: 'abate', 'phase down', 'phase out'. Whatever the agreement, it is unlikely to be fettered with concrete targets or firm deadlines and will rely on fantasies of how quickly we can scale carbon capture technologies. In all scenarios, you can expect the ongoing, unapologetic use of fossil fuels.

But let's not fully dismiss COP28 yet. In other areas, the summit has been more productive. Foremost among these is the new Declaration on Climate, Relief, Recovery and Peace, which calls for "bolder collective action to build climate resilience ... in highly vulnerable countries and communities, particularly those threatened or affected by fragility or conflict".

Seven out of 10 of the most climate-vulnerable countries are also ranked as fragile states. COP28's focus on intersections between climate and security is thus a welcome addition. The declaration enshrines a two-fold recognition: one, that climate change exacerbates security challenges; two, that state fragility and conflict impede climate adaptation and mitigation efforts. This is a vicious circle, leaving the most vulnerable further exposed to both violence and climate risk. These topics have relevance to Pakistan. According to the Pakistan Institute for

Conflict and Security Studies, our country witnessed a 34 per cent increase in militant attacks in November as compared to the previous month, bringing the number of attacks this year until Nov 30 to 599. Security concerns are also cited as the reason why Pakistan is expelling undocumented Afghans in a controversial move. Though under-researched, there can be no doubt that cycles of drought and flooding in Pakistan and Afghanistan are exacerbating these trends.

The links between climate change and security challenges are increasingly better understood. Until now, the focus has primarily been on resource competition, the idea that food and water scarcity drives competition between different groups (for example, Kenya's herders, farmers and conservancy owners) leading to conflict. But other factors are at play too.

In an article titled How Climate Change Helps Violent Non-State Actors, Noah Gordon underscores how climate change undermines state legitimacy by reducing states' capacity for service delivery and creating more space for non-state actors. Gordon discusses how the spread of inhospitable environments, particularly in agricultural economies, will lead to farmers being desperate and more susceptible to militant recruitment. He also points out how climate migration will increase the demand for illicit activities such as people smuggling, which will provide militant groups with a new funding stream. Most importantly, climate injustice post-disasters will further weaken state legitimacy and spread anger that can be channelled through non-state actors' narratives. There is also growing awareness that climate disasters distract security forces from their

prime aims as they are increasingly pulled into rescue and reconstruction efforts. This year, from Spain to the US and East Africa, militaries were involved in responses to wildfires and floods, tapping resources and blocking capacity in unpredictable ways. In this context, Nato Secretary-General Jens Stoltenberg said at COP28 that climate change would be at the top of Nato's agenda and that member states would be more cautious about considering issues such as food and energy security while supporting the just transition.

Including a climate lens to security policymaking is arguably more easily achievable than ensuring that insecure areas receive adequate access to climate finance and adaptation and mitigation initiatives. A UNEP report released ahead of COP28 found that there is an adaptation finance gap in low-income countries of between \$215 billion and \$387bn per year, at least 50pc larger than thought. The issue is worse in fragile and conflict-affected areas, due to concerns about funding flows and project viability in these areas.

Given that Pakistan is eyeing Loss and Damage Fund support to build climate resilience, including in many parts of the country that would be categorised as fragile or conflict-hit, we should pay close attention to the plans for better partnering with local governments and community networks, such as schools and NGOs, to deliver climate finance in difficult contexts, groups that are sadly disempowered in our political set-up. Ultimately, vulnerable countries themselves will also have to play a role in tackling the vicious cycle of climate and security by improving democratic norms and prioritising climate-related concerns. — Courtesy Dawn

PM directs to ensure supply of urea fertilizer on controlled rates

ISLAMABAD (APP): Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar on Monday directed the departments concerned to prepare and submit an action plan immediately for uninterrupted supply of urea fertilizer on priority basis.

He also ordered to ensure its availability to the farmers at government controlled rate and submit a report in this regard by tomorrow (Tuesday).

"To ensure uninterrupted supply of urea fertilizer during crop sowing, a comprehensive

framework should be prepared and presented in consultation with the provinces and the relevant industry," he said while chairing an emergency review meeting regarding demand and supply, and price of urea fertilizer in the country.

During the meeting, the prime minister asked the district administrations to take immediate action against the hoarders of the fertilizer, and identify and punish those responsible.

He said the government subsidy on urea fertilizer must reach

the deserving farmers.

The prime minister directed the Ministry of Industry and the Ministry of Food Security to provide the production and supply statistics of urea fertilizer to the provincial governments, and ensure coordination in operations against its hoarders.

He said the transportation of fertilizer should be monitored at all provincial borders, while ensuring that no hurdle was made in its supply to meet the provincial requirements.

He said all the

provinces should bear the burden of subsidy on urea fertilizer in proportion to their consumption.

Earlier, a detailed briefing was given in the meeting on the recent production, demand and supply of urea fertilizer to farmers in the country. The meeting was told that the production and stock of urea in the country was sufficient for the wheat crop, whereas 220,000 metric tons was being imported for buffer stock, and its first consignment would reach Pakistan by next week.

However, according to the Forex Association of Pakistan (FAP), the buying and selling rates of the Dollar in the open market stood at Rs284 and Rs286.5 respectively.

The price of the Euro decreased by 63 paise to close at Rs305.36 against the last day's closing of Rs305.99, according to the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP).

Gohar Ejaz holds meetings with Chinese businessman to boost trade ties

ISLAMABAD (APP): Minister of Commerce Dr Gohar Ejaz, who is leading a 20-member delegation to China, on Monday held meetings with Chinese businessman and exporters to boost trade and remove trade imbalances.

The minister met Chairman of the China Chamber of Commerce for Import and Export of Textiles (CCCT) Zhang Xinmin, and President of

the COFCO Group Luan Richeng - a key player in China's food processing sector, a Commerce Ministry press release said.

"The meetings denote the pivotal part of Pakistan's strategy to augment non-textile exports, leveraging the strength of COFCO Group's position as China's largest food processor, manufacturer, and trader," it added.

SCCI, CG agree to further improve Pak-US bilateral economic ties

PESHAWAR (INP): President of the Sarhad Chamber of Commerce and Industry (SCCI) Fuad Ishaq and Shante Moore, U.S Consul General in Peshawar on Monday agreed on further improving Pak-US bilateral trade and economic relations, besides the development of young entrepreneurs, enhancing their abilities and promotion of exports.

Fuad Ishaq invited U.S. companies and investors to invest in potential sectors in

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa through joint ventures to further cement mutual trade ties between the two friendly countries.

According to a press release issued here, a meeting was held between the U.S Consul General in Peshawar Mr Shante Moore and prominent members of the business community in residence of Mr Ahammad Rashid, Honorary Consul General, Republic of Tunisia, Peshawar, Dean - Honorary Counselor Corps Peshawar KP chapter and former senior vice president of the SCCI.

ADB approves \$155m to help boost Pak women's access to finance

ISLAMABAD (INP): The Asian Development Bank (ADB) has approved \$155.5 million in financing for Pakistan that will support policy reforms enhancing women's access to finance and provide credit to women-led micro, small, and medium-sized enterprises. The financing comprises a \$100 million policy-based loan that supports legal and regulatory reforms that will help women to better access finance; a \$50 million financial intermediation loan that will enable participating financial institutions to

lend to women entrepreneurs; and a \$5.5 million grant that will finance related activities.

"Inclusive, resilient and sustainable development cannot be achieved if women do not have equal economic opportunities and benefits," said ADB Director General for Central and West Asia Yevgeniy Zhukov.

"ADB's new program will help transform Pakistan's current financing ecosystem to help women to access much-needed finance and empower them to boost

their livelihoods while contributing significantly to the economy," Zhukov added. According to ADB press statement received here Monday, female labor force participation in Pakistan currently stands at about 23%. The country also has among the lowest rates of women's entrepreneurship in the world at 4% of female working age adults. While Pakistan's financial inclusion has been improving, women are increasingly left behind with a large gender finance gap which currently stands at 34%.

PSX loses 211 points

ISLAMABAD (APP): The 100-index of Pakistan Stock Exchange (PSX) witnessed bearish trend on Monday, losing 211.31 points, a negative change of 0.32 percent, closing at 66,012.33 points against 66,223.63 points the previous trading day. A total of 1,215,932,469 shares valuing Rs.33,423 billion were traded during the day as compared to 1,329,550,091 shares valuing Rs.33,377 billion the last day.

Some 386 companies transacted their shares in the stock market; 159 of them recorded gains and 224 sustained losses.

NBFC posts 35.9% growth in FY23

ISLAMABAD (APP): The collective base sector of the Non-Banking Financial Sector (NBFC) stood at Rs 2.87 trillion during the fiscal year 2022-23 as compared to Rs 2.11 trillion during the same period of last year, showing a promising annual growth of 35.9%.

According to the annual report issued by the Security and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP), within the NBFC sector, the Fund Management segment of the mutual fund industry emerges as a key player.

As of June 30, 2023, the Assets under Management (AUM) of the Mutual fund industry stood at Rs 1,675 billion, showing substantial growth from Rs 1,281 billion in June 2022, marking a remarkable 30.8% increase.

The report said that the surge in AUMS can be attributed to the prevailing monetary policy situation, the major thrust of investment remained vectored towards its flexible product structure and robust ability to incorporate dynamic shared compliant solution.

KP govt decides to launch Khushal KP programme

PESHAWAR (APP): Caretaker Chief Minister Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Justice (Retd) Arshad Hussain Shah has said that the government is determined for the welfare of the people of the province in its short period, saying for this purpose, a Khushal Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Programme will be launched soon.

He expressed these views while presiding over the 17th meeting of the caretaker cabinet here on Monday. Besides, members of the caretaker cabinet, Chief Secretary, Additional Chief Secretary

These rickshaws will now be categorized as three-wheelers, with the regional transport authority designated as a special registration authority for the temporary registration of existing motorcycle rickshaws.

Following temporary registration, motorcycle rickshaws will undergo a four-month window for specific size and redesign modifications. Subsequently, they can obtain a registration number from the excise department under the issuance of a fitness certificate. The CM emphasized the need to streamline the registration process and requested the forms to be prepared in Urdu.

The meeting also sanctioned the permanent fortification of the infrastructure for 18 major roads.

hashish was recovered from two accused going in a vehicle and a rickshaw, netted from Ring Road Peshawar.

Three kg of heroin, 1370 grams Ice and 7 kg of 200 grams of hashish were recovered from a house in Rawat.

950 kg hashish was recovered from a vehicle intercepted near Yaro Chowk Pishin while an accused was also arrested during the operation.

55 kg hashish was recovered from a vehicle near Jamshoro Toll Plaza Sukkur and two accused were arrested. ANF also recovered 54 kg of hashish from the possession of an accused rounded up near Sher Shah Karachi.

Infuriated wife sends husband to jail for solemnizing second marriage

KARACHI (INP): An infuriated wife sent her husband to jail for illegally solemnizing the second marriage in Karachi on Monday.

Reportedly, a local court in Karachi heard a case filed by a Christian woman against her husband who contracted a second marriage.

During the hearing, the petitioner's lawyer Saleem Michael said that accused Joshua could not solemnize the second marriage under the Christian Marriage Act.

Relief for Qingqi, rickshaws till January 2

LAHORE (APP): The Punjab Transport department has provided relief to ensure fitness of 'Qingqi' and rickshaws till January 2.

According to official sources here on Monday it was a golden opportunity for rickshaw owners to get fitness of their rickshaws done and get immunity from fine. Immunity from fine had been given till January 2 and fine would be applicable once the relaxation date would end.

France, Germany, Italy back EU sanctions to target Hamas

BRUSSELS: France, Germany and Italy called for the European Union to set up a special sanctions scheme to target Hamas as EU foreign ministers met on Monday to consider possible next steps in response to the Middle East crisis.

Among the possible measures up for discussion at the meeting are a crackdown on Hamas' finances and travel bans for Israeli settlers responsible for violence in the West Bank.

In a letter to EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell, the foreign ministers of the bloc's three biggest countries said it was important the EU take "all necessary measures against the terrorist group Hamas and its supporters."

"This implies a stronger European commitment both to combating Hamas' infrastructure and financial support, and to isolating and delegitimising Hamas internationally, which in no way represents the Palestinians or their legitimate aspirations," said the letter, seen by Reuters. Hamas is already listed by the European Union as a terrorist organisation, meaning any funds or assets that it has in the EU should be frozen.

It was not immediately clear from the brief letter the details of how sanctions would be broadened or

Ukraine allies provide ships to ward off Russia in the Black Sea

PARIS: The U.K. and Norway will lead a coalition aimed at helping Ukraine secure its maritime export routes against Russian interference, the U.K.'s Ministry of Defence said on Dec. 11.

The long-term goal is to help Ukraine transform its navy to become more compatible with Western allies, and to bolster security in the Black Sea, the ministry said. The U.K. is transferring two minehunter ships to Ukraine as a first step.

"The rebuilding of the Ukrainian Navy has begun," U.K. Secretary for Defence Grant Shapps said in a post on X. "The U.K. will bring together our allies in a new coalition to give Ukraine the power to rule the waves."

The UN says commodity shipments in the Black Sea continue to face "significant risks" from air strikes and sea mines, and several cargo and grain ships reportedly hit mines in the area in recent months.

China's leaders meet to discuss growth targets for 2024, say sources

BEIJING: China's leaders started a closed-door meeting on Monday to discuss economic targets and map out stimulus plans for 2024, four sources familiar with the matter said.

The annual Central Economic Work Conference, during which President Xi Jinping and other top officials chart the course for the world's second-largest economy next year, is likely to end on Tuesday, the sources said.

Investors are closely watching for clues on next year's policy and reform agenda as China's economy has struggled to mount a strong post-pandemic recovery amid the deepening housing crisis, local government debt concerns, slowing global growth and geopolitical tensions. The Politburo, a top decision-making body of the ruling Communist Party, said on Friday that fiscal policy would be moderately strengthened.

Big US donors rally around Nikki Haley

NEW YORK: A growing number of US business leaders are rallying behind former South Carolina governor Nikki Haley as the Republican Party's presidential hopeful, seeing her as more stable than rival Donald Trump, and more favorable to business interests than incumbent Joe Biden.

"Even if you're a very liberal Democrat, I urge you: help Nikki Haley too. Get a choice on the Republican side that might be better than Trump," said Jamie Dimon, who as head of JPMorgan Chase bank is often seen as one of the country's most powerful CEOs.

For the last month or so, a growing list of entrepreneurs and business leaders have been lining up behind Trump's former UN ambassador, stumping for her, swelling her campaign coffers or considering doing so as her standing in polls strengthens.

Israeli tanks blast their way into Khan Yunis

GAZA: Israeli tanks blasted their way into the heart of Khan Yunis in the southern Gaza Strip — the refuge for hundreds of thousands of civilians who fled other parts of the enclave on Tel Aviv's orders — as Hamas said Israeli forces were mounting "very violent raids".

At the opposite end of the Gaza Strip, residents also described some of the most intense fighting of the war so far.

Intense fighting was reported in Jabalia and Gaza City's Shejaiya district, while the Israeli army said on Sunday that it had struck over 250 targets in the previous 24 hours.

The fighting has claimed at least 17,700 lives in Gaza since Oct 7.

Residents of Khan Yunis said tanks had reached the main north-south road through the middle of Khan Yunis after intense combat through the night that had slowed the Israeli advance from the east. Warplanes were pounding the area west of the assault. The air rumbled with the constant thud of explosions and thick columns of white smoke rose over the city.

Gazans say hunger is growing, fuelling fears of exodus into Egypt

GAZA: Fighting between Israel and Hamas intensified across Gaza on Monday, fuelling fears flagged by the United Nations at the weekend of a breakdown in public order and a mass exodus of Palestinians into Egypt.

The narrow coastal strip has been under a full Israeli blockade since the start of the conflict more than two months ago and the border with Egypt is the only other way out. Most of Gaza's 2.3 million people have been driven from their homes.

Nobel Peace Prize winner says Iranian people will prevail against rulers

OSLO: The Iranian people will ultimately overcome authoritarianism imposed by a government that has lost legitimacy and public support, Nobel Peace Prize winner Narges Mohammadi said from prison in a speech read by her children on Sunday.

The Norwegian Nobel committee in October awarded the prize to Mohammadi, 51, for her non-violent fight "against oppression of women in Iran" and the promotion of human rights for all, in a rebuke to Tehran's theocratic leaders. Her 17-year-old twins Kianna and Ali Rahmani collected the prize, a gold medal and diploma, at a ceremony in Oslo's City Hall attended by several hundred guests. The prize includes a cheque for 11 million Swedish crowns (about \$1 million).

In her speech, sent from Iran's notorious Evin prison, Mohammadi said continued resistance and non-violence.

China's actions in S. China Sea undermine regional stability, US says

MANILA: The United States has called out China for interfering in the Philippines' maritime operations and undermining regional stability, urging Beijing to stop "its dangerous and destabilising conduct" in the South China Sea. The Philippines and China have traded accusations over a ramming incident during the weekend while Manila's vessels were on a resupply mission to Second Thomas Shoal.

Canada's surging cost of living fuels reverse immigration

TORONTO: The dream of making it big in Canada is turning into a battle for survival for many immigrants due to the high cost of living and rental shortages, as rising emigration numbers hint at newcomers being forced to turn their back on a country that they chose to make their adopted home.

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has made immigration his main weapon to blunt Canada's big challenge of an aging and slowing population, and it has also helped fuel economic growth. That drove

Canada's population up at its fastest clip in more than six decades this year, Statistics Canada said.

But now a reversal of that trend is gradually taking hold.

In the first six months of 2023 some 42,000 individuals departed Canada, adding to 93,818 people who left in 2022 and 85,927 exits in 2021, official data show.

The rate of immigrants leaving Canada hit a two-decade high in 2019, according to a recent report from the Institute for Canadian Citizenship (ICC), an immigration advocacy group.

Indian apex court failed in upholding the merit and demands of justice: AJK PM

MIRPUR (AJK): (APP) Azad Jammu Kashmir Prime Minister Chaudhry Anwar ul Haq, while condemning the Indian Supreme Court's verdict upholding the presidential order regarding the revocation of Kashmir's special status, has stated that the Indian apex court has miserably failed in upholding the merit and demands of justice.

In a special statement issued here on Monday, the AJK prime minister termed the court verdict as tantamount to murdering justice and robbing Kashmiris of their constitutional and human rights. Terming the abrogation of 370 and 35A by the Indian government as illegal and unconstitutional, the PM said Kashmiris had no hope from the Supreme Court of India.

"I was pretty sure that the Supreme Court of India will go the extra mile to defend the Indian government's decision", he said, adding that Kashmiris had no faith in the Indian

state apparatus, not even in its pious judiciary." All Indian institutions including the judiciary have been equally responsible for the current mess and worsening political and human rights situation in the occupied Kashmir", he said.

He, however, maintained that the Kashmiris' ongoing struggle for right to self determination would continue despite the Indian government's policies of deceit and deception.

"The Indian judiciary has a history of being biased towards Kashmiris. It has never given any relief to the Kashmiri people", he said, adding that the Supreme Court through its recent verdict has proved it beyond any doubt that it was acting on the whims and fancies of the Indian establishment.

Terming Kashmir as an internationally recognized disputed territory, the PM made it clear that the Indian supreme court's decision cannot change the disputed status of the state.

Senate body unanimously passes resolution condemning Israeli atrocities against Palestinians

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Senate Standing Committee on Religious Affairs and Interfaith Harmony on Monday unanimously passed a resolution condemning the Israeli atrocities against the innocent Palestinians including the children. The committee met under the Chairmanship of Senator Maulana Abdul Ghafoor Haideri here at the Parliament Lodges.

The committee strongly condemned the United States' veto against the United Nations Security Council Resolution passed by the majority of the world nations for a ceasefire in Gaza.

The resolution also

called for an immediate humanitarian ceasefire. The committee strongly condemned the Israeli atrocities and aggressive actions against the innocent Palestinians including elderly people, children, and patients in hospitals and urged the government to take immediate action for the same. The committee directed the ministry to investigate the non-registered company, Fifth Pilar Jakafal Ltd, involved in the illegal booking of Hajj and Umrah.

Hajj Organizers Association of Pakistan (HOAP) Chairman informed that the company was, falsely claiming affiliation with HOAP, and deceiving the public by promoting in-

stallment-based Hajj, potentially contributing to a broader fraud scheme.

The ministry enlisted the Federal Investigation Agency to probe the matter and submit a report.

The committee's directive to involve the Pakistani Ambassador in Riyadh to implement the decision on reducing private Hajj Group Organizers from 905 to 46 was accepted. It was briefed that there would be a gradual reduction in the number of pilgrims, with each organizer allowed a minimum of 500 for Hajj 2024, 1,000 for 2025, and 2,000 for 2026.

The discussion also covered approaching Saudi

authorities to expand the Road to Makkah Project to other Pakistani airports, including Lahore, Karachi, Peshawar, and Quetta. Saudi approval had been granted for including Karachi airport, with ongoing efforts to extend the project to Lahore airport for enhanced facilitation.

Regarding arrangements for Hajj 2024, the committee apprised that the tentative package cost had decreased to Rs.1,075,000 from Rs.1,175,000. Hajj would receive a complimentary baggage allowance of 30kg with a QR code, along with a free Hajj sim containing 7GB data.

DC chairs review meeting to address city's key issues

HYDERABAD (APP): A review meeting was held under the chairmanship of Deputy Commissioner (DC) Hyderabad Tariq Qureshi to find out solutions to various important problems of the city on the instructions given by Caretaker Chief Minister Sindh Justice @ Maqbool Baqar during his recent visit to Hyderabad.

President of Hyderabad Chamber of Small Traders and Small Industry (HCSTSI) Muhammad Farooq Sheikhani, former president Salim ud Din Qureshi, Aamir Shahab and Shahid Qaimkhani of Hyderabad site and representatives of "Abad" Zulfikar Farooqi, Kashif Shaikh and Saeed Chaudhan attended the meeting.

MQM doubts 'transparency, fairness' of general elections

KARACHI (INP): MQM-Pakistan chief Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui on Monday raised doubt about "fairness and transparency" of general elections on February 8.

Addressing a press conference with Mustafa Kamal, Aminul Haq and other leaders at Pakistan House, Siddiqui said everyone knows how the results of the 2018 general elections were compiled. He claimed that Karachi has been deprived of its real representation. "Those who represented the city, did not belong to it," he added.

The MQM (Muttahida Qaumi Move-

ment) leader said that the city needed elections at the earliest as "the caretaker government in Sindh is a continuation of the 15-year [PPP] government." Siddiqui said elections should be held in such a way that the whole process looked transparent. "At this time, it seems, the elections will not be fair and transparent," he continued.

He warned the caretaker government of protest if the mandate was not to its liking.

"We will come to the streets to get [real] mandate." He addressed the caretaker prime minister that "it is your job to conduct transparent elections."

Two dead in accident at Native Jetty Bridge

KARACHI (INP): Two motorcyclists were dead after being hit by a speeding car at Karachi's Native Jetty Bridge, rescue volunteers said on Monday.

A speeding car hit two people, riding motorcycle, at Native Jetty Bridge in Karachi, leaving both of them dead.

The car driver fled the scene. The bodies were shifted to the hospital, where they were identified as Sohail and Arslan.

In a separate road accident in October, at least seven citizens including two women were injured after a passenger bus overturned outside the Governor's House in Karachi.

Active role of women in electoral process crucial: Solangi

ISLAMABAD (APP): Caretaker Federal Minister for Information and Broadcasting Murtaza Solangi said on Monday that active role of women in the electoral process was very important.

"Women constitute half of the population of Pakistan and their empowerment is a sacred task", he said while addressing a policy forum organised by South Asia Partnership Pakistan titled "Women's participation in elections".

Referring to Benazir Bhutto, Murtaza Solangi said that the first woman prime minister in the Muslim world was from Pakistan.

Solangi said that ending gender discrimination should start from home and daughters should have

equal rights to sons in every home. He opined that it was not possible to eliminate gender discrimination only by enacting new laws.

"We have to change our thinking to give equal rights to women," Murtaza Solangi remarked.

He said that the caretaker government had a limited mandate but it was ready to take all possible steps to empower women if concrete proposals were given to it.

The minister said that the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) will release the election schedule before December 16.

"General elections will be held on February 8, no one should have any doubt about it", Murtaza Solangi added.

ISLAMABAD (INP): Pakistan People's Party (PPP) has moved the Supreme Court (SC) for live telecast of a hearing on a presidential reference against former prime minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto's death sentence.

Speaking on the occasion, the Prime Minister emphasized the need to further rationalize and liberalize the visa policy. He noted that until and unless we do not open up to the world.

The plea was moved by the PPP chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari, stating the narrative of Zulfikar Ali Bhutto is still alive despite awarding him

a death sentence in 1979. The PPP chairman has requested the apex court for a live telecast of the hearing.

On April 2, 2011, then-president Asif Ali Zardari approached the apex court through a presidential reference to seek its opinion on revisiting the trial of the Pakistan People's Party (PPP) founder.

Zulfikar Ali Bhutto was handed a death sentence during former military ruler General (retired) Ziaul Haq's regime. The first elected prime minister of the country was charged with the murder of a political rival Nawab Mohammed Ahmed Qasuri and a trial took place.

No delay in upcoming general elections: PPP assured

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) has assured the Pakistan People's Party (PPP) delegation that there will be no delay in the upcoming general elections.

In remarks to the media outside the ECP secretariat, Senator Taj Haider highlighted that the PPP, in discussions with Chief Election Commissioner, underscored the significance of holding elections on schedule and expressed no intention for any delays.

Sikandar Sultan Raja, the Chief Election Commissioner (CEC), proposed sending objections promptly to him via WhatsApp. Taj Haider said adding that the People's Party had also submitted suggestions to make the whole electoral process more transparent.

Rotavirus claims 600,000 lives annually: Dr Zulfikar

HYDERABAD (APP): Paediatrics Dr. Zulfikar Shaikh informed that Rotavirus diarrhoea was not well understood in the ancient world, probably because its symptoms are not primarily diarrhoeas, but rather systemic and non-specific.

Talking to APP here on Monday he said that there is no doubt that lack of clean drinking water and unsanitary conditions for the production and preparation of food represent the main reasons for the ongoing endemic of diarrhoea in the developing world.

Poor water quality, sanitation and hygiene account for some 829,000 deaths a year worldwide. He said that lack of attention to water, sanitation and hygiene issues is the single major source of backwardness of our country and poor

drinking water quality, quantity, sanitation and hygienic conditions cause illness of adults and children. He said that traditionally the age range considered at greatest risk is 5-10 years of age, although young children and infants may also be infected.

Dr Zulfikar said about the treatment recommended that treatment of Rotavirus begin based on clinical findings before a definitive diagnosis. Sadly, in endemic regions, facilities for definitive diagnosis, based on blood or bone marrow culture or serologic tests may be entirely lacking. He said about the Rotavirus that although most parents are not as familiar with the name Rotavirus as they are with other viruses, like the cold or the flu, rotavirus is a very common cause of infections in children.

Human skeleton discovered from a house in Karachi

KARACHI (INP): A human skeleton was reportedly found during the construction of a house located in Karachi's Orangi town area on Monday.

According to the police statement, the house owner, Salim Kashmiri, sold the property to Azeem a year ago, meanwhile, during the construction process, Azeem discovered a human skeleton buried in one of the rooms of the house.

The initial reports suggested that the skeleton was of a woman who was buried several years ago, while the body was wrapped in a piece of cloth before being buried.

The police sources stated that the forensic team had already taken DNA samples which will later be matched with the database.
