Becomes 24th PM in rucks-hit session Mounds of socio-economic challenges exist; but surmountable, says Shehbaz in victory speech

Obtains 201 votes; rival PTI-SIC candidate Omar Ayub Khan bags 92 votes; Shehbaz thanks Nawaz for nominating him for PM slot; Says his party never indulged in political victimisation

ISLAMABAD (AFP/APP): Shehbaz Sharif was voted in on Sunday as Pakistan's prime minister for a second time, presiding over a shaky alliance that has shut out followers of jailed opposition leader Imran Khan.

Newly sworn-in lawmakers in Pakistan's National Assembly elected Sharif with 201 votes, more than three weeks after national elections marred by widespread allegations of rigging.

"No one has won a majority. It is a split mandate. And it is the democratic way that if it's a split mandate, then the like-minded parties may form a coalition government," Sharif told parliament, referring to the February 8 election.

The Sharif family's Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) party allied with their historic rivals the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP), as well as several smaller factions, to keep Khan's candidates out.

In return, the PPP—a dynastic party ruled by the family of slain ex-premier Benazir Bhutto—has been promised the office of president for Bhutto's widower, Asif Ali Zardari.

Ex-prime minister Khan was jailed in the run-up to the election and barred from running, while his Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) party was targeted by a crackdown of arrests and censorship.

PTI candidates were forced to run as independent



dents but nonetheless secured more seats than any other party.

However, they fell short of the figures needed to form a government, paving the way for Sharif's return.

Omar Ayub Khan stood against Sharif as the candidate of choice for MPs loyal to Imran Khan, gaining 92 votes.

"They put our leaders in jail, took our election symbol, rigged the elections, but we kept standing, and we will stand our ground," Omar Ayub Khan told parliament. Sharif, 72, first served as prime minister in 2022 at the head of a strikingly similar alliance which ousted Imran Khan, a former

cricket star.

Meanwhile Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif, the newly-elected prime minister, on Sunday spelled out a number of initiatives to net the runaway inflation, high cost of living, price hike, circular debt in the energy sector and foreign debts, and expressed the optimism that though the mounds of challenges existed, but were not insurmountable.

In his maiden speech in the National Assembly, the prime minister-elect also offered an olive branch to the protesting opposition members with a 'charter of reconciliation', besides reiterating his insistence on pursuing a 'charter of economy'.

Shehbaz Sharif was, earlier, elected as the prime minister for the second time in a 201-vote count by the newly formed National Assembly about three weeks after the conclusion of general elections, leading to formation of a coalition government.

He said that after the general elections, they had two options ahead of them; either to protect their politics or to save the country, but the allied parties' leadership preferred interests of the country and resolved to play their role for the bright future of the country.

Shehbaz said that Pakistan was blessed with immense natural resources and talented young people

who could steer it out of the difficulties.

All the segments of society and political leadership should play their part in those endeavours, he stressed.

He said the economic and social challenges were myriad but at the same time, there was an opportunity, if they decided collectively to face them.

The PM-elect said that as per estimates, the budget revenues stood at Rs12,300 billion and after the NFC (national finance Commission) Award distribution, the Federal Government was left with only Rs 7,300 billion, out of which Rs 8,000 billion had been paid in interest and services charges, showing a deficit of Rs 700 billion.

He wondered that from where they would have to get resources for the development, education, health, salaries of the Federal Government employees and the armed forces!

He termed it an unending chain of seeking loans after loans and 'a grave situation' for about 250 million people of the country.

Referring to the protest of the opposition members, he regretted that there should be 'a reign of realization rather than making noises in the House', adding the history would decide over such tactics.

Elections 2024 shattered record of rigging set in 2018: Fazal

KARACHI (INP): Maulana Fazlur Rehman, the head of Jamiat-e-Ulema Islam (JUI-F), lambasted the recently concluded 2024 elections in Pakistan, accusing them of surpassing the previous record of rigging set during the 2018 polls.

Fazl made these assertions during a press conference in Karachi, where he claimed that mounting international pressure forced Pakistan's military establishment to yield, thus influencing the election outcome.

"The establishment's coercion will indeed be labelled as coercion. The establishment has divided its own ranks, accommodating some at one place and others elsewhere," he stated, addressing the alleged interference in the electoral process.

Expressing dismay over the dwindling significance of the Parliament, Fazl remarked, "The Parliament, where we see a mockery of democracy, is no longer representative of the people. The Parliament,

which we witness, will have some individuals calling themselves rulers. They may govern bodies but cannot govern the hearts of the nation."

Despite his inclination to support Mahmood Achakzai, the candidate backed by the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI)-supported Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC), Fazl indicated that his party's stance compels them to act otherwise.

He dismissed the prospect of forming alliances with allied parties, citing an inadequate environment for a grand alliance. "We will be where the opposition benches are. We will go to Parliament and protest," he asserted. JUI-F chief pledged to engage with provincial councils and workers in Karachi to devise a nationwide strategy for change. "Assemblies have been bought with money, and if governments are formed through such means, we remain uninvolvement."

We do not accept this robbery, and those involved in this are criminals," he declared.

Little respite

Is inflation on its way out? The Consumer Price Index showed that inflation dropped to 23.1pc in February from 28.3pc the previous month, and 31.5pc a year ago, raising hopes. It is the lowest CPI reading recorded by the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics in the last 20 months. Inflation peaked at 38pc last May. The PBS did not observe a month-over-month change in prices last month, reporting a broad-based decrease in the pace of price rise on account of falling food inflation, coupled with the high base effect of the last fiscal. The rates decreased in both the urban and rural areas, with core inflation, or non-food and non-energy inflation, also down from their higher levels. And yet, there will be little respite for households anytime soon, as overall price levels and the cost of living remain elevated.

Nevertheless, the drop in inflation seems to have encouraged some — such as a former finance minister, who called the reduction in the inflation rate “wonderful news” — to renew calls for early rate cuts to “reduce government deficit and also provide a much-needed respite to industry and consumers”. The calls for rate cuts are based on the assumption that the pace of increase in the prices of goods and services will slow down further over the next several months due to a high base effect, falling demand, easing of supply constraints and plunging global commodity rates. It means that if the trend witnessed last month holds, we should expect the State Bank to start monetary easing soon. However, the inflation outlook still faces risks that include a further increase in domestic energy prices, food supply shocks and an upswing in international commodity prices due to the geopolitics of the Middle East. Hence, inflation expectations remain elevated, despite recent improvements. On top of that, consumers must brace themselves for Ramadan inflation. Therefore, it might be too early to expect the State Bank to start to decrease borrowing costs. A rate cut without a consistent drop in inflation might also not sit well with the IMF whose support is crucial for stabilising Pakistan's external sector. We are also not aware if the IMF agrees to a new extended programme — and how quickly. What is certain is that any new programme will be accompanied by more stringent conditions. A report in a local paper claims that the IMF has advised the FBR to significantly increase the income tax burden for both salaried and non-salaried segments and tax the contribution of private employers to their workers' pension fund, thus enabling the FBR to collect additional revenue. The proposal does not take into account the burden of inflation on the salaried classes. If implemented, this could prove to be the proverbial straw that broke the camel's back.

India's fault lines

Pakistan is passing through a challenging time. A divisive and polarising politics, economic uncertainties, and the continuing threat of violent extremism are some of the fault lines that impede the country's path to stability.

India, on the other hand, seems to be politically stable and economically well-off. However, if one were to scratch this veneer of stability, we could see serious fissures appearing in Indian society. As the country continues its march towards becoming a Hindu state driven by its Hindutva ideology, multiple fault lines have emerged in Indian society, which have deepened in the past one decade under BJP rule.

The first fault line is the growing discrimination against minorities, particularly Indian Muslims. Prof Christophe Jaffrelot at the Centre for International Studies and Research in Paris, recently carried out an extensive study on the plight of Indian Muslims under the Hindutva regime. Based on ethnographic studies and interviews of victims, Jaffrelot found that the representation of Muslims in India's civil service, police or government jobs was far lower than the proportion of their numbers (14.5 per cent of India's total population). Muslim representation has drastically come down in the national and state assemblies under BJP rule. The number of Muslim graduates is declining, particularly in northern India. Sadly, Indian Muslims were only in a majority in jails.

Indian Muslims are worried about saffron vigilante groups and the rising intolerance towards Muslim icons. The attempt to convert

Indian-occupied Kashmir from a Muslim-majority into a Muslim-minority area is also part of the wider discrimination against Muslims. Clearly, India is speeding away from a secular, pluralistic democracy towards a Hindu majoritarian raj.

The second fault line is the continuing discrimination against the Dalits, the low-caste Hindus; the system appears to favour the Brahmins, the upper-caste Hindus. The caste system has been an integral element of Indian society over millennia. It was officially abolished in 1951, but the social hierarchy continues to dominate Indian society. The Brahmins sit atop this hierarchy, which includes Kshatriyas (warriors), Vaishyas (merchants), and Shudras who are supposed to be labourers, and are sometimes called ‘achhut’, or ‘untouchables’, or ‘Dalits’. The scheduled castes (Dalits) or scheduled tribes (Adivasis), which together constitute over 25pc of India's population, endure systemic social isolation and marginalisation, live in slums, and are obliged to do menial jobs.

Under a study supported by The Gates Foundation in 2017, it was revealed that of all those employed in the sanitation and cleaning work in India, 90pc belong to Dalit sub-castes. In most cases, they are underpaid, and not provided essential protective gear. According to a CNN study carried out in 2020, Dalits were the most vulnerable victims of the Covid-19 pandemic because of their susceptibility to viruses, as they had little to no access to education and health services and were at the bottom of the economic hierarchy. There are exceptions, such as the late Dr Ambedkar, who despite facing discrimination in

early life as a Dalit, rose to become the ‘father of the Indian constitution’. He strongly advocated for abolishing the caste system, and later converted to Buddhism, ostensibly to be part of a more egalitarian religion. Rajesh Saraya, the richest Dalit, runs a successful steel business. But these are exceptions.

The third noticeable fault line is the growing divide between north and south India. The major grievance for the southern states (Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Karnataka, Telangana, Andhra Pradesh) is that they contribute more to the Union budget than they receive, whereas the northern states, particularly UP and Bihar, receive far higher returns. In many respects, the southern states have excelled over northern India. These states have a greater degree of religious harmony, are economically doing better, excel in providing IT services, and enjoy lower population growth, which over time has reduced their representation in the Lok Sabha. There is emerging chatter about the possibility of these states forming a country of their own, which recently evoked a heated debate in the Rajya Sabha.

Since 2014, the Modi regime has been steering India towards the path of a Hindu majoritarian nation, where space for minorities including Muslims and Christians is shrinking, while low-caste Hindus continue to suffer. The answer to whether they can ever reverse these discriminations is not yet apparent. However, it is clear that these fault lines could potentially create considerable commotion within Indian society if positive action is not taken to address these societal distortions. -- Courtesy Dawn

Maryam-bashing

When I was teaching at a journalism programme in Karachi a few years ago, former editor of The News, and columnist Ghazi Salahuddin would give a lecture on Malala Yousafzai where he would tell students to speak openly. I once witnessed students' disdain for Malala but Ghazi sahib handled it with such poise, never making them feel they were being challenged for their views. Students repeated the usual claims ‘what has Malala done for Pakistan’. (As an aside, I believe an update of that disdain should ask what has Malala done for Palestine because her silence has been especially disappointing.)

I digress. The point Ghazi sahib was making, as he told me after that lecture, was that if you want to gauge people's politics quickly, you should ask them about Malala. It has served me well — seemingly well-meaning people, who aren't anti-West, or women, or right-wing, would say the strangest things about her.

I believe Maryam Nawaz is the new bashing-kid on the block. Of course, she's not a kid but I've rarely seen people express that kind of rage and hatred for another dynasty child — Pakistan has plenty across all parties. Maryam is treated like a pariah. She is also disparaged privately by party members who feel she doesn't deserve to be where she is. She hasn't ranked high in popularity polls before the elections, though to be fair, it's hard to compete with Imran Khan.

I understand Maryam's unfavourability factor, if there's such a thing, is rooted in misogyny which women leaders the world over experience.

The Reykjavik Index, which studies how people

feel about women leadership, found in 2021 low levels of confidence for women leaders; the higher percentages were in G7 countries. I was surprised to read that younger men “were especially unlikely to endorse women leaders”, but then I reminded myself of some classroom discussions I've had about Aurat March...

This finding was particularly eye-opening: “Some people who don't consider the m-selves sexist believe that because the world is sexist, women leaders are likely to be weaker.”

Just a year later, the index found trust in women leadership is falling though their numbers in high-ranking positions are on the rise. Analysts urged countries to ‘fix the trust gap’ if they want to eradicate gender bias.

The more Maryam's profile rose since 2013, the more scorn she received. I remember how furious social media users were when The New York Times featured her as one of the 11 powerful women “we met in the world” in 2017. Although the paper reported on corruption charges against her family, social media users were not convinced she earned her place as her father's right-hand person. Male scions are not carefully examined.

I am not here to convince you about Maryam's abilities or lack of them — I have serious reservations — but I am curious what our attitude towards her says about us. We are a highly polarised society, with terrible social indicators and a very poor scorecard on how women are treated in this country. I don't believe women leaders automatically means an improvement in women's rights — looking at you, war-mongering Hillary Clinton — but shouldn't we wait before giving Maryam an F?

I certainly do not believe she is above scrutiny.

By all means critique the video of her helping a female official adjust her dupatta, but to liken it to an assault — as some ‘progressives’ have done on X — is preposterous. Especially compared to the muted response to Imran Khan telling a jalsa in 2022 that Maryam talks about him so much it may make her husband jealous.

Men get away with so much, including saying PML-N's leader Sobia Sha-hid in the KP Assembly was asking for it when she was met with verbal abuse, a shoe thrown at her and a lota earlier this week. The what-aboutery always makes the woman the ‘bad guy’.

Women politicians all over the world are held to different standards. Their likeability is put under the microscope whereas it doesn't matter what their counterparts are like. Men's aggressiveness is a given but women doing something unexpected is well... unacceptable.

It is this double standard rooted in deep gender bias, often unconscious, that needs to change.

I believe the press should pound Mary-am, for policies, inaction, siding with cor-p-o-rations over the public, and any favouritism shown in awarding contracts, for ex-a-m-ple. I have heard men (always men) on TV advise her to dress down to be taken seriously. While I understand what they mean — get your hands dirty — it would not cross their mind to say this about her male counterparts.

Every election in this country has been tainted and that could include Maryam's. However, she has won votes and needs to win people's confidence. For that, she needs to be given a chance, not to be confused with a free pass. -- Courtesy Dawn

GECF Summit concludes with pledge to natural gas for secure, sustainable energy future

ALGIERS, Algeria (APP): The 7th Summit of Heads of State and Government of the Gas Exporting Countries Forum (GECF) concluded in Algiers with the issuance of the “Algiers Declaration,” reaffirming the member countries' commitment to promoting natural gas as a key component of a secure and sustainable energy future.

Mobile companies cheating masses, evading taxes: PEW

ISLAMABAD (INP): Chairman Pakistan Economy Watch (PEW), Brigadier (retd) Aslam Khan has said that some telecom companies were cheating consumers by employing different tactics. At the same time, the government was being defrauded by evading taxes to the tune of billions of rupees.

In a statement issued on Sunday, he said, “The masses are tired of inflation, and the country is on the verge of bankruptcy. Still, some greedy corporations are not ready to fulfill their commitments and discharge national obligations by paying due taxes.” Brigadier (retd) Aslam Khan said that some mobile phone operators deduct more

taxes from consumers than they transfer to the government, and there seems to be no end to this practice as authorities prefer to go soft on the telecom sector for obvious reasons.

Mobile phone operators also overcharge subscribers, who end up paying more money for less talk time, and other tactics were also employed to fleece consumers, he said, adding that one reason for this continued trend of economic crime was the lack of capacity of the tax collectors to monitor the cellular companies.

The Chairman PEW said that there were some underdeveloped areas in the country where some taxes are not applicable.

Olive cultivation to bring about economic revolution, sustainable growth: experts

LAHORE (APP): Experts on Sunday said that the government, by bringing an available potential area of about 10 million acres under olive cultivation in Punjab, is bringing about a silent revolution for the sustainable development growth of the country.

With a considerable increase in the area under potential cultivation, Pakistan is passing through a silent revolution of olive oil production, they opined. Talking to APP, they said that in all parts of the country, particularly the Pothohar region, Balochistan, Khyber-

Pakhtunkhwa and erstwhile Fata, Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK) and Gilgit-Baltistan areas, olive cultivation fertility is most suitable and have natural growthable environment while providing fruitful conditions. Given its potential for growing olive plantations, Pothohar has been termed an ‘olive valley’ where over 1.2 million olive plants are being grown on an area of 11,125 acres, engaging about 1,300 farmers, said Dr. Muhammad Tariq, national project director for the promotion of olive

cultivation. More than half the plants have started bearing fruit since 2019-20's cropping period, producing 5,118 tonnes of olive oil. By the fall of 2024, the value of olive production will increase to Rs1.727 billion, he said.

In Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa, over a million olive plants are being grown on an area of 9,391 acres engaging 768 farmers. The production of olive oil is estimated to reach the value of Rs1.458bn in 2024, Dr Tariq informed.

Likewise, in Balochistan, over half a

million plants are being grown over an area of over 9,391 acres and it is expected that by closing December, 2024, the value of oil will be Rs1.160bn.

In Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) and AJK, over 50,000 plants are being grown on an area of 455 acres of land engaging 228 farmers. The value of oil by 2024 is expected to be Rs71 million, he told.

To a query, he said that in 2024, the country will have about 3m fruit-bearing olive plants producing roughly 1,415 tonnes of olive oil with an estimated value of

Rs4.416bn. The climate change ministry also plans to plant 1m olive plants.

Edible oil is an everyday use food item. Pakistan has been chronically deficient in its production. More than 80 per cent of the domestic requirements are met through imports, he added. Dr Waqas Cheema, a scientific officer at Promotion of Olive Cultivation Project, told APP that over 1.5 million olive plants have already been planted under Promotion of Olive Cultivation Project Phase-II, across the country.

CM KP announces relief package for rains affected families in KP

PESHAWAR (APP): Chief Minister Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Ali Amin Khan Gandapur on Sunday announced compensation package for the affected families due to rains in the province.

The Chief Minister directed the Relief Secretary to compile reports on the affected and the damages incurred due to rains.

Detailed information about the life and property losses across the province should be collected, the Chief Minister's instructed.

He announced relief

checks of Rs1 million for the killed, Rs 300,000 for severely injured and Rs 50,000 for those who received moderate injuries.

Financial compensation will also be provided for property damages caused by the rains.

The Chief Minister has instructed the concerned Divisional Commissioners to coordinate efforts and promptly provide relief to the affected.

He also directed to restore the closed roads due to heavy snowfall and rain.

27 persons killed, 38 injured due to rains in KP: PDMA

PESHAWAR (APP): At least 27 persons were killed and 38 were reported injured due rains for the last 48 hours, said DG Provincial Disaster Management Authority (PDMA).

33 houses were reported completely destroyed while 129 partially.

The Chief Minister has directed to provide relief and compensation cheques to the affected families. He also directed for opening of closed road and provide facilities to

people stuck in rains and landsliding.

The Chief Minister also directed PDMA, Rescue 1122, district administrations to be alert and facilitate people.

Apart from humans, reports about perishing of livestock has also been received from authorities of Rescue 1122 KP.

2 people killed in different incidents in Attock

ATTOCK (APP): Two people, among them a teenage teacher of a private school were killed in two different incidents in various parts of Attock on Sunday, police and rescue sources said.

In the first incident, a teenage teacher of a private school was going to her house when she reached Mohallah Subalan, she slipped and drowned in a drainage line in the limits of Fatehjang Police Station. Later, Rescue 1122 retrieved her body and shifted to the Tehsil Headquarters Hospital in Fatehjang, where she was declared dead. Separately, an employee of the Municipal Committee, Hassanabdal, lost his life while repairing a street light in Mohallah Shaheedabad.

International News

Many aid distribution victims were shot in Gaza: UN

Monitoring Desk GAZA CITY: A UN team has reported seeing "a large number" of gunshot wounds among Gazans after Israeli troops opened fire on Palestinian civilians scrambling for food supplies near an aid convoy, killing 115 people and wounded more than 750.

The aid convoy deaths pushed the number of Palestinian dead in Gaza since Oct 7 to 30,320, mostly women and children. Hossam Abu Safiya, director of Gaza City's Kamal Adwan Hospital, said all the casualties it admitted were hit by "bullets and shrapnel from (Israeli) occupation forces".

There are contradictions within the Israeli claims; BBC News reported that officials first

claimed that "dozens of Gazans were injured as a result of pushing and trampling" during looting, then saying that tanks in the area "tried to disperse the mob with a few warning shots".

In a video statement posted on X, the Israeli armed forces spokesman, Rear Admiral Daniel Hagari claimed: "Hundreds became thousands and things got out of hand."

A UN team visited some of the wounded from the aid incident, in Gaza City's Al Shifa Hospital, on Friday and saw a "large number of gunshot wounds", a spokesperson for UN chief Antonio Guterres said.

The hospital received 70 of the dead, and around 200 wounded were still there during the team's

visit. 11 Palestinians killed separately, at least 11 Palestinians were killed on Saturday when an Israeli air strike hit a tent in Rafah, in Gaza's south where people have been seeking refuge from Israel's devastating bombardment.

Another 50 people were wounded in the strike next to a hospital in the Tel Al Sultan area of Rafah. One of the dead was a medic at the hospital. "The strike hit one tent, where people took shelter, directly, shrapnel came inside the hospital where I and friends were sitting, we survived by a miracle," a witness said by phone from the area.

And in the territory's north, three people searching for food in farmland in Beit Hanoun were killed by Israeli strikes.

Malaysia says MH370 search must go on, 10 years after plane vanished

Monitoring Desk SUBANG JAYA: Malaysia is pushing for a renewed search for Malaysia Airlines Flight MH370, the transport minister said on Sunday, as the 10th anniversary of its disappearance in one of the world's greatest aviation mysteries approaches.

Flight MH370, a Boeing 777 carrying 227 passengers and 12 crew, vanished en route from Kuala Lumpur to Beijing on March 8, 2014.

Malaysian investigators initially did not rule out the possibility that the aircraft had been deliberately taken off course, and debris, some confirmed and some believed to be from

the aircraft, has washed up along the coast of Africa and on islands in the Indian Ocean.

Malaysian Transport Minister Anthony Loke said US seabed exploration firm Ocean Infinity had been invited to discuss its latest search proposal after two previous failed attempts.

"The Malaysian government is committed to the search (for MH370) and the search must go on," Loke said at a remembrance event on Sunday.

Malaysia engaged Ocean Infinity in 2018 to search the southern Indian Ocean, offering to pay up to \$70 million if it found the plane.

Around 9000 women killed by Israeli forces in Gaza since October last year

GAZA (Online): Around 9000 women were killed by Israeli forces in Gaza since October last year. This was reported by UN Women, a United Nations agency dedicated to gender equality and the empowerment of women.

It called the war in besieged Gaza as a war on women. The agency said that roughly thirty seven mothers are killed every day, leaving their families devastated and their children with diminished protection. According to Gaza's Ministry of Health, at least 50 people were injured in drone attack.

Zelensky seeks Western air defence systems as Russian attacks kill 10

Monitoring Desk KYIV: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky on Saturday urged the West to deliver more air defence systems as a wave of Russian missile, drone and artillery strikes killed at least ten people.

Seven were confirmed dead, including a three-month-old baby and a two-year-old child, after an overnight drone strike on the southern port city of Odesa. Separate shelling attacks on the frontline Kharkiv, Kherson and Zaporizhzhia regions killed another three, Ukrainian officials said.

"Russia continues to hit civilians," Zelensky said in a post on social media.

"We need more air defences from our partners. We need to strengthen the Ukrainian air shield to add

more protection for our people from Russian terror. More air defence systems and more missiles for air defence systems save lives," he said.

Ukraine is currently on the back foot in the two-year war as a crucial \$60-billion aid package is held up in the United States congress.

In Odesa, "a nine-storey building was destroyed as a result of an attack by Russian terrorists," Interior Minister Igor Klymenko said on Saturday in a post on Telegram.

The attack killed at least seven people, including a three-month-old baby, Klymenko said. Another child, aged two, was also among the dead, Odesa region Governor Oleg Kiper said on state TV.

UK PM Sunak rails against 'extremism' after Galloway's win

Monitoring Desk LONDON: For the first time since he became prime minister 16 months earlier, Rishi Sunak made an impromptu speech from outside his office, not to call a general election but to rail against extremist groups, which, according to him, are trying to tear the nation apart.

Standing in the rain, his back to 10 Downing Street, PM Sunak in speech to the nation on Friday night said: "There is no 'context' in which it can be acceptable to beam antisemitic tropes onto Big Ben in the middle of a vote on Israel/Gaza. And there can be no cause you can use to justify the support of a proscribed terrorist group, like Hamas. Yes, you can freely criticise the actions of this government, or indeed any government: that is a fundamental democratic right. But no, you cannot

use that as an excuse to call for the eradication of a state — or any kind of hatred or antisemitism."

After months of pro-Gaza public demonstrations and growing pressure on both the government and Labour party to take a tougher stance on Israel, it appears that the victory of George Galloway in a by-election in the erstwhile Labour stronghold of Rochdale is the straw that broke the camel's back.

He won with overwhelming numbers that night, beating both the Labour and Tory candidate by wide margins.

A much-loathed figure in British politics for his populist rhetoric, pro-Gaza Galloway lured Rochdale's Muslim voters through a targeted campaign centering on Gaza and the British government's silence on Israel's continued bombardment.

Europe battles powder shortage to supply shells for Ukraine

Monitoring Desk PARIS: Hard-to-find gunpowder is hindering Europe's scramble to provide hundreds of thousands of shells for Ukraine's defensive effort against Russian invaders, with solutions only starting to emerge.

"We have all become aware of the need to face up to the scarcity of some components, especially gunpowders," French President Emmanuel Macron said Monday after a gathering of Kyiv's allies in Paris. "Powder is really what's lacking today," he

added.

Gunpowder goes into propellant charges that hurl artillery shells—such as the NATO-standard 155-millimetre projectiles used in many guns sent to Ukraine—over distances of tens of kilometres.

"A simple explosive artillery shell has three parts. It has a steel casing, a high-explosive main charge and a detonator" usually set to trigger the blast on impact, said Johann Hoecherl, a munitions expert at the German armed forces university in Munich.

Spanish tourist gang-raped in India

Monitoring Desk MUMBAI: Three men were arrested on Saturday after the gang rape of a Spanish tourist on a motorbike trip through India's remote east with her husband, local media reports said. The attack took place on Friday night in the Dumka district of Jharkhand, where the couple had stopped to camp the night in a tent. The woman was able to reach a police patrol van at around 11pm and was taken to hospital for treatment, police officer Pitamber Singh Kherwar told The Times of India newspaper. Kherwar said police had detained three people in connection with the attack and were on the hunt for more suspects.

The Spanish woman is being treated at a local hospital in Dumka and an investigation is underway, reports said. An average of nearly 90 rapes were reported in India every day in 2022, according to data by the National Crime Records Bureau.

Australia PM defends action on cost of living amid by-election

Monitoring Desk SYDNEY: Voters went to the polls on Saturday in a by-election in Australia's Victoria state seen as a referendum on Prime Minister Anthony Albanese's handling of cost of living pressures across the country.

Australian households have been under broad financial pressure from high

inflation, which although recently easing has prompted the nation's central bank to hike interest rates by 425 basis points since May 2022 to a 12-year top of 4.35%.

"We know people have done it tough through cost of living pressures, but we've been prepared to take action, decisive action."

India navy to open strategic base near Maldives

Monitoring Desk NEW DELHI: India's navy has said it is bolstering forces on "strategically important" islands close to the Maldives, with a new base set to open just days before Male starts sending home Indian forces. Relations between India and the Maldives have soured since pro-China President Mohamed Muizzu won elections last year after promising to expel Indian forces.

He held positions as a Member of the Punjab Assembly from 1988 to 1990 and a Member of the National Assembly from 1990 to 1993. He later served as Leader of the Opposition in the Punjab Assembly from 1993 to 1996. In 1997, he was elected Chief Minister of Punjab and served till 1999 when as a result of coup, his government, along with the federal government, was toppled.

He spearheaded the establishment of the Metro Bus System, providing state-of-the-art traveling facilities in Lahore, Multan, and Rawalpindi/ Islamabad. The transformative projects like the

Shahbaz Sharif's first stint of the premiership spanned from April 11, 2022 to August 14, 2023. He was elected by the Pakistan Democratic Movement (PDM) by ousting Imran Khan through a vote of no confidence in the National Assembly. Coming from a re-

Since 2018 till becoming the premier in 2022, he has served as the leader of the Opposition in the National Assembly, advocating for democracy, human rights, and the rule of law.

Shehbaz Sharif's government made significant reforms in the health sector, including the division of health departments into specialized healthcare and primary/secondary healthcare, and establishment of new hospitals, medical universities, and innovative institutions like the Pakistan Kidney and Liver Institute and Research Center, as well as the country's first forensic laboratory.

During his first stint, Shehbaz Sharif's government faced multiple challenges including the historic floods of 2022 which submerged nearly one-third of the country and affected 33 million people leaving an adverse impact on the national economy.

Under his leadership, Pakistan swiftly tackled its energy crisis, completing the Sahiwal Coal Power Plant in a record 22 months and implementing three RLNG-power projects in Punjab.

However, the prudent economic policies of his government averted the country's economic default.

He spearheaded the establishment of the Metro Bus System, providing state-of-the-art traveling facilities in Lahore, Multan, and Rawalpindi/ Islamabad. The transformative projects like the

Gohar says assembly isn't bogus, Qaiser and others still claim it

ISLAMABAD (INP): The Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC) is seemingly divided over the stated position on the nature of newly-elected National Assembly, as Barister Gohar said they were not labelling the House as "bogus" while Asad Qaiser insisted that the rival parties had a fake mandate.

He would be fake prime minister elected on the basis of fake votes," he claimed and added that they would ponder upon all the available options.

Talking to reporters outside the Parliament House on Sunday, Gohar said he was not using the word bogus for the assembly and would not escape the democratic process to leave the field open for the other parties. Amid the reports that the PTI members – who have joined the assemblies under the banner of SIC (Sunni Ittehad Council) after winning the recently-held polls as independents – are mulling over boycotting the session convened to elect the new prime minister, Gohar said they would have their opposition and parliamentary leader. "We won't boycott, we will compete against them."

Qaiser said they enjoyed the right to protest and would exercise the same, as he, like other party leaders, questioned the mandate of the other.

But in complete contrast, Asad Qaiser, sepa-

rate, said they were of the view that the rival parties had fake mandate and the person elected as prime minister would not have any legal standing.

Similar views were repeated by Ali Muhammad Khan who told reporters inside the Parliament House that the competition was between the "original" (Omar Ayub) and "bogus" (Shehbaz Sharif) mandate for the prime minister's office.

503,261 illegal Afghans returned to their homeland

ISLAMABAD (INP): Repatriation of illegal foreign immigrants including Afghans to their homeland Afghanistan is continuing in a dignified and safe manner, reported on Sunday. As per details, 5033 illegal Afghan nationals returned to their country from February 25 till March 2, taking the total number of returned immigrants to 503,261.

Azad Kashmir were sent to Afghanistan. Efforts were made to send migrants to Afghanistan from Peshawar, and other borders, and Angoor Adda in Kharlachi. A total of 3956 people were sent to Afghanistan via the Angoor Adda border, while 698 people were sent to Afghanistan from the Kharlachi border. It is pertinent to mention here that Pakistan reaffirmed its commitment to peace and prosperity in Afghanistan at a conference titled 'Afghanistan's Regional Cooperation Initiative' held at capital of the war-torn country. Ambassador of Pakistan in Kabul Ubaid Nizamani emphasized that the region must work together to harness mutually beneficial connectivity potential and address shared concerns.

Over 217 families including 1573 men, 1048 women and 2412 children returned to Afghanistan in 204 vehicles. Earlier, 233 Afghan nationals were sent to Afghanistan via the Torkham border.

According to details, a total of 6623 migrants were sent to Afghanistan, and another 5299 immigrants from Pakhtunkhwa, 138 from Islamabad, 1152 from Punjab, and 34 from

Closer scrutiny of seized Karachi-bound ship deflates Indian propaganda

ISLAMABAD (INP): India's propaganda concerning the seizure of a Karachi-bound ship at Mumbai's Nhava Sheva Port has been discredited upon closer examination.

According to Kashmir Media Service, allegations suggesting links to Pakistan's nuclear program have been found to be entirely unfounded and concocted, representing nothing more than an attempt to undermine specific businesses through misrepresentation.

The CMA CGM Attila-a Malta-flagged commercial vessel was seized on the baseless charge of transporting a dual-use consignment with probable links to Pakistan's nuclear programme. Among the products withheld, is a Computer Numerical Control (CNC) machine, a standard piece of equipment used for precise manufacturing in a variety of industries, including the automobile sector.

While there have been claims about the potential use of CNC machines in military applications, it is important to remember that such machines are routinely used for legitimate fabrication purposes and are not restricted objects. A thorough review of the equipment's specifications reveals that it is widely used for commercial purposes.

As regards needful documentation, all shipment-related transactions were undertaken through transparent banking channels and fully documented. The shipment was intended for import by a

Karachi-based commercial company that specializes in selling parts to Pakistan's automobile industry. There is no convincing evidence to substantiate any suspicion of illegal intent behind the transaction.

The claims made by Indian security forces and repeated by chosen media sources appear to be part of a larger effort to undermine specific groups. Such unfounded accusations not only degrade the reputations of individuals involved, but also demonstrate the dangers of misinformation and arbitrary disruptions in global trade.

OIC-CERT hosts cybersecurity Roundtable at MWC 2024
