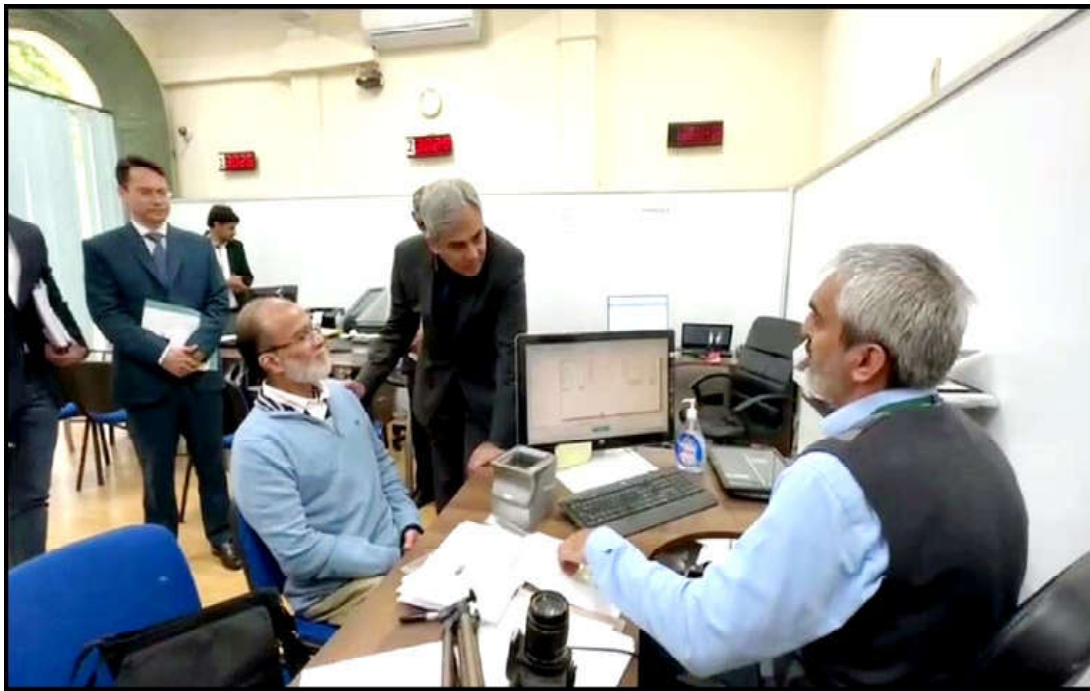

Naqvi orders expedited passport issuance for overseas Pakistanis

Visits passport, NADRA centers in London

ISLAMABAD (APP): Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi visited London Passport and National Database and Registration Authority (NADRA) Centers and directed urgent and normal passports to be issued to overseas Pakistanis within seven and 30 Days respectively.

According to the press release received on Sunday, Naqvi visited the passport and NADRA centres in London on Wednesday and took notice of the delays in the issuance of passports to overseas Pakistanis. The minister ordered that urgent passports should be issued within seven days and normal passports within 30 days, directing that this policy

should be implemented at all Pakistani missions worldwide.

Previously, overseas Pakistanis had to wait for four months for a normal passport and one and a half months for an urgent passport. The minister emphasised that any delay in issuing passports would not be tolerated and action would be taken against officials responsible for it.

To ensure timely delivery of passports, the Interior Minister established a monitoring cell, which would be headed by his PSO, ASP Sher Bano Naqvi.

Overseas Pakistanis who do not receive their passports within the specified time can file a complaint

at the following email address: complaints.passport@interior.gov.pk

The minister also took notice of the staff shortage at the passport and NADRA centres and directed effective staff management to address the issue.

During his visit, Mohsin Naqvi met with the staff of the passport and NADRA centres and directed them to issue passports to overseas Pakistanis within the specified time. He appreciated the performance of NADRA staff and encouraged them to continue providing efficient services to overseas Pakistanis.

CM Maryam orders early completion of Lahore development plan

LAHORE (APP): Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz Sharif on Sunday chaired a meeting to review progress on the Lahore development plan, which includes the provision of drainage system, construction of access roads and streets, installation of streetlights and restoration of parks.

The CM said a durable end-to-end waste disposal system will be developed in each zone of Lahore. She directed authorities concerned to set up a dedicated 'Project Management Unit' to ensure effective implementation of the development plan.

The Chief Minister also approved a proposal to use separate colours for the identification of each zone.

Earlier, Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz Sharif was briefed that the construction, repair and

development of 6 zones of Lahore including Ravi, Shalimar, Samanabad, Data Ganj Bakhs, Nishtar Town, Gulberg and Railway area will be undertaken in Phase-I. At a cost of Rs 74 billion 15 crore, Phase-I is expected to be completed within 10 months, and will benefit more than 93 lac people living in these 6 zones.

The Chief Minister was also apprised that the construction, repair and development of other zones including Allama Iqbal, Wagah and Aziz Bhatti, under Phase-II, will start after the completion of Phase I. Senator Pervaiz Rashid, Senior Provincial Minister Marriyum Aurangzeb, Minister for Local Government & Community Development Zeeshan Rafique and Special Assistant Zeeshan Malik attended the meeting.

Launched in 2013, the CPEC, a flagship project of the China-proposed Belt and Road Initiative, is a corridor linking Gwadar Port in southwest Pakistan's Balochistan province with Kashgar in Northwest China's Xinjiang Uygur Autonomous Region, which highlights energy, transport, and industrial cooperation in the first phase, while the new phase expands to the fields such as agriculture and livelihood, among others.

KARACHI: Millions of Karachiites marched at Shahrah-e-Faisal, demanding an end to the genocide in Gaza carried out by the Zionist regime of Israel.

Dutch courage

The Election Commission of Pakistan continues to act as if it has no interest in ensuring fairness. Just days after it was ordered by a Lahore High Court judge to notify six more election tribunals for Punjab, for which nominations had been sent weeks earlier by the LHC chief justice, a senior ECP official, responding to a reporter's question, brushed aside the injunction as "meaningless".

It seems the ECP had grown more confident about defying the LHC since Commission officials met the law minister and attorney general to discuss, among other things, the controversial ordinance passed recently by the acting president, Senate Chairman Yousuf Raza Gilani. The ordinance in question empowers the Commission to appoint whoever it pleases to election tribunals without worrying about what the LHC chief justice has to say.

It bears highlighting that these election tribunals are supposed to rule on complaints made by losing candidates against the irregularities and illegalities they claim were committed during the vote-counting process. Many of these claims — especially those pertaining to changing results — have been supported by the findings of independent observers, election watchdogs, and even statements made by other losing candidates. In recent weeks, the courts have also separately overturned several controversial decisions by the ECP concerning the recounting of votes and changing of results well after the elections were concluded.

As regards the matter at hand, it bears recalling that the LHC chief justice had sent a list of nominations to the ECP for the purpose of appointing more tribunals in Punjab, where the number of complaints far exceeds the capacity of the two tribunals that have already been appointed. For weeks, the ECP sat on these nominations and refused to appoint more tribunals till Mr Gilani's ordinance came along like a deus ex machina to do away with the 'problem' entirely.

The ECP can now appoint whichever judge it pleases, be they retired or serving, to sit in judgement against its own decisions. It will be difficult not to view with deep suspicion the fact that the ECP, which is constitutionally mandated to ensure non-partisanship in all election-related matters, seems to have agreed to lean on an ordinance, one of the most patently undemocratic legislative tools available, just so it may bypass Section 140 of the Elections Act as it existed in its original condition.

One wonders how this will engender public faith in the impartiality or fairness of the tribunals that will eventually be formed by such blatant disregard for checks and balances. Alas, the Commission has been supported wholeheartedly in implementing its twisted interpretations of the democratic process by some willing collaborators in the legislature. They must take stock of the long-term harm their actions are causing to the Pakistani democracy.

Gaza in flames

Nothing seems to make Israel stop its murderous spree and war crimes in Gaza. Besides killing and injuring thousands, Israeli military operations have impeded humanitarian access, pushing Gaza to the brink of famine.

On May 20, the International Criminal Court's chief prosecutor applied for warrant to arrest senior members of the Israeli and Hamas leadership. Tel Aviv termed the move "disgraceful", while President Biden called it "outrageous". Twelve Republican US senators wrote a threatening letter to the ICC that if "you target Israel, we will target you".

On May 24, the International Court of Justice ordered Israel to halt its offensive in Rafah. South Africa had brought this case before the ICJ, accusing Israel of subjecting the Palestinians to a genocide. Israel refused to accept the order. Instead, it carried out deadly air strikes (May 26) against Palestinians, killing 45 and injuring over 100.

On May 29, Algeria, on behalf of the Arab states, circulated a proposed resolution calling for an immediate humanitarian ceasefire. While most countries welcomed the Algerian initiative, the US lost no time in vetoing it, while the UK abstained.

Despite the recent ICJ orders, and an earlier call by 153 member states of the UN General Assembly in December 2023, Israel continues to defy demands to protect civilians and uphold humanitarian obligations in Gaza. Israel's daily assaults have demonstrated that there is no longer any rules-based international order. The spirit of multilateralism and respect for human

rights have been battered by the ongoing relentless show of unilateralism in Gaza.

Why is Israel rejecting every call to stop its killing spree? One obvious reason is the unending support it receives from the US and some European countries. These countries have often lectured the world on the sanctity of human rights, yet they are reluctant to condemn what Israel's military is doing to defenceless civilians. The double standards of these champions of human rights have been exposed.

Yet, one is encouraged to see how the people in the US and Europe have come out to condemn the excessive use of force by Israel. Special tribute must be paid to the students of leading universities in the US, who have risked their academic careers but have not stepped back from voicing their support for the oppressed. Some European governments are now responding to the calls of their people. Spain, Ireland, and Norway have announced formal recognition of the state of Palestine. Several others had already done so, including Sweden, Hungary, Poland, Romania, and Bulgaria. The UK and Australia are also considering recognition.

Sadly, the Muslim world has not been able to exert enough pressure on Israel to stop its atrocities in Gaza. Iran, however, has emerged as a country that has demonstrated its capability to give a punishing response to Israeli aggression while avoiding a wider war.

What is Israel's endgame? Some analysts argue that Israel would like to see all Gazans pushed into Egypt via the Rafah crossing so that its

cherished goal of a Greater Israel can be fulfilled. Others opine that Israel will continue its war until Hamas has been destroyed — for that it enjoys complete American support. Nikki Haley, former governor of South Carolina, was seen recently writing 'Finish them' on an artillery shell in Israel.

Clearly, the key to ending the war in Gaza is in the hands of the US. However, the Israel lobby in the US is so strong that the government is unable to stop Tel Aviv from what it is doing to innocent civilians. John Mearsh-heimer of the University of Chicago and Stephen Walt of Harvard's Kennedy School of Government wrote a book in 2007 titled The Israel Lobby and US Foreign Policy that describes how this lobby nudges US foreign policy in a pro-Israel direction, which in their view is not in America's national interest and not even in Israel's long-term interest.

Meanwhile, Benjamin Netanyahu is becoming increasingly unpopular in his own country as well. In a poll conducted by the Israel Democracy Institute recently, only 15 per cent of respondents wanted Netanyahu to continue in office after the war in Gaza ends. There is also the financial stress that this war is inflicting on Israel's economy. International opinion is fast developing against Israel.

Netanyahu and his cohorts will soon discover that Israel cannot buy peace for itself by making others insecure. He would be well-advised to remember what Albert Einstein said: "Peace cannot be kept by force. It can only be achieved by understanding." -- Courtesy Dawn

Paper cuts

I am not alone in worrying about the future of journalism. I learned this in my conversations (in person and online) with journalism instructors in the US, Canada and Armenia. Then there are the many conversations I have with my friend, ZB, a journalist and media instructor in Karachi: how do we get young people to read the paper or how can the mainstream media reduce the trust deficit with its audience? What will happen to journalism as the government doubles down on its efforts to tighten a muzzle on us? Instructors and practitioners in the US, for example, have plenty of reason to worry because it's been a terrible year with layoffs at Los Angeles Times, Vice, Deadspin, to name a few. Northwestern University, my alma mater, estimates that by year's end, the country may lose one-third of all its newspapers and two-thirds of all its newspaper staff since 2005. They say this will increase news deserts across the US.

Where will people turn to for news then? Many news outlets in the US were bought by Big Billionaire Businesses which seem to employ a similar strategy: buy distressed newspapers for cheap, lay off staff and then earn profit from papers' advertising revenues.

In its reporting in 2020, Vanity Fair referred to one New York-based hedge fund — which owned among many papers the LA Times until it was bought by biotech billionaire doctor Patrick Soon-Shiong in 2018 — as a "vampire that bleeds newspapers dry".

It wasn't always like this, but at least in the US, newspapers were owned by a small group of families because they were good in-

vestments. The decline began with the disruption caused by the internet and then the 2009 recession. Some papers struggled more because they invested in print rather than digital. "When the time came to ask people to pay for content," one editor told Vanity Fair, "it came at the same time when the content had been diminished. That kind of set the table."

This is true for media in Pakistan where I only know of Profit magazine that has a paywall and subscribers, allowing them to practice independent journalism. Big Billionaires who invested in failing newspapers did so because they were "looking for profit maximisation over the next few years" as the editor said. When the quest is for profit, reporting will fall by the wayside. Today, 'journalist' has been replaced with 'content manager'.

Big Billionaires don't put money back into the paper and if they do, it is often at the cost of local journalism. The world's third richest man, Jeff Bezos owns the Washington Post, which he bought for \$250m in 2013, made it profitable but then a decade later laid off 240 staff members. The New York Times bought the Boston Globe for a whopping \$1.1bn in 1993 but sold it for \$70 million in 2013 to John Henry, a billionaire who owns a baseball team. He claims the paper has been profitable since 2018, but this is disputed by media insiders who say "the billionaires who wanted to save the news industry are losing a fortune".

The idea that benevolent billionaires will save journalism is flawed. Also, rich men buying media don't adhere to newspapers' principle: holding the powerful to account.

Who then is left to

be the country's — and communities' — watchdog? Vloggers whose motivation is solely to earn money off the audiences they lure in with their 'journalism'? The disinformation machinery in Pakistan is truly mind-boggling and I'm curious to see whether the new defamation law will help calm the storms created by some of these vloggers.

The problem is the media industry hasn't figured out a way to create a business model that is not dependent on the market — advertising, subscriptions, etc. (There are exceptions like The New York Times and Wall Street Journal.)

We face new challenges in how to get quality journalism out to audiences. This requires new thinking: whether it is treating journalism as a public good, non-profit journalism, journalist owned co-operative models. This means rethinking journalism as something that just can't be monetised. This is why we should support calls for a robust public media system that receives funding but is independent and produces quality journalism for the sake of public good. So far, we've seen governments in power use PTV, for example, as a loudspeaker to advertise their policies and quash dissent. This is not the model Pakistanis deserve. It may seem rich (pardon the pun) of me to demand a poor government create a fund for public media even though it has the funds for lavish renovation projects. But until then, I hope you will be wary of billionaires buying media everywhere. What is their motive? Surely, it is not our well-being and right to information in a fair manner.

Real estate – Paying price of an economic gimmickry

ISLAMABAD (APP): Billions of rupees black money was thrown to the real estate basket when former Premier Imran Khan announced incentives for tax evaders, paving way for whitening their black money and resultantly creating an artificial boom in this sector.

Seeing the market dynamics hundreds of thousands common people with moderate income also stepped in having a desire to buy some property for their kids and future needs. But, they were mistaken as the bulk

investors sold out their properties to individual buyers and made their way leaving them in turmoil.

If some invested their retirement dues, the others invested their savings or the provident fund money — they were accumulating penny after penny over the decades with an innocent desire of getting their children married after earning some profit by selling their plots.

But, swayed by desire to have an abode, they fell prey to real estate tycoons least knowing about their exploitive tendencies and plans to suck their hard earned money.

Some developers and builders described the PTI era boom in real estate as a bubble that when burst, washed away the belonging of hundreds of thousands small investors leaving them in dire desperation.

"This policy of the previous government was a severe blow to real estate sector as the tax evaders escaped by whitening their money and faulty policies supplemented by economic recession struck billions of rupees of common people," said a builder Falak Khan.

"The previous government ruined real estate sector. The artificial bubble has burst leaving hundreds of thousands investors in lurch."

He opined that a gradual development in this sector could have ensured sustainability. "But, abruptly forging ahead has trapped local investors as well as overseas Pakistanis. Therefore, the government should seriously look into this crisis and bail out small investors."

Seeing the series of events, one can easily understand how the poor

people are deprived of their money. Firstly, there is a bobby trap of small down or advance payment; then an affordable installments payment plan and promises of early delivery of plots.

But, when there is good response in buying files, the society owners oversell files meaning that more files than the actual land acquired for a society. Once the bulk stock of files is sold out, they themselves float rumors that society does not have required land that result in panic selling of files by the investors.

Zelensky accuses China of pressuring other countries not to attend upcoming Ukraine peace talks

SINGAPORE: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky accused China on Sunday of helping Russia to disrupt an upcoming Swiss-organized peace conference on the war in Ukraine.

Speaking at Asia's premier security conference, Zelensky said that China is pressuring other countries and their leaders not to attend the upcoming talks. He did not say which ones.

"Russia, using Chinese influence in the region, using Chinese diplomats also, does everything to disrupt the peace summit," he said at a news conference at the Shangri-La defense forum. "Regrettably this is unfortunate that such a big independent powerful country as China is an instrument in the hands of (Russian leader Vladimir) Putin."

China has staked out what it says is a neutral

position on the war, putting it at odds with Ukraine, the United States and most of Europe. Its trade with Russia has grown, easing the economic impact of Western sanctions. And American, Ukrainian and other intelligence agencies say there is evidence that Chinese parts are winding up in Russian weaponry, even if China is not directly arming its neighbor.

The Swiss had been hoping China would attend the peace conference in mid-June, but Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning signaled on Friday that that was unlikely. China has been calling for a peace conference with equal participation of all sides, including Russia, which has not been invited.

"There is still a clear gap between the arrangements for the meeting and the demands of the Chinese side, as well as the general

expectations of the international community," Mao said. "This makes it difficult for China to participate in the meeting."

The foreign ministry did not respond immediately to a request for comment on Zelensky's accusation.

The Ukrainian leader said of China's pressure on others, "That is not only support to Russia, that is basically support of war."

In a speech to the security conference earlier in the day, Zelensky urged top defense officials to attend the upcoming talks in Switzerland, saying he was disappointed at the failure of some countries to commit to joining.

Chinese Defense Minister Dong Jun spoke before Zelensky at the Shangri-La conference but he did not appear to be in the room when Zelensky made his appeal.

Israel hammers Rafah with tanks and artillery

RAFAH: Israeli forces hammered Rafah in southern Gaza with tanks and artillery on Saturday, hours after US President Joe Biden said Israel was offering a new roadmap towards a full ceasefire.

Residents reported tank fire in the Tal al-Sultan neighbourhood in west Rafah, while witnesses in the east and centre of Rafah described intense shelling. "From the early hours of the night until this morning, the aerial and artillery

bombardment has not stopped for a single moment", a resident from west Rafah told AFP on condition of anonymity. "There are a number of occupation (Israeli) snipers in high-rise buildings overseeing all areas of Tal al-Sultan... making the situation very dangerous," the resident added.

Shortly after Biden's announcement, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu insisted his country would still pursue the war until it had reached all its aims.

Woman among 17 hopefuls registered to replace Raisi

DUBAI: US-sanctioned former Revolutionary Guards commander Vahid Haghanian was among candidates who registered on Saturday to run for election as Iran's president after Ebrahim Raisi died in a helicopter crash, state media reported.

Haghanian, a close aide to Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, told reporters after registering that his qualifications were based on "experience from serving 45 years in the presidency and the leader's

office". The US Treasury designated Haghanian in 2019 among nine individuals in Khamenei's inner circle responsible for "advancing... domestic and foreign oppression".

Iran says most US sanctions are prompted by baseless accusations. Former parliamentary speaker Ali Larijani, a prominent conservative, was among candidates who registered on Friday, as was Abdolnaser Hemmati, a former central bank governor.

Sri Lanka monsoon floods kill 14, schools shut

COLOMBO: Flash floods, mudslides and falling trees have killed at least 14 people in Sri Lanka as the island nation is battered by monsoon storms, the country's disaster centre said on Sunday. Some drowned, including three members of the same family swept away near the capital Colombo on Sunday. Others were buried alive in mudslides, including an 11-year-old girl and a 20-year-old man, the Disaster Management Centre (DMC) said.

Activist arrested for attacking Monet painting in Paris

PARIS: A climate activist was arrested on Saturday for sticking an adhesive poster on a Monet painting at the Musee d'Orsay in Paris to draw attention to global warming, a police source said. The action by the woman, a member of "Riposte Alimentaire" (Food Response) — a group of environmental activists and defenders of sustainable food production — is the latest in a string of protests aimed at drawing attention to global warming by defacing art.

US, South Korea and Japan agree to hold joint military exercises

SEOUL: The United States, Japan and South Korea agreed to hold new trilateral joint exercises this summer, a joint statement issued by US Department of Defense said on Sunday, after a meeting of the three allies' defense ministers.

US Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin, Japan's Defense Minister Minoru Kihara and South Korea's Defense Minister Shin Won-sik met on Sunday in Singapore on the sidelines of the annual Shangri-La Dialogue security summit there.

The three "committed to continue to

strengthen trilateral cooperation to ensure peace and stability in the Korean Peninsula, the Indo-Pacific, and beyond," according to the statement.

The three also agreed to establish a Trilateral Security Cooperation Framework this year in an effort to institutionalize their three-way defense cooperation.

The top defense officials of the three countries criticized North Korea's recent launches of ballistic missiles and a military spy satellite using ballistic missile technology as a violation of United Nations Security Council resolutions.

Energy shutdowns hit Ukraine after Russian attacks target infrastructure

KYIV: Ukraine imposed emergency power shutdowns in most of the country on Sunday, a day after Russia unleashed large-scale attacks on energy infrastructure and claimed it made gains in the eastern Donetsk province.

The shutdowns were in place in all but three regions of Ukraine following Saturday's drone and missile attack on energy targets that injured at least 19 people. Ukraine's state-owned power grid operator Ukrenergo said the shutdowns affected both industrial and household consumers. Sustained Russian attacks on Ukraine's power grid in recent weeks have forced the government to institute nationwide rolling blackouts. Without adequate air defenses to counter assaults and allow for repairs, though, the shortages could still

worsen as need spikes in late summer and the bitter-cold winter. Among the most significant recent strikes were an April barrage that damaged Kyiv's largest thermal power plant and a massive attack on May 8 that targeted power generation and transmission facilities in several regions.

Following Saturday's barrage, Ukraine's air force said Sunday that air defenses had shot down all 25 drones launched overnight. Russia claimed Sunday that it had taken control of the village of Uman'ske in the partially Russian-occupied Donetsk region. Russia's coordinated new offensive has centered on Ukraine's northeastern Kharkiv region, but seems to include testing Ukrainian defenses in Donetsk farther south, while also launching incursions in the northern Sumy and Chernihiv regions.

Australia seeks military talks with China, ties with Philippines

SINGAPORE: Australia has asked for military talks with China and is comfortable growing closer to the Philippines, Deputy Prime Minister Richard Marles said on Sunday at the Shangri-La Dialogue security summit.

China and the Philippines are locked in confrontation in the disputed South China Sea and their encounters have grown more tense as Beijing presses its claims to shoals in waters that Manila says are well within its exclusive economic zone. Australia has stepped up its presence in the region and a joint amphibious exercise with the Philippines at Palawan island in August was Australia's biggest outside its own borders last year. Australia has also said its recent encounters with China's military fell

short of being safe and professional, and Marles said he discussed the issue with Chinese defence chief Dong Jun on the sidelines of the conference on Saturday.

"The substantive request that we had out of the meeting with China was to grow the defence dialogue," Marles told Reuters.

"We really want to get it ultimately back to where it was before it was stopped, and that would be at the level of our chiefs of defence force and our secretaries of defence meeting annually," Chinese defence officials met their Australian counterparts in Canberra last year in their first formal meeting since 2019. Since then, Australia has complained of a close encounter with a Chinese jet over the Yellow Sea and sonar being deployed.

India's Modi eyes election victory, top opponent back behind bars

NEW DELHI: A top opponent of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi vowed on Sunday to keep fighting "dictatorship" before he returned to jail Sunday, following elections widely expected to produce another landslide victory for the Hindu-nationalist leader.

Arvind Kejriwal is among several opposition leaders under criminal investigation, with colleagues describing his arrest as a "political conspiracy" orchestrated by Modi's ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). The chief minister of the capital Delhi and a key leader in an alliance formed to compete against Modi, Kejriwal was detained in March over a long-running corruption probe.

Ambassador of Kyrgyzstan says: CASA-1000 to be completed by end of this year 2024

ISLAMABAD (APP): Ambassador of the Republic of Kyrgyzstan to Pakistan, Ulanbek Totuibaev, has said that CASA-1000 would be completed by the end of this year, 2024, which would also meet Pakistan's energy needs and also cause regional integration. "The transmission capacity of the CASA-1000 energy project will be 1300 megawatts, which will be an energy link between Kyrgyzstan, Pakistan, Tajikistan, and Afghanistan to provide clean energy not only to regional countries but also to prove the need of Pakistan's industrial sector," Ambassador of the Republic of Kyrgyzstan to Pakistan, Ulanbek Totuibaev, told APP here.

The ambassador hoped that the CASA-1000 projects would be completed in due time and also

to meet Pakistan's energy needs and enhance bilateral cooperation in the energy sector. He said, "Massive infrastructural projects will be beneficial for all of its stakeholders by fulfilling energy needs and strengthening regional connectivity." Kyrgyz envoy said, "Nowadays, the governments of participating states are actively working on the completion of the project."

Replying to question about the future of the Quadrilateral Trade and Transit Agreement (ATTA) among Pakistan, China, Kyrgyzstan, and Kazakhstan, he hoped that in the near future the potential of the QTTA would be fully utilized.

The ambassador of Kyrgyzstan said, "The mutual trade potential between Pakistan and

Kyrgyzstan is up to \$1 billion, which both countries are moving forward in harmony to achieve."

"By the end of 2023, the bilateral trade volume between the two countries will be \$20.6 million, which is increasing with time."

He said, "This time, the private sector of both countries should go ahead and continue the process of talking to increase bilateral trade, in which the chambers of commerce of both countries are playing their full role."

He said, "Currently, there is an exchange of delegations between the different Chambers of Commerce and Industry of the two countries, and in the next month, many trade delegations from Pakistan will visit Kyrgyzstan and many trade agreements will be signed."

Ashrafi advocates for issuance of structured Fatwa to curb extremism, citing Saudi, Egyptian models

ISLAMABAD (APP): Chairman Pakistan Ulama Council (PUC), Hafiz Muhammad Tahir Mehmood Ashrafi has emphasized the urgent need for fostering dialogue across various societal factions. Speaking at a recent national seminar on 'Countering Violent Extremism', organized by Islamabad Policy Research Institute (IPRI) here, he highlighted the ongoing challenges of violent extremism in Pakistan and said that this call for dialogue would reduce misunderstandings and create an environment of mutual respect among different groups, promoting a more harmonious and resilient community.

Ashrafi further highlighted the importance of implementing Paigham-e-Pakistan, a comprehensive doctrine designed to bridge

gaps between different schools of thought and unify religious scholars and leaders in a joint effort to combat extremism across the nation. "This collaborative strategy is seen as vital for ensuring long-term peace and stability not only in the country but also in the region," he added.

Addressing the misuse of religious decrees, Ashrafi called for the establishment of a mechanism for issuing Fatwas on matters of public importance.

Citing the examples of Dar-ul-Ifita institutions in Saudi Arabia and Egypt, he emphasized the need for a government-level oversight to ensure that religious decrees are issued responsibly and effectively.

He said Dar-ul-Ifita Saudi Arabia and Dar-ul-Ifita Egypt were renowned for their systematic ap-

proach to issuing Fatwas as these institutions employ qualified scholars who deliberate on religious matters in a methodical manner, providing well-considered and balanced religious opinions. He suggested that Pakistan could benefit from adopting a similar model, which would help mitigate the risks associated with arbitrary and unqualified Fatwas that can incite violence and extremism.

Ashrafi proposed taking action against those who issue Fatwas contrary to Shariah, the Quran, and the Sunnah.

He urged religious and political leaders to transcend personal interests for the greater good of society. He called for a united effort to create an enabling environment that promotes the equitable growth of all community members.

PML-N, PPP at odds over power-sharing formula in Punjab

LAHORE (INP): Pakistan Muslim League Nawaz (PML-N) and the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) are at odds over the power-sharing formula in Punjab, sources said on Sunday.

Despite four meetings of the provincial coordination committees of both parties, no progress has been made.

The PPP alleges that PML-N is not showing seriousness regarding the power-sharing formula in Punjab, sources added.

Sources further said that PPP is also concerned that its members in the Punjab Assembly are being ignored in the budget and have not received funds so far. Earlier sources revealed that PML-N is pressing PPP to join the coalition government in Centre.

Sources said that the PML-N has contacted directly and via mutual friends inviting the party to join the government.

The party has been invited to join the federal as well as Punjab government as an ally.

"The PPP didn't respond to the government over the offer, neither the party held consultations over the issue," sources said.

Sources said that the PPP leadership has been under pressure to join the government. The party's parliamentarians from Sindh backing to join the government.

However, a senior party leader from Sindh has vehemently opposed the offer and communicated the opinion to the party's leadership.

The People's Party's Punjab leadership opined to join the government in Punjab instead of the Centre. "The PPP will strengthen in the province by joining the Punjab government," sources said.

All Zonal DSPs were directed to ensure implementation of traffic laws and take action against those involved in creating problems for traffic discipline in the city.

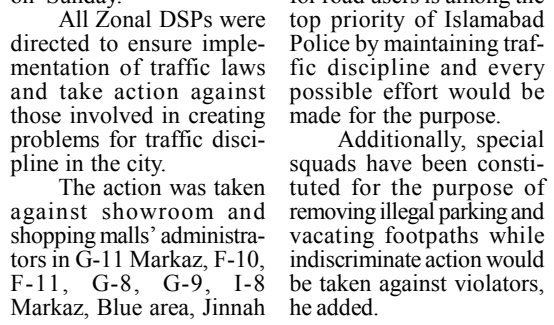

HRCP builds case for constitutional amendment to strengthen LGs

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Human Rights Commission of Pakistan (HRCP) held a consultation in collaboration with Dehleez on the need for constitutional protection for local government by presenting its policy paper, proposing a constitutional amendment of Article 140A. Legislators, policy makers and civil society members debated the paper at length. Director Farah Zia in her introductory remarks, stressed the need for a more comprehensive constitutional protection for the local government bodies.

Zafarullah Khan, civic educator and researcher for HRCP's policy paper, presented on the proposed amendment and expanded on the idea of devolution in other federations across the

world, many of which have provincial constitutions.

He underscored why an amendment, delineating a specific period for local government elections, is essential to guaranteeing that citizens' needs are represented and addressed at every level. Other participants also weighed in on the proposed amendment. PML-N MNA Bilal Kiyani endorsed the idea of a constitutional amendment to ensure the continuity of local governments, and hoped that with the establishment of standing committees and caucuses, it can be reviewed in earnest.

AWP's Farman Ali emphasized the importance of democratizing the political parties alongside constitutional amendments to strengthen local

governance. Other participants, such as PPP representative Sibte Haider Bukhari and FAFEN National Coordinator Rashid Chaudhry, underscored the importance of strengthening local government and deemed it necessary to have further follow-ups to the consultation. HRCP's Council Member Farhatullah Babar proposed enacting a local government law for Islamabad by Islamabad, which could be presented as a model example for other provincial governments.

He further suggested basing the criteria of provincial share in the National Finance Commission award to the provinces' adoption of the UN SDG goals and empowerment of local governments as further incentives.
