Says both militaries continue to engage in bilateral cooperation; No force can destroy brotherhood between two militaries: Chinese Ambassador

RAWALPINDI (Agencies): Revitalising bilateral ties between Pakistan and China, Chief of Army Staff (COAS) General Syed Asim Munir has said that they "are exceptional and have always weathered the vicissitudes of the strategic environment with mutual trust and unwavering belief in each other's support".

The army chief made the remarks on the occasion of the 97th Anniversary of the founding of the People's Liberation Army (PLA) of China hosted at the General Headquarters in Rawalpindi, a statement issued by the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) said on Thursday.

PLA and praised its contribution to Chinese defence, security and the nation's development.

"We stand ready to work with our brethren to combat terrorism and firmly believe that no force can destroy the iron-clad friendship between China and Pakistan and the brotherhood between the two militaries", he concluded.

Prior to this prestigious event, Chinese Minister of the International Department of the Central

Committee of the Communist Party of China (IDPCPC) Liu Jianchao paid a three-day visit to Pakistan last month to co-chair the third meeting of the Pakistan-China Joint Consultative Mechanism (JCM) for the political parties on the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC).

Ahsan Iqbal directs to start work on ML-1 at earliest

ISLAMABAD (APP): Minister for Planning, Development, and Special Initiatives Professor Ahsan Iqbal presided over a meeting on Thursday to review the implementation status of the decisions regarding CPEC projects, especially those made during Prime Minister (PM) Shehbaz Sharif's recent visit to China.

He stressed the need for full preparation by the Ministry of Railways and other concerned departments for this critical meeting.

"Given CPEC's unique status, there are ample growth opportunities. To capitalize on these opportunities, we must be serious about completing the projects included in Phase 2.0," he added. The minister also called for a collaborative effort from all relevant ministries and institutions to ensure the timely completion of CPEC projects.

"The governments of China and Pakistan have agreed to start work on the ML1 project soon. The duration and stages of completion will be determined in the upcoming meeting of the Joint Financing Committee."

Additionally, he urged the Railway and National Highway Authority (NHA) to prepare a comprehensive master plan for road construction across the region.

Despite these setbacks, Ahsan Iqbal stressed the continued importance of CPEC due to Pakistan's strategic geographical position. He urged the Ministry of Railways to expedite the documentation and preparatory steps for the ML1 project.

"During my recent visit to China, we agreed to convene an early meeting of the Joint Financing Committee for the ML1 project, which will take place within a month," he announced.

"The master plan should outline how CPEC and Pakistan can play a pivotal role in connecting the entire region and serve as an engine of global economic growth," he stressed.

A way forward

In the midst of the storm triggered by the government's ill-advised announcement about banning the PTI, there is a ray of hope. Aide to the prime minister Rana Sanaulah clarified that the decision had yet to be okayed by the cabinet. He reportedly told a local publication late Monday that while the government has not finalised its decision, it saw only two choices before it: talks, or all-out war. Mr Sanaulah regretted the fact that PTI founder Imran Khan had not been amenable to talks.

A day later, Deputy PM Ishaq Dar and Defence Minister Khawaja Asif indicated that the matter would be taken forward in consultation with the government's allies and parliament. While the government's stance reflects a paucity of ideas, it is important to note that negotiations and consultation are seemingly not off the table. Before political leaders inflict more damage, they must give talks a chance.

If direct negotiations are not possible, one option the government must consider is to form a parliamentary Committee of the Whole comprising all current lawmakers. The entire gamut of major challenges should be put up for debate before this committee, including security, economic issues and the prevailing socio-political instability. Doing so will help take the attention away from the daily ugliness that defines politics today. It may even provide an opportunity to reset the political narrative: it is unconscionable that all politics is being dominated by the travails and intrigues of a handful of individuals while the masses suffer. Leaders from both sides of the aisle may take the debate as an opportunity to demonstrate to their voters that they are not single-issue politicians; that they are cognisant of the challenges before them and have the capacity and will to work them out.

During this time, the political environment should be improved for there to be constructive engagement between the rival factions. It is the responsibility of the parties in government, as wielders of state power, to create the conditions necessary for constructive talks. It is extremely counterproductive for ministers to come on TV and endorse the ongoing victimisation of political opponents, as there is a very real risk that the short-sighted policies being adopted by various state institutions, which are being celebrated uncritically by the government, may end up sabotaging all hopes for greater 'istehkam'. Stability can only return when the cycle of violence stops. The government would do well to heed these words.

Meanwhile, the PTI must provide a realistic framework for at least the first few rounds of engagements, which preferably does not involve impossible preconditions. A rigid approach will only extend the party's needless suffering till the government breaks, while a give-and-take approach may yield better results. Politics should not be reduced to a zero-sum game.

After the fall

It's emblematic of the current moment in American politics that the incumbent president's physical and mental health remains a bigger cause for concern than that of his challenger even after the latter survived an assassination attempt.

After informing his Praetorian guard that he was keen to be reunited with his shoes, Donald Trump, a couple of streaks of blood running down his face from where a sniper's bullet had grazed his ear, told his Secret Service protectors to wait while he pumped his fist and encouraged his audience to 'Fight, fight, fight!' before he was led offstage. The clenched fist went up once again as he entered a black van.

Images from the incident will no doubt enhance Trump's chances of re-election four years after a defeat that many of his supporters believe was unfairly engineered. His biggest advantage, though, remains his dodging opponent in the race who is barely able to walk, let alone convincingly run.

The Democratic Party ought to have recognised long before the presidential debate debacle of June 27 that relying on Joe Biden to defeat Trump a second time was a mug's game. It has been fairly obvious for what in political terms is an eternity that a physically and intellectually enfeebled president isn't up to the task.

Biden's apparent personal conviction that only he can stave off the serious risk of Trump's return to the White House does not stand up to scrutiny. No one can claim with any certainty that Kamala Harris or another alternative would be an adequate bulwark against the Republican candidate, but their chances of making any kind of impression on the

electorate diminish with each passing day.

This week's choreographed coronation of Trump at the Republican national convention in Milwaukee would have been reminiscent of a Nuremberg rally even without the supplementary advantage of the revanchist führer's injured ear. His running mate is Ohio senator J.D. Vance, who described Trump eight years ago as a putative 'American Hitler'. He later had a MAGA epiphany, and now blames the Democratic campaign for Saturday's violence, even though the motives of the shooter, a 20-year-old registered Republican, are yet to be determined.

It will be both surprising and unfortunate if Biden does not step aside before the Democratic Party's equivalent event in Chicago next month. This year, coincidentally, is being compared to 1968, when a Democratic convention in the same city attracted radical protests and shocking police violence. The likeliest Democratic nominee, Robert F. Kennedy, had been shot dead less than three months earlier, about two months after he shared with a crowd the horrifying news of Martin Luther King Jr's assassination.

The rebels of 1968 were particularly infuriated — like King and, to a lesser degree, Kennedy — by the horrors their nation was perpetrating in Vietnam. Precisely a year before he was cut down, King excoriated his nation's government as "the greatest purveyor of violence in the world today".

He was right then, and he would be right today — but that does not penetrate the consciousness of the American political class, which has vociferously been decrying political violence lately while insouciantly ignoring the extent to which

the repressive apparatus of the state strives to sustain an appalling status quo at home, while taking various organs help to implement it abroad. Foreign policy is supposedly Biden's strong suit. As far as anyone can see, it entails endless conflict between Russia and Ukraine, and the destruction of Palestine.

Biden's record as a borderline segregationist senator beholden to corporate America and the national security state, then as vice president and eventually president, does not add up to much. It's accurate but insufficient to claim that Trump would be much worse. The Clinton and Obama Democratic presidencies paved the way for George W. Bush and Trump. Biden could still bow out to give his possible successor a fighting chance. Divine intervention might be required, given his claim that only the Almighty could persuade him to do the decent thing. But family, friends, allies and donors could help to end what has aptly been described as elder abuse.

The gerontocracy that stretches from the White House to the divided Senate and the rabidly conservative supreme court isn't America's only problem. Chances are that both its global hegemony (Biden claims to 'rule the world') and the viability of the republic founded in 1776 will diminish in November, for better (in the case of the hegemony) or worse. This verse from an ostensibly apolitical song Paul Simon wrote circa 1968 sadly continues to resonate: 'Sitting on a sofa on a Sunday afternoon/ Going to the candidates' debate/ Laugh about it, shout about it/ When you've got to choose/ Every way you look at it you lose.' -- Courtesy Dawn

Karbala glimpses

Communities across the Muslim world, particularly in South Asia and the Middle East, are familiar with the heartrending epic of Karbala, as the event is firmly embedded in the cultural consciousness, crossing sectarian and, in some cases, even religious lines.

Mention the word Karbala in these societies, and images of thirst, suffering and, most of all, the valiant stand of Imam Husain and his committed followers against a numerically superior Syrian/Kufi force immediately emerge. For centuries, depictions of this fateful battle have been heard from the pulpit and sorrowful verses recited in noha and marsiya, as well as details mentioned in historical written accounts (maqatil).

Whoever hears and reads these accounts is struck by the barbarity unleashed upon the children and kinsmen of the Holy Prophet (PBUH) by the Umayyad forces. Yet, glimpses of that barbarity can be seen today, in a land only a few hundred kilometres from the burning desert of Karbala. That land is Gaza, and Israeli forces have, since Oct 7, 2023, unleashed atrocities on Palestine's defenceless people not too different from the cruelty that was the hallmark of Yazid's troops in Karbala.

Fourteen centuries ago, concepts such as protection of non-combatants and prevention of war crimes were nowhere near as well-defined as they are today. Yet, in this supposedly civilised era, those in sharp suits sitting in Tel Aviv have displayed the same disregard for human life and dignity that the Kufi and Syrian legions did on the day of Ashura in 61AH. Yazid may have perished, but the Yazidi

ideology clearly survives.

The similarities between seventh-century Karbala and 21st-century Gaza are uncanny. When Imam Husain's small force, including women and children, arrived at Karbala on the second of Muharram, the Umayyad forces prevented them from getting water from nearby channels. By the time the day of Ashura arrived, the minor children were crying out due to unbearable thirst, yet the Umayyad generals refused the Imam access to water.

Similarly, Gaza has been under an almost airtight Israeli blockade since 2007, described as an open-air prison. After the Oct 7 events, the Israelis have tightened the blockade, using starvation as a weapon, bringing Gaza to the brink of famine. Seeing images of emaciated Palestinian children is unbearable for anyone with a soul. Clearly, the 'only democracy in the Middle East', as some describe Israel, is fine with using cruel seventh-century tactics to starve civilians into submission. Moreover, women and children are supposed to be spared during combat. But in Karbala, the granddaughters and other female relatives of the Holy Prophet were meted out unspeakable treatment. In Nafsal Mahmum, one of the more authentic maqatil compiled by the venerable scholar Shaikh Abbas Qomi, it is written that: "...the ladies were drawn out of the tents and the tents were set on fire. The women of the Prophet's family were bareheaded, bare-foot and marauded similar to the ones in captivity."

The women of Gaza have had to endure similar treatment by the 'world's most moral army'. For example, even The New York Times has said that "nearly 60,000 pregnant women" are

suffering from malnutrition, dehydration and other healthcare complications. During the event of Karbala, the Umayyad forces showed no mercy, not even to children. For example, Hazrat Qasim, the son of Imam Hasan, who was barely in his teens, was martyred in a particularly barbaric fashion by the Umayyad hordes. Moreover, when Imam Husain was left alone in the field, another of Imam Hasan's children, an infant named Abdullah, rushed to his beloved uncle's defence, but was martyred in merciless fashion. And who can forget the youngest martyr of Karbala, Abdullah bin Husain, known as Ali Asghar. The suckling was attacked by a powerful arrow piercing his tiny neck while in the Imam's arms.

In Gaza, thousands of children have been slaughtered by the Israelis, while thousands more have been left orphaned. Heartbreaking images of mothers wailing over their murdered children are enough to move even the most stone-hearted to tears.

Just as 14 centuries ago, the world watched as the grandson of the Holy Prophet and his family members were surrounded and martyred without mercy, similarly today, the global community silently watches the genocidal spectacle playing out in Gaza. But despite their trials and seemingly unending grief, the people of Gaza can take solace from the example of Husain, who lived with dignity, and preferred to die than bow before oppressors. In one of his most famous sermons, Imam Husain emphatically declared "far be it that we accept humiliation". Karbala teaches us that those who bravely resist oppression will live forever, while the oppressors will very soon meet an unedifying fate. -- Courtesy Dawn

Cotton calendar 2024-25 issued for south Punjab farmers after consultations with experts, WWF

MULTAN (APP): Cotton Calendar 2024-25, dubbed as a roadmap to better cotton crop with cost-effective pest control mechanism prescribed under the Integrated Pest Management (IPM) model, was released here Thursday on the orders of Secretary Agriculture South Punjab Saqib Ali Atee after it was finalized following brainstorming by the agriculture department, experts and World Wild Life Fund (WWF). The initiative was a replication of the year 2021 when the first cotton calendar was issued and

farmers had then amassed sizable crop with efficient and cost-effective pest control under the IPM program, said an official release issued here.

The calendar will serve as a comprehensive advisory for farmers who believe the IPM program should continue to be practised on the south Punjab's vast cotton landscape to get higher production.

Farooq Safdar, a cotton farmer from Mauza 5-Kassi Kabirwala, said, it was the IPM program that helped him get 65 Maunds per acre with only two

pesticides spray. Botanical spray proved better against white fly, he added.

A Sadiqabad-based farmer, Muhammad Ishaq said his crop remained safe against white flies and he was able to get 40 Maunds per acre production of cotton.

Muhammad Amin from Chak 109 Yamzan, Bahawalpur, said, low chemical sprays under the IPM plan helped friendly pests remain alive while yellow sticky cards and botanical sprays helped tackle the white fly problem and cotton fiber did suffer blackening.

Israel bombards central Gaza as tanks advance deeper in Rafah

CAIRO: Israeli forces bombarded the Gaza Strip's historic refugee camps in the centre of the enclave and struck Gaza City in the north on Thursday, killing at least 21 people, and tanks pushed deeper into Rafah in the south, health officials and residents said.

A barrage of Israeli airstrikes killed 16 in Zawayda town, Bureij and Nuseirat camps and the overcrowded city of Deir-Al-Balah, the last major urban centre in Gaza not to be invaded by Israeli forces, health officials said. In Gaza City in the north, medics said five Palestinians were killed in two separate strikes.

The Israeli military said in a statement its forces killed two senior Islamic Jihad commanders in two airstrikes in Gaza City, including one whom it said had taken part in the Oct. 7 attack in southern Israel that triggered the Gaza war.

In Rafah, residents said Israeli tanks advanced deeper in the western side of the city and took position on a hilltop there. The Israeli military said forces located several tunnels and killed several gunmen.

At Al-Amal Hospital, run by the Palestinian Red Crescent Society, in Khan Younis in southern Gaza, Palestinian health officials exhumed at least 12 bodies buried inside the medical facility to bury them at another location.

Reuters footage showed medical workers digging up bodies from graves inside the facility, wrapping them in white shrouds before placing them inside vehicles for transfer to a new burial site

as some relatives watched, some in tears.

Areej Hamouda, a mother of one of the dead, clutched some of the sandy earth from the grave of her son and kissed it before medics exhumed the body.

"They (Israel) shot him and he had a loaf of bread with him, which he had to beg for to get for his daughter, they shot him in the eye and the head - it rained on him, he was washed with blood," Hamouda said, weeping. "He was (lying) there all day long, they weren't able to move him, (then) they pulled him with a rope when they brought him to be buried here." The fighting has pushed the 60-bed Red Cross field hospital in Rafah to the brink of capacity, the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) said in a statement on Thursday.

UK's Starmer calls for deeper cooperation on Ukraine and Europe's problems

BLENHEIM PALACE: Britain's new prime minister, Keir Starmer, called on Thursday for closer cooperation in Europe to advance support for Ukraine and tackle the continent's most pressing problems: illegal migration, climate change and energy security.

Opening a meeting of the European Political Community (EPC) of more than 40 nations at Blenheim Palace, the birthplace of Winston Churchill, Starmer made his bid for a reset in post-Brexit ties with the European Union.

He distanced himself from the previous Conservative government which had threatened to withdraw from an international treaty on human rights, offering other European leaders a clean slate.

"Under my leadership, Britain will be a

Philippines, China to set up new channels to handle South China Sea rows

MANILA: The Philippines and China have agreed to set up new lines of communication to improve their handling of maritime disputes, according to a document and a Philippine diplomatic source, as ties sour over clashes about territory in the South China Sea.

The two countries have traded barbs repeatedly over jurisdiction in the contested South China Sea as the Philippines, emboldened by support of defence ally the United States, challenges China's permanent presence around strategic features in

side Manila's exclusive economic zone. Three communication channels would be established specifically for maritime issues, according to the source, who provided a document with highlights of an "Arrangement on Improving Philippines-China Maritime Communication Mechanisms", which was signed on July 2. "China has always been committed to working with the Philippines to properly address maritime issues through dialogue and consultation." Foreign ministry spokesperson Lin Jian told a briefing when asked about the agreement.

Biden tests positive for Covid, will self-isolate in Delaware

WASHINGTON: US President Joe Biden, under pressure from fellow Democrats to drop his reelection campaign, tested positive for Covid-19 while visiting Las Vegas on Wednesday and is self-isolating after experiencing mild symptoms, the White House said. White House press secretary Karine Jean-Pierre announced the positive test for the 81-year-old Democrat after Biden cancelled a speech due to the diagnosis.

Police, students clash in Bangladesh as protests over job quotas kill 6 more people

DHAKA: Thousands of students armed with sticks and rocks clashed with police in Dhaka on Thursday as the Bangladesh authorities cut some mobile internet services to quell anti-quota protests that have killed at least 12 people this week.

The nationwide protests are the biggest since Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina was re-elected to a fourth term in office, and are fuelled by high unem-

ployment among the youth, with nearly a fifth of the 170 million population out of work or education.

Six people died in clashes with police in Dhaka on Thursday, including a bus driver whose body was brought to a hospital with a bullet wound to his chest, and a student, officials told Reuters. Hundreds more were injured, they said. Law Minister Anisul Huq said the government was willing to talk to the protesters.

Saudi crown prince congratulates new Iranian president

US military pier for carrying aid to Gaza will be dismantled

WASHINGTON: The US military-built pier to carry humanitarian aid to Gaza will be dismantled and brought home, ending a mission that has been fraught with repeated weather and security problems that limited how much food and other supplies could get to starving Palestinians.

Vice Adm. Brad Cooper, deputy commander at US Central Command, told reporters in a Pentagon briefing on Wednesday that the pier achieved its intended effect in what he called an "unprecedented operation."

As the US military steps away from the sea route for humanitarian aid, questions swirl about Israel's new plan to use the port at Ashdod as a substitute. There are few details on how it will work and lingering concerns about

whether aid groups will have enough viable land crossings to get assistance into the territory besieged by war between Israel and Hamas.

Cooper said the Ashdod corridor will be more sustainable and it has already been used to get more than a million pounds of aid into Gaza.

"Having now delivered the largest volume of humanitarian assistance ever into the Middle East, we're now mission complete and transitioning to a new phase," said Cooper. "In the coming weeks, we expect that millions of pounds of aid will enter into Gaza via this new pathway."

He said there is currently 5 million pounds of aid in Cyprus, awaiting transit to Ashdod, and they expect delivery to start "in the coming days."

French lawmakers vote on parliament president in post-election move

PARIS: France's deeply fragmented parliament met on Thursday for the first time since this month's inconclusive election to vote on the assembly's president, in a ballot that could be key to who calls the shots in the country's politics for years to come.

A grouping of leftist parties unexpectedly came first in the election, ahead of President Emmanuel Macron's centrists and Marine Le Pen's far-right, but no one group won a majority.

Electing the lower house of parliament's president, equivalent to a speaker who organises the chamber's agenda and runs debates, is usually a formality. The process has taken on more importance this time, with Macron weakened and a lot of uncertainty over who will form the next government

and how effective it could be in a divided parliament.

The vote could also offer clues as to whether a coalition government that commands a working majority can be formed and what its political colours could be. The New Popular Front (NFP) left-wing alliance, hastily assembled before the snap election, wants to run the government but has been fighting bitterly since the July 7 second round of voting over who to put forward as prime minister.

It hopes its candidate for parliament chief, veteran Communist lawmaker Andre Chassaigne, who is well-liked across party lines, could be elected.

This could be a boost to its chances of forming a government, by showing the alliance can command a majority in the assembly.

Ahsan Iqbal launches 'Key Findings Report' on first-ever digital census-2023

ISLAMABAD (APP): Minister for Planning, Development and Special Initiatives, Professor Ahsan Iqbal on Thursday unveiled the "First Ever Digital Census Key Findings Report," compiled by the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS). The report, which marks a significant milestone for Pakistan, provides comprehensive data crucial for the development of urban and rural areas and effective disaster response.

Addressing a ceremony, the minister highlighted Pakistan's achievement as the first country in South Asia to conduct a digital census. "The data collected through this census will be instrumental in guiding our development efforts and enhancing our ability to respond to natural calamities," he stated.

The census, mandated by the constitution to be conducted every ten years, faced scrutiny in 2017 when the Sindh government expressed concerns over the results, he said.

So, the new census had to be conducted before 2027, he said, adding "Work on this new census began after April 2022."

In a short period, the minister said, over 120,000 individuals were trained to carry out the digital census, following the PBS and the National Database and Registration Authority (NADRA) developed the necessary software under significant time constraints and pressure. "The results of the census have opened our eyes and reflect a concerted effort," he remarked. Ahsan Iqbal acknowledged the support of the armed forces and police, which was critical to the census's success. Despite initial slow progress due to complications in the fieldwork, the minister said the process was expedited with provincial support.

The consensus of all stakeholders was achieved, and the work was completed with the aid of satellite geotagging and imagery provided by the Pakistan Space & Upper Atmosphere Research Commission (SUPARCO).

Foolproof security measures ensure for Ashura processions

ISLAMABAD (Online): In a significant achievement, two missing children were safely recovered upon their arrival at Islamabad Airport from Bishkek.

This marks the first successful case under the newly integrated INTERPOL system with the Integrated Border Management Information System (IBMIS), a major initiative spearheaded by the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) under the direction of Director General Ahmad Ishaque Jahangir, PSP, PPM.

The children, Muhammad Huzaifa and Ahmed Umair Abid, were reported missing by the Punjab Police in a case registered at Police Station Barki, Lahore in 2022.

In response, NCB-INTERPOL Pakistan issued yellow notices to facilitate their recovery. The INTERPOL Find System, which was integrated into the FIA's operations in April this year, played a crucial role in this successful operation.

The newly implemented system connects the immigration database with INTERPOL's global database, enabling efficient tracking of missing persons and stolen passports. It also aids in the apprehension of wanted criminals upon their arrival in Pakistan.

The close collaboration between INTERPOL Islamabad and FIA Immigration Islamabad was instrumental in the recovery. FIA Immigration Islamabad has handed over the children to the concerned police officials for further action.

DG FIA commended the team of INTERPOL and Immigration at Islamabad Airport for their exemplary performance.

AAG Munawar Iqbal Dogal told the court JIT has completed the investigation to the extent of Pakistan.

Consultation is underway on the matter of MLAs agreement. 44 meetings of JIT have been held.

The CJ IHC remarked incident took place in Kenya and nothing can be done unless cooperation is extended from there.

The court adjourned the hearing of the case till July 25.

The meeting was also attended by Asad Qaiser, Ali Muhammad Khan, Zartaj Gul, Atif Khan, Shandana Gulzar, Awb Abbas Pabbi, Mohsin Aziz, Faisal Saleem, Raja Nasir Abbas and Humayun Mohmand.

The members discussed the four-point agenda including reviewing implementation of the Supreme Court's decision regarding reserved seats and gave their input, the sources said, adding the PTI leaders later stage a protest march outside the Parliament.

09 outlaws arrested; drugs and weapons recovered

ISLAMABAD: Islamabad Police apprehended 09 outlaws from different areas of the city during the last 24 hours and recovered drugs and weapons from their possession, a public relations officer said.
