Provincial Government to provide Punjab-like relief in electricity bills: Kamran

Announces ration bags for rain-affected areas in Sindh; 'Punjab-only' power relief draws criticism from other provinces says Governor Kamran

KARACHI (INP): Fearing a 'sense of despair' among the people of Sindh, Governor Kamran Tessori on Sunday asked Chief Minister Murad Ali Shah to announce the Punjab government-like relief in electricity bills.

Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) President Nawaz Sharif announced the two-month power subsidy relief for Punjab citizens two days ago which would be given to consumers using up to 500 units in August and September bills.

The move drew criticism from other provinces with Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP), Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) and Muttahida Qaumi Movement-Pakistan (MQM-P) decrying the 'use of provincial card' in electricity-related issues.

The PML-N president, patting the shoulder of her daughter CM Maryam, thanked her that she slashed flour prices when she assumed power in the province.

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif also welcomed the "historic" relief package for electricity consumers by the Punjab chief minister.

Addressing a press conference here, Governor Tessori cited the Punjab government's example and asked CM Shah to allocate funds from the provincial budget for relief to the people.

"Sindh CM [Murad Ali Shah], like Punjab, should provide a relief of Rs14 per unit in electricity bills," he said, saying that his denial may lead to a sense of despair among the people.

Bilawal seeks report from CM Sindh about damages due to rains

ISLAMABAD (APP): Chairman Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) Bilawal Bhutto Zardari has sought a detailed report from the Chief Minister of Sindh, Syed Murad Ali Shah, regarding the damage caused by the ongoing rains across the province and the measures taken by the provincial government to assist the affected people.

According to a press release issued by the Media Cell Bilawal House, Chairman PPP expressed his deep concern over the damage caused by the heavy rains in various parts of Sindh. He instructed the chief minister to provide a comprehensive report on the damages and relief efforts in Sukkur, Larkana, Khairpur, and other areas across the province.

Bilawal Bhutto remarked that the Sukkur and Larkana divisions are once

again bearing the brunt of climate change effects. He directed the mayors of Sukkur and Larkana to ensure the swift drainage of rainwater from the low-lying areas of these cities.

Bilawal Bhutto further instructed that an immediate investigation be conducted into the breach in the dam in Khairpur district, emphasizing the need to minimize the damage and provide prompt assistance to the affected people.

He stressed that the Department of Relief and Rehabilitation and the Provincial Disaster Management Authority (PDMA) must fulfill their responsibilities in assisting the rain-affected communities.

He assured the victims that the PPP would stand by them and provide unwavering support during this difficult time.

CM Sindh chairs high level rain emergency meeting

KARACHI (APP): Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah presiding over a high-level rain emergency meeting on Sunday morning said that Sukkur, Dadu, Jacobabad, and Naushehroferoze have received heavy rains ranging from 227 mm to 101 mm, which has inundated the roads and streets, therefore, effective measures must be taken to protect the life and property of the people, and then dewatering efforts may be made.

"I want to see the entire government machinery, including district administration, local bodies, particularly in the rain-affected areas working on the roads, helping people and the Irrigation department patrolling on the embankments of the canals and distributaries to avoid breaches."

The meeting was held

at CM House on Sunday and was attended by Sharjeel Memon, Saeed Ghani, Advisor Najmi Alam, Mayor Karachi Murata Wahab, Chief Secretary Asif Hyder Shah, DG Rangers Major Gen Azhar Waqas, SMBR Baqaullah Unar, Secretary Local Govt Khalid Hyder Shah, Secretary Health Rehan Baloch, DG PDMA Salman Shah, Corps Headquarter and KOMKAR representatives, Director Weather Ameer Hyder, and other concerned.

On Video link Minister Irrigation Jam Khan Shoro, Mayor Sukkur Arshlan Shaikh, Commissioner of Hyderabad, Sukkur, Larkana, Shaheed Benazirabad and Mirpurkhas and Deputy Commissioners attended the meeting through video link.

The CM said, as per

the report sent to him by the commissioners, Sukkur has received 227mm, Dadu 181mm, Jacobabad 104mm, Khairpur 101mm, and Naushehroferoze 69mm, which was the highest.

Minister of Local Government, Saeed Ghani, informed the CM that he has activated the local bodies all over Sindh and provided them with necessary facilities to work properly in the rain-affected areas.

Commissioner Sukkur Fayaz Abbasi told the CM that the four spells of heavy rains within 25 hours in District Sukkur have downpoured 263 mm, followed by 106 mm in Khairpur district. He added that three spells were dealt with and cleared the roads and low-lying areas within three to four hours while the water of the fourth spell was being dealt with.

In Khairpur district, Khairpur City recorded 106mm of rain, and Kingri Taluka recorded 105mm. Rainwater was drained out from Khairpur City.

The PDMA has provided 35 Diesel Engines, eight Dewatering machines, and 12 Tractor-mounted machines, in addition to two Mirage Trucks for dewatering Mud Pumps. Regarding losses, the CM was informed that 21 persons sustained injuries, five buffaloes perished, and 48 houses were damaged. Commissioner Larkana Mustafa Phul told the CM that Jacobabad received 104 mm, Thul 74, Kambur 59, Shikarpur 41, and another division area ranging from 17 to 56. Commissioner Hyderabad Bilal Memon said that K.N. Shah and Johi of Dadu districts have received 181 mm and 116 mm of rain, respectively.

11 die, several injured in rain-related incidents

KARACHI (INP): In various rooftop, wall collapse and electrocution incidents during heavy rainfall 11 people were killed and several other injured across the country. A house's rooftop caved in in Attock's Pindi Ghaeb area leaving four people dead. Moreover, a four-year little girl died and three other injured in another rooftop collapse incident in Sadiqabad district during rainfall. Meanwhile, a man electrocuted to death in Tabba Sultanpur area. The rooftop of a house collapsed in Jacobabad's Garhi Khairo town leaving a mother and son dead. The rain-related incidents claimed three lives in Sindh's Jacobabad district during last 24 hours. In a rooftop collapse incident in Badani area of Kashmir district a woman died and four others were injured during rainfall.

Tarar accuses PTI of anti-national agenda linked to Indian connections

Tarar claimed that the collaboration between PTI's founder and Faiz Hameed, along with the party's engagement with anti-Pakistan journalists across the eastern border and decisions to bring extremist elements back via the western border, represents a severe betrayal of national interests.

Four of same family died as house roof caved in

ATTOCK (APP): Four members of the same family were killed when the roof of the house collapsed in Attock on Sunday morning.

According to police sources, the family of Zaheer Abbas was sleeping in the room in Ahmedal village tehsil Pindigheb when the rotten roof of the room collapsed. As a result, Gohar Bano, wife of Nawab Khan (aged 80 years), son Aalyan, grandson Mahmood and granddaughter Rumisa bint Zaheer Abbas were buried under the debris of the roof and lost their lives.

Another 32,200 illegal refugees leave Pakistan in one month

ISLAMABAD (INP): The repatriation of Afghan nationals residing illegally in Pakistan continues, with thousands returning to their homeland.

Official figures reveal that between July 21 and August 17, an additional 32,200 undocumented Afghan citizens left Pakistan. This brings the total number of repatriated Afghans to 691,853 since August 17, 2024.

The repatriation process has involved 732 families transported in 674 vehicles.

The presence of a large number of undocumented Afghan nationals in major cities like Karachi had led to concerns about smuggling and extortion.

President for enhancing national forest coverage to mitigate impacts of climate change

KARACHI (APP): President Asif Ali Zardari had called for enhancing the national forest coverage by planting more trees to help mitigate the adverse impacts of climate change and global warming.

He said that Pakistan was one of the most vulnerable countries to climate change and global warming, and urged the youth and civil society in helping increase forest cover and planting more trees to mitigate their adverse impacts.

The President expressed these views while planting a "Neem" sapling at Bilawal House, Karachi, as a part of the annual Monsoon Tree Plantation Campaign on Sunday (August 18) also marks the National Tree Plantation day in Pakistan.

Speaking on the occasion, the President said that "Neem" was an environment friendly tree, offering numerous environmental benefits, such as clean air, cool shade and acting as a natural mosquito repellent.

PM vows to tackle power issues, streamlining energy matters on priority

Shaza refutes reports of internet slowdowns or closures

ISLAMABAD (APP): Minister of State for Information Technology and Telecommunication, Shaza Fatima Khawaja Saturday, refuted reports that the government had slowed down or closed the internet nationwide.

Addressing a press conference, she said, "The news circulating on social media that the government is throttling the internet is completely baseless and has no reality."

She further clarified that issues with certain apps were causing difficulties in downloading, leading to an increase in VPN usage, which contributed to the slowdown in internet speeds.

However, she said, "These issues have been resolved due to the government's efforts."

Technical experts and internet service providers were also consulted to address the situation, she added.

Shaza Fatima said, "Internet providers, telecom companies, and the Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) have been invited to a meeting next week to ensure that consumers do not face similar issues in the future."

Politics of subsidies

That the ongoing electricity crisis could result in political difficulties for the government was obvious from PML-N leader Nawaz Sharif's 'address to the nation' on Friday. The fact that the party supremo himself announced power sops for middle-class consumers confirms that he is making a frantic effort to avert a political crisis in his erstwhile stronghold of Punjab.

Clearly, he wants to rectify the sagging support for his party and is willing to invest personal capital in the pursuit of voters that the party appears to have lost to inflation in general and the escalating energy prices in particular. Mr Sharif also seems to believe that he still has higher approval ratings than his daughter, the Punjab chief minister, and his brother, the prime minister. This would explain why he announced the electricity subsidies, a task that would normally fall to either the prime minister or chief minister.

The announcement of Punjab-specific electricity subsidies also highlights the issue of energy sector provincialisation — both by design and default. Encouraged by greater autonomy under the 18th Amendment, we have seen the provinces trying to gradually venture into cheaper, renewable and hydropower generation. Sindh and KP have also made some strides towards their own transmission network. Such moves indicate a growing awareness among the provinces of the difficulties faced by power consumers due to high prices and blackouts in low-recovery areas.

However, while the problem exists across the country, the Punjab government's ability to divert Rs45bn from its budget towards significant consumer subsidies — for users of up to 500 units per month during August and September — is a step that only a province flush with cash can afford. Others, especially KP and Balochistan, are still facing significant financial distress in spite of their increased share from the federal tax divisible pool under the NFC award. In fact, both provinces are struggling to balance their budgets and produce the surplus required by the centre to contain the consolidated fiscal deficit within IMF-prescribed limits. Even Sindh has limited room for such subsidies for its citizens in case the PPP wants to follow suit.

While the ruling party expects this relief measure to help it politically in Punjab, the step is not going to sit well with voters from the other provinces. There is every possibility that the anger over power prices there will turn towards the PML-N. Nonetheless, the loss of support in smaller provinces should be less of a worry for the party leadership.

The bigger issue is how the IMF, whose executive board is expected to approve the recently concluded \$7bn deal, reacts to it. The lender had not taken very kindly to a similar subsidy announced by the federal government for lifeline consumers. Will it ignore Punjab's extravagance?

Brick in the wall

I had to join Facebook, Twitter and Slack when I started graduate school in 2016 — for different messaging purposes. I thought all of this could be done on WhatsApp but then, it was not a popular app in the US. My Chinese classmates, meanwhile, found all the apps 'primitive' as they could do so much more back home on WeChat — from messaging to gaming to paying utilities to live streaming.

But you don't have internet freedoms like we do, American students would say, oblivious to Mark Zuckerberg's attempts to chip away at their privacy or how platforms were acquiescing in authoritarian governments' requests to take content down. The few discussions I witnessed in class came off as some sort of nationalism, years of being taught their country was the good guy keeping the bad guy out.

In case you didn't know, the US military paved the way for the internet to be built when the US defence department set up Advanced Research Projects Agency, which created Arpanet in the late 1960s, to allow research institutes to communicate with armed institutes' agencies through a large-scale computer network. That was born from a fear of Soviet attack. The Soviets were attempting to create what we now refer to as the internet, roughly a year after Arpanet, but could not.

Technology has long been used to keep 'enemies' out. Someone or something is always trying to be the gatekeeper of information but the internet has disrupted everything since its birth in 1983. The more it has evolved, the more the attempts to clamp down on it, almost always in the name of security.

Techno-nationalism

— how countries link innovations to identity, stability and national interests — aims to influence global power. Donald Trump, for example, blacklisted Huawei Technology over spying concerns in 2019 but thanks to Chinese government support, the company made a remarkable comeback. The US is reportedly thinking of co-opting US allies in a "broader containment campaign" and exploring additional sanctions, reports Bloomberg.

When China created the great firewall in 2000 that is being referenced in conversations about the reported Rs30 billion firewall in place here, it did so to keep foreign influence out, it says. Its techno-nationalism led it to hold an advantage over others (though at the cost of civil liberties). Technological innovations, for example, increase job opportunities, investment and economic growth, maybe even exports if other countries become reliant on your country's technology. This can also lead to global competition as we're witnessing in the China-US rivalry.

In the decade since it created the Made in China 2025 plan, the country may just be able to achieve what it set out to do: reduce dependency on foreign supply chains in industries like AI, robotics and self-driving cars. China's plan is viewed as a threat by, and to, the West.

I'm sure it led to Joe Biden passing the Chips and Science Act, 2022, which gave \$280bn in new funding to boost domestic research and manufacturing of semiconductors in the US. It also gave billions in subsidies for chip manufacturing, billions to public sector research in the sciences, and many incentives aimed at strengthening the country's supply chain with the aim of countering China.

And now, onto our

techno-nationalism which, in a word, is 'cringe', irrespective of who is in charge. It aims to globally isolate us, without giving us tools to enable us to build or empower. We don't have a Chinese superapp like Weibo. We have Vigos and we all know their purpose.

An entire country is being made to pay for the so-called sins of one political party. This is essentially what this firewall is about. This wall's creators, implementers and def-enders have never had to worry about making ends meet.

At the time of writing, the Pakis-tan Software Housing Association warned the country could lose at least \$300 million due to disruptions caused by the firewall. Businessmen are warning of dire consequences. Freelancers have complained of lost opportunities on sites like Fiverr. My friend Mohsin, a fashion designer, told me he has not received an order online in 10 days which is highly unusual. I won't even bother about civil liberties because they have never mattered in the country but I hope they will matter now that the internet has slowed for everyone.

Anything grounded in nationalism produces greater harm because it prioritises security over civil liberties, and favours the wealthy (corporates) who influence policymaking to suit their interests. It clashes with Pakistan's diverse population. Another solution is needed, one grounded in sense and sensibilities. We can't afford the isolation and chaos this firewall is going to bring. Someone explain this to the men in charge, who have much to lose if they go ahead with this firewall.

Indian foreign policy

When it started its life as an independent country in 1947, India chose a foreign policy that would keep it 'non-aligned' in the polarised environment created by the US-USSR Cold War. India leaned towards the Soviet Union, maintained rather cold relations with the US, sought friendly ties with China premised on the Panchsheel (the five principles of peaceful coexistence), and saw itself as a member of the developing world. In South Asia, it embarked on a hostile relationship with Pakistan for separating from so-called 'Mother India'.

Decades later, India's foreign policy has undergone a paradigm shift, particularly since the dawn of the 21st century. With the US pivot to Asia, India has become the partner of choice for America's Indo-Pacific Strategy that seeks to contain the further rise of China. India's relations with China remain tension-ridden, even though both countries have flourishing economic and commercial ties. With Russia, India maintains a close relationship, notwithstanding the fact that the US-led West and Russia are at daggers drawn over the prospect of Ukraine joining Nato. India is, thus, playing a tight balancing act in its relations with the major powers. It describes its present foreign policy as the pursuit of national interests through 'strategic autonomy'.

With UN-led universal multilateralism on the retreat, India has entered into several mutually incompatible multi-alignments, such as BRICS, SCO, and QUAD. It considers itself a leader of the Global South, and has deepened its ties with East Asia and Africa.

What has helped India maintain largely posi-

tive relations with all major powers is its growing economy and stable democracy. As the world's fifth largest economy, it has sufficient buying power to purchase expensive military hardware from diverse sources, attract foreign investments for its growing economy, particularly its road and rail infrastructure, and enhance manifold its trade with the rest of the world. The Indian diaspora has been mobilised to project a positive image of the country. At the same time, however, divisive Hindutva nationalism, demonisation of minorities, and massive unemployment and high inflation have tarnished its stature.

While a lot has changed in India's global profile, what has not is its foreign policy towards its South Asian neighbours. India continues with its hostile posture towards Pakistan, and pursues a competitive, even rival relationship with China. Its policy to engage only with non-Taliban Afghan groups has failed. It has also bullied Nepal through economic embargos and the occupation of part of its territory. In the south, Sri Lanka often faces tough choices in its relations with both India and China. Bangladesh, surrounded on three sides by India, has experienced suffocating Indian dominance, particularly under Sheikh Hasina Wajed who recently fled to India. The Maldives has often demonstrated its discontent with Indian interference. Consequently, India's 'Neighbourhood First' policy is in the doldrums, undermining its global ambitions.

Central to India's overbearing attitude towards its South Asian neighbours is the China factor. India is unhappy with China's close ties with Pakistan and Chinese attempts to enter into cooperative relations with Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Nepal, the Maldives, and even Bhutan whose foreign policy is controlled by India. These countries find China's BRI projects a lucrative option and wish to exercise their own 'strategic autonomy' to benefit from the investments regardless of the Sino-India competition. India needs to recognise the legitimate right of its neighbours to be-neath from the in-vestment opportunities that accompany cooperative engagement with China.

Pakistan is one country that has never accepted Indian hegemony in South Asia. This has been reason enough for India to make every effort to isolate it. The Kashmir dispute is unresolved because of India's refusal to let Kashmir exercise its right to self-determination. India has suspended all contact with Pakistan, especially since 2016, and chosen to demonise the country by harping on the mantra of cross-border terrorism. In fact, it is Pakistan which now faces India-sponsored terrorism. However, since India's economy has done well and is a large market, in contrast with Pakistan's, the world tends to lend a more sympathetic ear to Indian narratives.

For South Asia, India is the elephant in the room. The entire region would benefit if India gave up its dominating posture, and let other South Asian countries exercise the same strategic autonomy vis-à-vis India that the latter wishes to have vis-à-vis the US, China, and Russia. Taking the region along would help India build up its global profile that it cherishes. -- Courtesy Dawn

Local tractors assembling registered 45.74% growth in FY 2023-24

ISLAMABAD (APP): Tractors assembling in the country during the financial year ended on June 30, 2024 witnessed growth of 45.74 percent as compared to the production of 31,752 tractors of the last financial year.

During the period from July-June 2023-24, about 46,272 tractors were locally produced as compared to the production of 31,752 tractors of the same period of the last financial year, according to the provisional Quantum Index Numbers of Large Scale Manufacturing Industries (QIM) for June 2024,

released by the Pakistan bureau of Statistics.

The overall Large Scale Manufacturing Industries (LSMI) sector has shown a growth of 0.92 percent during the period from July-June 2023-24 when compared with June, 2023 and 4.70% when compared with May 2024, it added.

The production in July-June 2023-24 as compared to July-June 2022-23 has increased in food, wearing apparel, coke & petroleum products.

AC visits Sunday bazaar, fines price gougers

ISLAMABAD (APP): In a bid to protect consumers, Assistant Commissioner City Farhan Ahmad on Sunday conducted a surprise visit to the bustling G-6 Sunday bazaar, scrutinizing price lists and enforcing the plastic bag ban. According to the spokesman of ICT administration, Assistant Commissioner City, Farhan Ahmad, led a team to the G-6 Sunday Market to ensure compliance with price regulations. The officials inspected price lists at various stalls, taking action against two shopkeepers for overcharging customers. The visit aimed to enforce the government's directive on price control and plastic bag usage. On the occasion, he emphasized the ongoing efforts to implement the plastic bag ban, promoting eco-friendly alternatives. During the visit, citizens refused to purchase from vendors without displayed price lists.

Diminishing cotton production affecting textile sector

MULTAN (APP): The breathable cotton fabric makes suitable attire given the hot weather conditions which at times turn extreme and is still the choice fabric for many whether at home in casual mood or out to enjoy a party. However, the fluffy cotton flowers that used to dominate the South Punjab landscape are not that much dominating these days. And textile sector does not like the story to go this way.

Khawaja Muhammad Usman, an Industrialist associated with textile and former president of Multan Chamber of Commerce and Industry (MCCI) said that Pakistan agriculture does not grow as much cotton as the

textile millers' need, to spin, weave and stitch enough yarn, fabric and garments that can turn cotton chain into a smart forex earning machine. The operations chain of cotton economy employs a larger work force from field to ginning factories and onward to textile mills and garment factories.

Pakistan's total work force, according to Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) survey 2020-21, was 71.76 million out of which 67.25 million were employed. Over 37.4 per cent were associated with agriculture, and 37.2 per cent in services sector. Some 25.4 per cent human resources earn working for industry, a significant

portion of which is associated with textiles.

They earn livelihood for families by developing products ranging from yarn, towels, bed sheets, fabric, garments, sports garments that fetch dollars from lucrative foreign markets and this national scale effort contributes 60 per cent in the total yearly export earnings for Pakistan. Recently, Vice President, Pakistan Central Cotton Committee (PCCC), Dr. Yusuf Zafar raised concerns over the statistics of ongoing cotton season and forecast the production would likely be around 6-7 million bales, far below what the textile sector and the overall national economy

expected.

He attributed the decline to a smaller cultivation area, prolonged heatwaves, unexpected rains, and severe whitefly infestations. It would be far below the textile industry's demand of 16 million bales and the shortfall will necessitate the import of approximately 5-6 million bales, the PCCC top scientist said.

The PCCC media focal person and head of CCRI technology transfer wing Sajid Mahmood recalls that cotton production decline started after 2016 due to lack of funding on research. He said that the country's ace cotton research body PCCC had

faced financial crisis owing to non-payment. He said, Pakistan achieved over 14 million bales production once and later it remained oscillating between 11-13 million bales. However, after 2016, the production started declining and had touched new low in 2022 with 4.5 million bales when floods had swept away crop lands in South Punjab. South Punjab Secretary Agriculture Saqib Ali Ateel described climate change as a big trouble confronting cotton and everybody was worried about the unpredictability of weather patterns. Farmers got good results from early farming last year but early sown crop was confronted by heatwave this season.

Governor Kundi worries about worsening law and order situation in KP

PESHAWAR (APP): Governor Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Faisal Karim Kundi on Sunday emphasized the critical issue of maintaining peace in the province. He said that the situation was dire when judges themselves were not safe, highlighting the deteriorating conditions in the province. The Governor said this during a meeting with a delegation from the Peoples Lawyers Forum led by Sardar Hashmat Nawaz Khan Saddozai. The meeting included key figures such as Shah Fahad Ansari Advocate

Supreme Court and Divisional President of Peoples Lawyers Forum, Sardar Adnan Saddozai District President, Sardar Hizbullah Khan Gundapur Divisional General Secretary, Sardar Qaiser Zaib District General Secretary, and Abid Awan Advocate District General Secretary of Pakistan Peoples Party. Also present were Gohar Rahman Khattak, Provincial President of the People's Lawyers Forum, and Lajbar Khan Khaleel, Provincial General Secretary. Advocate Kundi assured that he would

contact the Chairman of the State Life Insurance Corporation regarding benefits for lawyers. He also proposed that land be identified for a lawyers' colony in Dera Ismail Khan. In addition, he suggested that a judicial complex be established in the Tank area, discussing the matter with the Federal Minister for Law. The Governor proposed allocating a quota for young lawyers in the Judicial Academy that would address the issue of starting LL.M. classes at Gomal University.

The IG directed all regions to eliminate criminal gangs and resolve pending complaints on 1787 and the CM Portal within the given timeline. Flash flooding alert issued in South Punjab districts

Continuous monitoring of the situation is being conducted from the PDMA control room, which operates 24/7. Rescue services, including 112, are on standby with machinery and staff ready for immediate response.

No action is being taken against quackery, and doctors are being unfairly targeted. They condemned the hiring of loving and added that 70 pc of healthcare services were being provided by the private sector, and despite unfavorable conditions, doctors are continuing to work.

ANF recovers 78 kg drugs in eight operations

RAWALPINDI (APP): Anti-Narcotics Force (ANF) while conducting eight operations across the country managed to recover 78 kg drugs and arrested nine accused, said an ANF Headquarters spokesman. He informed that 2.8 kg ice was recovered from two passengers going to Saudi Arabia and Bahrain at Islamabad Airport. 40.8 kg hashish and 2.4 kg opium were recovered in two different operations conducted near M-1 Islamabad while two accused were rounded up.

Israeli strikes in Lebanon and Gaza leave 27 dead

Monitoring Desk BEIRUT: At least 27 people, including two children, were killed in Israeli air strikes, with around 10 fatalities in Nabatieh, south Lebanon, and at least 17 in the Gaza town of Zawayda, according to health officials.

in retaliation for the Nabatieh strike. Two soldiers were wounded in a rocket attack from Lebanon, the Israeli military said, adding that a total of 55 rockets had been fired in latest strikes from Lebanon. Also on Saturday, an Israeli drone targeted a motorcycle in the Qadmous area east of Tyre in south Lebanon, NNA reported, adding that one person was injured. A security source said one person was killed in the motorcycle attack.

Tensions have soared in the region in recent weeks, after a rocket strike blamed on Hezbollah killed 12 children and teens in the Israeli-occupied Golan Heights. Israel responded with the killing of a top Hezbollah commander in the suburbs of Beirut. At least 17 Palestinians were killed and dozens wounded in the Israeli strike in the Gaza town of Zawayda on Saturday, health officials said, as Is-

rael issued new evacuation orders, citing Hamas rocket fire nearby. Most of the people killed were from the same family and they included eight children and four women, according to health officials. Israel's military said it was aware of the reports of the strike and was looking into them. "They were asleep in their beds, kids and babies, then three missiles targeted their place," said Abu Ahmed Hassan, a neighbour. The owner of the house was a known merchant, he said. "There are no military activities here at all," he added.

Israel's military spokesperson in Arabic posted instructions on X on Saturday for people in parts of central Gaza, including in Maghazi district which is near Zawayda, to evacuate to a designated humanitarian zone.

He said militants were firing rockets from those locations and that the military was preparing to act against them.

The Israeli military said the airstrike targeted a weapons depot used by Hezbollah fighters. The Israeli strike came after ceasefire talks between Palestinian Islamist group Hamas and Israel in Doha paused on Friday with negotiators due to meet again next week. Hezbollah later said in a statement that it had struck the Ayelet Hashahar Kibbutz in northern Israel

Earlier this month, nine people were killed and several wounded in fighting east of Tripoli between two groups, both affiliated with the UN-recognised government of Abdulhamid Dbeibah. Monitoring Desk TRIPOLI: Reemerging bloodshed and power struggles in Libya have raised fears of a broader escalation, threatening to deal a fatal blow to the UN-brokered political transition and push the war-torn country deeper into turmoil. The vast North African country of 6.8 million people has struggled to recover from years of conflict after the 2011 Nato-backed uprising that overthrew longtime dictator Moamer Qadhafi. Libya remains divided between a UN-recognised government based in the capital Tripoli and a rival administration in the east, backed by military strongman Khalifa Haftar. Although relative calm has returned in recent years, clashes

Chchen leader drives armed Tesla truck, praises Musk in video

Monitoring Desk MOSCOW: The strongman leader of Russia's Chechen Republic, Ramzan Kadyrov, published a video on Saturday showing him driving a gun-mounted Tesla Cybertruck and praising the carmaker's billionaire owner Elon Musk. Kadyrov, who has ruled Chechnya with an iron fist for over 17 years, is a vocal ally of Russian President Vladimir Putin and says he has deployed thousands of troops to help the Kremlin with its Ukraine offensive. The 47-year-old Chechen leader could be seen behind the wheel of the truck as he drove in the regional capital Grozny, a video posted on his Telegram channel showed.

Thai king endorses Paetongtarn Shinawatra as prime minister

Monitoring Desk BANGKOK: Paetongtarn Shinawatra was endorsed as prime minister by Thailand's king on Sunday, two days after parliament elected her, paving the way for her to form a cabinet in the coming weeks. Paetongtarn, 37, becomes Thailand's youngest prime minister just days after ally Srettha Thavisin was dismissed as premier by the Constitutional Court, a judiciary

central to Thailand's two decades of intermittent political turmoil. Daughter of divisive former Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra, Paetongtarn won by nearly two-thirds in a house vote on Friday to become Thailand's second female prime minister and the third Shinawatra to take the office, following Thaksin and her aunt Yingluck Shinawatra.

Japan's PM Kishida plans US visit

Monitoring Desk TOKYO: Outgoing Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida is finalising plans to visit the US in late September for the UN General Assembly and a possible meeting with President Joe Biden, the Yomiuri newspaper reported on Saturday. The visit may take place for several days starting on Sept. 22, the report said, citing multiple government sources it did not identify. The Japanese Foreign Ministry, in response to a request for comment from Reuters, said "Nothing has been decided yet".

Israel says investigation underway in Palestinian prisoner abuse case

Monitoring Desk JERUSALEM: Israel is conducting a "robust investigation" of suspects accused of sexually abusing a Palestinian prisoner and is committed to upholding international legal standards regarding the treatment of detainees, the foreign affairs ministry said on Sunday. The London Fire Brigade (LFB) said 25 fire engines were deployed to tackle the blaze after the alarm was raised just before midday. The police said there were no reports of injuries.

Somerset House, on a site which overlooks the River Thames and dating back to 1547, is a former royal palace and stately home and is now an arts, cultural and entertainment centre. "Crews are now working to extinguish the final pockets of fire," Keeley Foster, the LFB's assistant commissioner, told a media briefing. "The fire was located in part of the building's roof

Govt taking steps to increase investment in petroleum sector: Dar

ISLAMABAD (APP): Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Muhammad Ishaq Dar on Sunday said the government was taking steps to increase foreign investment in the petroleum sector by resolving the key issues of the sector.

The Deputy PM, presiding over the first meeting of a committee, formed to consider the issues faced by the petroleum sector's E&P companies and to resolve issues of the industrial sector, resolved to take every possible step to provide all facilities to the foreign companies that would help attract further investment in the country.

The meeting considered the recommendations to improve the financial system for off-shore exploration. Deputy PM also directed to prepare a framework to implement the recent amendments made in the Petroleum Policy 2012.

Heads of local and foreign E&P companies, on the occasion, highlighted concerns about the security and stability of the sector due to increased circular debt.

Deputy PM directed the relevant authorities to resolve the issue of circular debts in the power sector on priority. Private sector members of the committee also expressed their concerns regarding the downstream gas sector and stressed the need to open up the sector to private companies to improve its sustainability. After detailed discussions, the forum directed the Petroleum Division to work closely with the industry and other stakeholders.

The forum also directed the Petroleum Division to suggest appropriate amendments to the Ogra Ordinance to introduce a mechanism for the adjustment of gas rates on a monthly or quarterly basis.

On security issues, the Forum directed the Interior Division to work closely with E&P companies and other stakeholders.

The Interior Division was also mandated to develop a dedicated one-window facility system at the federal and provincial levels to ensure security for operations in challenging areas.

CM House bans plastic bottles, introduces glass jugs for environmental sustainability

KARACHI (INP): Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah has raised the bar for environmental accountability by prohibiting disposable plastic water bottles in all government offices, beginning with the CM House.

The initiative aimed at cutting plastic waste and bolstering sustainability, was enacted immediately after a notification on August 16, the CM said.

To support this mission, Murad Shah instructed his secretariat to substitute all plastic water bottles with glass jugs during meetings at the CM House. Footage from Sunday showed glass jugs and cups on the meeting tables, showcasing the government's effort to minimize plastic waste.

The CM emphasised the importance of this change during a meeting, directing participants to follow suit by eliminating plastic bottles and other disposable plastic items from their offices and public spaces.

He advocated for the use of sustainable alternatives, such as glass and biodegradable materials, to help

protect the environment and improve public health. "Our drains, rivers, ponds, and seas are being choked by plastic waste, which is endangering marine life and polluting our environment," said Mr Shah.

"We, as a nation, must adopt environmentally friendly practices to safeguard our natural resources and ensure a cleaner, healthier future."

In addition to banning plastic bottles, CM Murad Ali Shah promised further actions to fight environmental degradation. He detailed plans to tackle air pollution

PCCA directs airlines to take measures against Mpxv

KARACHI (INP): The Pakistan Civil Aviation Authority (PCCA) on Sunday issued directives to all airlines flying into the country to implement preventive measures against monkeypox, following the first confirmed case of the virus in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa earlier this week.

A new strain of monkeypox, which appears to spread more easily through close contact, has raised global alarms. The variant was first identified outside Africa on August 15 in Sweden, linked to an ongoing outbreak on the continent. In response to the potential threat, the PCCA has mandated that airlines arriving from abroad provide masks to passengers and require all airline and ground staff to wear them.

The authority also instructed airlines to ensure that staff and passengers regularly sanitize their hands, and that luggage is properly disinfected.

AC, Mukhtiar reviews drainage of rainwater in different areas

FIA thwarts human trafficking attempt

KARACHI (INP): The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) intercepted and offloaded two passengers from a Tehran-bound flight at Karachi Airport. The suspects were allegedly attempting to enter Europe illegally via Iran.

According to the FIA spokesperson, the individuals—identified as Ghulam Ghaus and Haris Hasan—were in contact with a human trafficker known as Tanveer. The suspects had arranged an interview at the Serbian Embassy under the pretense of seeking legitimate entry into Europe, with their appointment date set for August 15, which had already passed. Further investigations revealed that the suspects had each paid PKR 1.8 million to the agent for facilitating their illegal journey.
