Zero out of schools children campaign launched: Chief Minister reiterates Govt's resolve to make all closed schools functional; gives task to Secretary Education

QUETTA: The Chief Minister Balochistan, Mir Sarfraz Ahmed Bugti has reiterated his government's resolve to make all closed schools functional and in this regard, gave task to the Secretary Education.

He said that he wants to see at least 90 percent schools functional in two months.

He asserted that we would make deductions in our public sector development programme (PSDP), but would make all the schools functional.

He announced that by the grace of Allah Almighty, we would open all the schools and would get all out of schools children admitted in the schools.

He said that we would provide whatever resources are required, but would

want every child in the schools.

He said that he is ready to recruit even 10,000 teachers on contract and announced the minimum wage of Rs. 37,000 for the teachers.

The Chief Minister was addressing the zero out of schools children campaign and celebration of the international literacy week arranged by the Education Department here at the Sikandar Jamali Auditorium located in the Civil Secretariat on Thursday.

The Provincial Minister for Education, Ms. Rabeela Hameed Durani, other ministers, parliamentary secretaries, members of the assembly, Chief Secretary, Shakeel Qadir Khan, administrative secretaries of Education and other departments were present at

the ceremony.

The Chief Minister said that he is delighted to be part of the zero out of schools campaign.

He said that it is his utmost endeavour to get all children admitted in schools.

He urged the non governmental organizations and other social welfare organizations to pay attention towards Balochistan.

He said that we have to move ahead instead of making criticism.

He pointed out that large number of children are also out of the schools because of the child labour.

While the delay in recruitments of teachers in Education Department and absenteeism of the teachers are also very important issues.

Federal Cabinet approves plan to boost Gwadar Port's operations

PM hails 2% policy rate cut, says it will boost economic activities

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Cabinet on Thursday approved a proposal by the Ministry of Maritime Affairs to direct all government departments to route 50% of their imports, such as wheat, sugar, and fertilizer, through the Gwadar Port. Earlier, the prime minister had issued the directives to increase the Gwadar port operations to ensure development and prosperity of the Balochistan province. He also directed that 50% of all public sector imports should be ensured through the Gwadar Port.

The meeting of the cabinet was held here under the chairmanship of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif.

The cabinet also in-

structed to increase the volume of exports from Gwadar Port in the future. A subcommittee of the cabinet will be formed to submit a quarterly report on imports and exports through Gwadar Port to the cabinet. The cabinet, on the recommendation of the Ministry of Communications, approved the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding between Pakistan and Sri Lanka for the issuance of a commemorative postal stamp to mark the 75th anniversary of diplomatic relations between the two countries.

The Ministry of Industries and Production presented a report from the Cabinet Committee on Sugar Exports. The cabinet

expressed satisfaction that, due to a well-timed decision on sugar exports, the country not only earned valuable foreign exchange, but sugar prices remained stable, and sugarcane farmers were adequately rewarded for their efforts.

The cabinet, on the recommendation of the Ministry of Maritime Affairs, also approved the reconstitution of the Board of Directors of the Korangi Fish Harbour Authority, Karachi.

The cabinet instructed that all provinces should be given representation on such government boards. Additionally, the cabinet directed that any government-owned corporations with incomplete boards should be fully con-

stituted as soon as possible.

On the recommendation of the Ministry of National Health Services, the cabinet approved the appointment of Muhammad Yaqoob, Assistant Director of the Drug Regulatory Authority of Pakistan, as the Federal Inspector Drug Balochistan.

Likewise, on the recommendation of the Planning Ministry, the federal cabinet approved an amendment to the Cabinet resolution dated October 30, 2013, regarding the appointment of Planning Commission members from the open market.

Under this amendment, the salaries of Planning Commission members will

now be set under the Special Professional Pay Scale-II (SPPS-II) instead of the Management Pay Scale.

Furthermore, the cabinet also approved setting the salary of the Chief Economist of the Planning Commission, to be appointed from the open market, under the Special Professional Pay Scale-I (SPPS-I).

The cabinet, based on the recommendations of the Revenue Division and according to the Supreme Court of Pakistan's orders, approved the Federal Public Service Commission to conduct departmental promotion exams for the posts of Inspector Inland Revenue (BPS-16).

Pakistan Chairs 23rd meeting of SCO ministers responsible for foreign economy, trade

The Chief Minister made it clear that there is no possibility of big change in the provincial cabinet. However, the portfolios of one or two ministers can be changed.

BA approves amended draft law of Public Welfare Hospital Sui

QUETTA: The Balochistan Assembly has approved the amended draft law of the Public Welfare Hospital Sui, here on Thursday. The session of Balochistan Assembly resumed after break of two days with the Speaker, Captain (Retd) Abdul Khaliq Achakzai in the chair on Thursday.

The Parliamentary Secretary for Law, Nawabzada Zarin Magis tabled the amended draft law of the Public Welfare Hospital Sui, which was approved by the House.

Earlier, the leader of Opposition, Mir Younas Aziz Zehri sought permission of the chair to speak on a point of order.

However, the Speaker refused to allow him to speak before the agenda points. On this, the Leader and other members of Opposition staged walk out of the House on alleged behaviour of the Speaker.

Later, the Speaker adjourned the session of assembly for an indefinite period.

SBP slashes policy rate by 200bps to 17.5%

KARACHI (APP): The State Bank of Pakistan, Thursday, slashed policy rate by 200 basis points to 17.5 percent owing to sharply declining inflation and moderate pick up in the economic activity during the past months.

The central bank, in the monetary policy statement issued here, informed that the Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) reviewed overall economic and financial situation and decided to decrease the policy rate to 17.5 percent effective from September 13, 2024. The MPC observed that both headline and core inflation fell sharply over the past two months with a disinflation pace exceeding the committee's expectations, mainly due to the delay in the implementation of planned increases in administered energy prices and favorable movement in

global oil and food prices.

The inherent uncertainty related to these developments warranted a cautious monetary policy stance, the committee acknowledged and underscored the importance of the tight monetary policy stance in driving the sustained decline in inflation over the past year.

The MPC also reviewed key developments since its last meeting that have implications for the macroeconomic outlook including sharp decline in global oil prices, stability in SBP's FX reserves despite weak official inflows and continued debt repayments, decline in secondary market yields of government securities, improved inflation expectations and confidence of businesses and lower than target tax collection by FBR, during July-August 2024.

Quetta police official kills blasphemy suspect in jail

QUETTA: A Quetta police officer allegedly killed a man being held in custody on suspicion of blasphemy charges, police officials said on Thursday. Quetta Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Muhammad Baloch said that the police officer accused of the killing had been arrested. The officer had accessed a police station where a man accused of blasphemy was being held by pretending he was his relative before opening fire on him.

The man accused of blasphemy had been taken into custody earlier in the week and moved to a more heavily fortified station due to an enraged mob demanding that he be handed over to them.

Info Minister vows to address challenge of climate change

ISLAMABAD (APP): Minister for Information and Broadcasting Attaullah Tarar has expressed government's commitment to address the challenge of climate change in collaboration with international partners. He was addressing a news conference flanked by Coordinator to the Prime Minister on Climate Change, Romina Khurshid Alam in Islamabad on Thursday.

The Minister said contribution of Pakistan in global carbon emission is minuscule, but unfortunately, the country is included in the list of those nations which are suffering badly due to the hazardous impacts of climate change.

K-P CM's call to talk with Afghanistan an attack on federation: Defence Minister

ISLAMABAD (APP): Defence Minister Khawaja Muhammad Asif on Thursday criticized Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Chief Minister Ali Amin Gandapur's statement about holding direct dialogue with Afghanistan, calling it a direct attack on the federation.

Speaking on the floor of the National Assembly, he said that no province has the authority to hold direct talks with any foreign country.

He also highlighted the initiatives taken by the Speaker of the National Assembly to ensure the supremacy of Parliament.

The Minister said the Sunni Ittehad Council had not lost their representa-

tion due to the Speaker's issuance of production orders.

He urged that the tradition set by Speaker Sardar Ayaz Sadiq should continue, stressing the importance of following rules and laws.

Recalling past events, he pointed out that during the PTI regime, the former Speaker denied production orders of the arrested members.

The Minister also informed the House of the victimization carried out by the PTI government, stating that Rana Sanaulah Khan, Maryam Nawaz, Muhammad Nawaz Sharif, Shehbaz Sharif, and Asif Ali Zardari's sister had been arrested in fake cases.

PM Shahbaz praises friendly nations' support IMF board to review Pakistan's \$7b loan on September 25 after key conditions met

ISLAMABAD: The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has confirmed that its Executive Board will meet on September 25 to discuss the approval of Pakistan's \$7 billion Extended Fund Facility (EFF). The loan is crucial for stabilising Pakistan's economy, which has been grappling with rising inflation and dwindling reserves.

IMF spokesperson Julie Kozack announced the meeting during a press briefing on Thursday, saying, "We are very happy that we can say now that the board meeting is scheduled for September 25."

This announcement comes after Pakistan secured the necessary financ-

ing assurances from development partners.

The \$7 billion loan package had been under discussion since May, and a staff-level agreement was reached in July. Despite this, Pakistan faced delays in finalising the IMF Board's approval. The government has had to meet stringent IMF conditions, including the imposition of a record Rs1.8 trillion in new taxes and electricity price hikes of up to 51%.

Among other conditions, Pakistan agreed to halt the establishment of any new special economic or export processing zones. The country also accepted that tax incentives for existing zones would not be extended after expiry.

Lakki police protest

The protest sit-in by hundreds of police personnel in KP's Lakki Marwat district entered its third day on Wednesday, with no sign of an amicable resolution. The law enforcers have taken to the streets to protest rising militancy in their district, and surrounding regions. They say they feel vulnerable, and want the counterterrorism drive in the area to be led by them, instead of the military. Police officers from surrounding districts, including Bannu, D.I. Khan and Tank, have joined their protesting colleagues, while political parties, tribesmen and civil society groups have also expressed solidarity with them. Efforts by the local administration to end the impasse have failed, and traffic between this part of KP and the rest of the country has been suspended.

The policemen's concerns are not without merit. According to figures published recently, KP experienced 29 terrorist attacks in August alone, in which 25 lives were lost. Lakki Marwat and its surrounding districts have been particularly affected by terrorism, with most of those targeted being police personnel, security men and government officials.

Therefore, if policemen have come out on the roads to protest, it shows that the state of law and order in the area is clearly a matter of grave concern. If police morale is low and law enforcers have to publicly air their grievances, it reflects a failure of the administration and the security forces to crush militancy in the affected areas. It is also significant that the local civilians are backing the policemen's demands.

Unfortunately, the KP administration and security forces seem too consumed with political matters to address the issue of militancy with the seriousness and urgency it deserves. Police personnel are on the front line in the campaign against militancy, and their concerns cannot be dismissed. As the protesting law enforcers have demanded, they should be empowered to deal with terrorist groups.

The fact is that it requires a combined effort involving the police, Counter-Terrorism Department, intelligence agencies and the military to wipe out the terrorist menace before the matter gets out of hand. As they negotiate with the protesting policemen, members of the administration must keep their concerns — as well as those of the local civilians, who pay a high price whenever there are kinetic operations — in mind to evolve a dynamic and effective CT plan.

Both the KP government and security forces must lend a sympathetic ear to these demands, as the province cannot expect a demoralised police force to deal with the militant threat. Let the police lead CT efforts, backed by the military where required, so that terrorist groups are cleared from the areas. And after kinetic operations to uproot terrorist groups, the civilian administration needs to implement the 'build' phase successfully.

'Lambooo' Nayar

No one stood taller among the pique of Indian political columnists than Kuldip 'Lambooo' Nayar. Ironically, he received that nickname from the shortest of Indian prime ministers — Lal Bahadur Shastri.

Born in Sialkot, Nayar lived a long life, dying in New Delhi in 2018 at the age of 95. He had a career crammed brimful with history. Initially an Urdu press reporter, he served as editor of The Statesman, saw prison during Mrs Indira Gandhi's Emergency (1975-77), became Indian high commissioner to Great Britain in 1990, and sat in his country's Rajya Sabha in August 1997. His syndicated columns appeared in over 80 newspapers.

Just before his death, he compiled portraits of Leaders and Icons from Jinnah to Modi (2019). (He felt tempted to rename his book 'Heroes, Neros, and Zeros'.) That slim volume included his recollections of Indian and Pakistani leaders — M.K. Gandhi to N. Modi, and from M.A. Jinnah to Z.A. Bhutto. He knew them all — perhaps, only too well.

Nayar's personal 'trysts with destiny' began early. In 1945, as a young student, he heard M.A. Jinnah speak to a sparse audience in Lahore. Nayar asked him whether after independence, Hindus and Muslims might be 'at each other's throats'. Jinnah disagreed, countering that the two new nations would live in amity, like postwar Germany and France.

On Jan 30, 1948, he walked in Birla House, the scene of Gandhi's assassination, noticing "a few drops of blood glistening in the receding light".

He interviewed K. Abdul Ghaffar Khan — the Frontier Gandhi —

who startled Nayar by asking him pointedly: "Kya aap log baniya hotay ho?" (Are you Indians still traders?)

In February 1999, he travelled to Lahore in PM Atal Bihari Vajpayee's peace bus yatra from Amritsar to Lahore. An advocate of Indo-Pak amity, he renewed his commitment each year by lighting a peace candle on Wagah border on Aug 14-15.

Nayar had unbridled admiration for Jawaharlal Nehru's commitment to democracy and secularism. He thought less of Indira Gandhi, and even less so after being imprisoned by her for his abrasive articles. Nayar could see that Sanjay Gandhi held sway over her. He asked Sanjay how long did he think he and his mother could get away with their authoritarian tactics? Sanjay replied: "In my scheme of things, there were to be no elections for three to four decades."

Kuldip describes Z.A. Bhutto as "brilliant, audacious, and adventurous [but] arrogant". Bhutto asked Nayar, now that he had met Indira, Sheikh Mujib and himself, did he not agree that he (Bhutto) "deserved to be prime minister of the subcontinent?"

At Shimla, Nayar insists, "Bhutto had accepted the ceasefire line as an international border, meaning thereby that Pakistan would retain the territory it held in Kashmir (called Azad Kashmir), and India the rest of the Valley, Jammu and Ladakh". (PM Modi's subsequent abrogation of Article 370 had early roots). Nayar's plethora of Pakistani friends included Faiz Ahmed Faiz, whose verses (if not his recitation) he admired. Nayar believed that Faiz's "humanity was his religion". He asked Faiz who was his favourite singer. To his surprise, Faiz did not say Iqbal Bano nor

Noor Jehan. He opted for Nayyara Noor.

On one of his trips to Lahore, Kuldip Nayar asked to meet Noor Jehan. He was taken to a film studio in Model Town. Not recognising her at first (he remembered her as the Baby Noor Jehan of her Bombay days), he began by asking how many songs had she sung. Her witty response— "Na hi gaano ka shumaar hai, aur na hi gunahon ka" (Neither can I re-m-ember the number of records, nor count the number of sins I have committed).

Nayar met Nawaz Sharif during his exile in Jeddah. He did not accept Sharif's assertion that he knew nothing about Kargil. (Nayar drew a comparison with Bhutto's denial about prior knowledge of the 1965 war.)

After Sharif's ouster, Nayar interviewed A.B. Vajpayee. Vajpayee told him: "Nawaz Sharif sacrificed himself for us." Referring to the back-channel talks between R.K. Mishra and Niaz Naik, Vajpayee added: "We were almost there." Years later, PM Manmohan Singh expressed the same regret over the failure of the S.K. Lambah/ Tariq Aziz talks.

Like many others, Nayar commented on Sonia Gandhi's use of "stalking horse". He too noticed "how unhappy Manmohan Singh looked when occupying the chair ahead of Sonia Gandhi, his benefactor". After Nayar's death in 2018, his ashes crossed Wagah border where he had lit candles each year, and then were immersed by co-peacekeepers in the river Ravi. Before his death, Nayar predicted that PM Modi "is not likely to take any initiative on Pakistan". Neither then, nor it would appear ever again in PM Modi's political lifetime. -- Courtesy Dawn

Informal jobs

In the last decade, informal jobs have mushroomed in Pakistan. Part of the reason is the high income tax levy which makes small firms contain costs by hiring cheap labour for informal jobs. Historically, societies have not been able to grow economically without a structured job market. In Tanzania, Ethiopia and the Czech Republic, for example, cheap labour coupled with the scarcity of capital made informal labour predominate even in industry. Clearly, these economies have suffered stagnation as opposed to Taiwan and Vietnam, where the main driver of growth was the formal jobs sector.

With fast automation in all sectors, labour-intensive economies are likely to spiral further downward. Traditionally, in Pakistan, low-cost labour has meant quick income for families that have many mouths to feed. However, this can at best be a survival mechanism for a fledgling economy. Hope for growth can only come from a sound industrial policy that not only creates formal employment but also upgrades the skill level required for those jobs.

Education and training remain the key drivers of economic, industrial and social development as we have seen in many successful economies. Those that have run into roadblocks after a period of intense growth — such as the Philippines and Argentina — have been burgeoning informal economies. Both economies, once successful, struggled due to the exponential growth of their informal sectors, relying on low-skilled labour.

From street vendors to low-wage domestic staff, unskilled handymen to unlicensed

wives, we have seen the unregulated growth of low-wage jobs in Pakistan. Those in low-skill jobs will always be at a disadvantage due to the unsustainable nature of the work, lack of contracts and zero social or legal protection. What's worse is the lack of economic mobility where generations will be trapped in the disadvantaged strata of society.

For sustained industrial growth, STEAM-based and digital literacy programmes need to be established for quick labour mobility — a paradigm shift from low-paying, low-skilled jobs to learning the ropes for more demanding, high-paying jobs. Developments in technology will essentially result in large gaps between those who are unable to rise to the job demands — therefore falling prey to wage stagnation or lay-offs — and those who can upgrade their skills.

In the absence of a higher education system that can develop the skills required by industry, the government will need to establish programmes to upskill workers in a public-private partnership model. Last year, in a bid to contribute to technological development, 100,000 laptops were handed out on a merit basis to university graduates. Initiatives like these are a case of 'too little, too late'. It is not so much access to technology that is required but the skills to be able to use the technology. Access can be provided on the job. Yet, without training, technology will still be out of reach for many.

This brings us back to the critical need for education and training to address the skills gap, for growth to be enabled in all sectors of the economy. Higher education institutes worldwide provide

part-time jobs to students that enables them to earn a little extra, develop basic skills that will lay the ground for their professional lives and also to help them engage in some networking with industry professionals. Part-time jobs at university have a range of benefits, from learning time-management and interpersonal skills to acquiring work discipline; the students are already on a springboard to support their careers.

In Pakistan, however, the jobs that should be open to students are usually taken by less skilled, low-wage earners. In an informal economy, we can't strictly classify jobs as open to 'students only'. There are huge opportunities that we haven't tapped into. We haven't yet explored the options available for certifying students for jobs because all these and much more are being managed in an informal capacity by untrained workers.

In many countries, students work in libraries, cafeterias, or as administrative and research assistants in a paid capacity. There are university portals that list the available on-campus jobs, and any certification options such as first-aid worker jobs. This is where students find preparatory ground for soft skills that will be required in a more formal job environment. Students can also undertake shadow work or apprenticeships within the university IT, marketing or curriculum planning teams. Gradually, we may be able to stem the tide of informal employment and bring more citizens into the safety net through training and regulation. -- Courtesy Dawn

China, Pakistan ink landmark leather industry pact, boosting Sino-Pak collaboration, trade

At least 34 dead as Israeli planes hit UN school and homes in Gaza, hospitals say

Monitoring Desk DEIR AL-BALAH: Israeli airstrikes across Gaza overnight and Wednesday hit a UN school sheltering displaced Palestinian families as well as two homes, killing at least 34 people, including 19 women and children, hospital officials said. A UN official said six staffers were among the dead.

The war in Gaza is now into its 11th month, with tens of thousands of people dead, and international efforts to mediate a cease-fire between Israel and the Hamas militant group have repeatedly stalled as they accuse each other of making additional and unacceptable demands.

In the occupied West Bank, Israeli troops launched raids in several towns backed by airstrikes, continuing a crackdown across the territory that the military says is targeting fighters but has wrecked

neighborhoods and killed civilians. One airstrike killed five people the military said were militants threatening its troops. A second strike on a car killed at least three people, the Palestinian Health Ministry said.

An attacker crashed a fuel truck into a West Bank bus stop near the Israeli settlement of Givat Assaf, killing an Israeli soldier, the military said. Officials said soldiers and an armed civilian "neutralized" the attacker.

The strike on the UN's al-Jaouni Preparatory Boys School in the Nuseirat refugee camp killed at least 14, including two children and a woman, officials from Awda and al-Aqsa Martyrs hospitals said. At least 18 other people were wounded, they said.

The Israeli military said it was targeting Hamas militants planning attacks from inside the school. The

claim could not be independently confirmed.

One of the children killed was the daughter of Momin Selmi, a member of Gaza's civil defense agency, which rescues wounded and retrieves bodies after strikes, the agency said.

Gaza's schools are packed with tens of thousands of Palestinians driven from their homes by Israeli offensives and evacuation orders. The al-Jaouni school, one of many in Gaza run by the UN agency for Palestinians, or UNRWA, has been hit by multiple strikes during the war. UNRWA said six staffers aiding the displaced, including the manager of the shelter, were killed. "Humanitarian staff, premises & operations have been blatantly & unabatedly disregarded since the beginning of the war," the agency's director, Philippe Lazzarini, wrote on X.

Saudi Crown Prince, Chinese PM discuss cooperation in several sectors

Monitoring Desk BEIJING: Chinese Premier Li Qiang and Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed Bin Salman discussed cooperation in several sectors including energy, investment and trade in a meeting in Riyadh on Wednesday, the Saudi state news agency SPA reported.

Earlier, Li had urged Beijing and the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC), which includes Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, to accelerate free trade negotiations. Li made his remarks in a meeting in Riyadh with GCC Secretary General Jassem al-Budaiwi, Chinese state news agency Xinhua said. SPA reported that al-Budaiwi had stressed the importance of moving forward and finalising the trade talks in the "near future".

The free trade negotiations have stalled over concerns by Saudi Arabia about cheap Chinese imports, with sources telling Reuters in May that the talks were at an impasse.

Tehran did not deliver missiles to Russia, foreign minister says

Monitoring Desk DUBAI: Iran's foreign minister said on Wednesday that Tehran had not delivered any ballistic missiles to Russia and sanctions imposed on Iran by the United States and three European powers would not solve any problems between them.

"Once again, US and E3 act on faulty intelligence and flawed logic. Iran has NOT delivered ballistic missiles to Russia. Period... Sanctions are not a solution, but part of problem."

Hamas says ready to implement ceasefire without new conditions

Monitoring Desk CAIRO: The Palestinian Hamas group said on Wednesday that its negotiators reiterated its readiness to implement an "immediate" ceasefire with Israel in Gaza based on a previous US proposal without new conditions from any party.

The Palestinian group said in a statement that their negotiation team, led by senior official Khalil al-Hayya, met mediators on Wednesday including Qatar's Prime Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al Thani and Egypt's intelligence chief Abbas Kamel in Doha to discuss the latest developments in Gaza.

Talks have so far failed to reach a deal to end the 11-month-old war. Lingered issue include control of the Philadelphi corridor, a narrow stretch of land on Gaza's border with Egypt, persisting.

CIA Director William Burns, who is also the chief US negotiator on Gaza, said on Saturday that a more detailed ceasefire proposal would be made in the next several days.

Trump says debate was 'rigged'

Monitoring Desk WASHINGTON: Republican US presidential candidate Donald Trump on Wednesday claimed — without providing evidence — that the debate between him and rival Kamala Harris was "rigged."

"It was a rigged deal, as I assumed it would be, because when you looked at the fact that they were correcting everything and not correcting with her," he said on right-wing news channel Fox News.

He also panned pop megastar Taylor Swift for endorsing Harris shortly after the debate.

Blinken says US will keep pressing Israel to spare Gaza humanitarian sites

Monitoring Desk NEW YORK: The U.S. secretary of state said Thursday the United States will continue to press Israel to do more to spare humanitarian sites in the Gaza Strip, a day after an Israeli airstrike on a U.N. school complex sheltering displaced Palestinians killed 14 people there, including six U.N. staffers.

Meanwhile, Turkey announced its own probe into the death of a Turkish-American activist who was shot and killed by Israeli forces last week while protesting settlements in the occupied West Bank. And a Syrian pro-government media outlet and an opposition war monitor said an Israeli strike hit a car in southern Syria on Thursday, killing two people.

The deaths at the U.N. school on Wednesday came amid a spate of Israeli airstrikes across Gaza that killed at least 34 Palestinians, according to local officials. Among those killed were 19 women and children, they said.

The Health Ministry says more than 41,000 Palestinians have been killed in Gaza since the Israel-Hamas war began. It does not differentiate between fighters and civilians in its count. The war has caused vast destruction and displaced about 90% of Gaza's population of 2.3 million, often multiple times.

Greek PM says German border plan will be burden for Greece

Monitoring Desk ATHENS: Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis said on Thursday that a German plan to impose tighter checks at its land borders amounted to unilateral scrapping Europe's open-border Schengen zone and would burden frontline states such as Greece.

Germany said this week that the checks within what is normally a wide area of free movement - the Schengen zone - would start on Sept. 16 and initially last for six months, as the country tries to clamp down on irregular migration.

"Germany had an extremely tolerant and I would say socially generous policy against migrants which is now triggering a big social backlash," Mitsotakis said in an interview with a Greek radio station. "The response cannot be unilaterally scrapping Schengen and dropping the ball to countries which sit on Europe's external borders," he said.

Instead, the EU Pact on Migration and Asylum, a revamped migration system which recognises the importance of guarding Europe's external borders, should be implemented, Mitsotakis said.

Greece was on the frontline of Europe's migration crisis in 2015-16 when more than a million refugees - many of them fleeing civil war in Syria - arrived, mainly via Turkey. Most eventually moved on to Germany and other Western European destinations.

The number of arrivals in Greece has since fallen sharply but many migrants, mainly from Libya and Egypt, still reach Greek shores before also heading towards western Europe. Mitsotakis' conservative government, which won a second term last year, has tightened its migration policy since 2019. A cement and barbed-wire fence that Greece is extending along its northern border with Turkey to prevent migrants from entering the country will be completed within a year, Greek Citizen Protection Minister Michalis Chrisochoidis told state television on Thursday.

North Korea launches multiple ballistic missiles off Korean peninsula

Monitoring Desk SEOUL: After months of trading provocations with South Korea and a recently renewed vow to keep growing its nuclear arsenal, North Korea sent its most aggressive message yet when it fired numerous ballistic missiles into the Sea of Japan on Wednesday, as confirmed by both South Korea and Japan.

North Korea fired multiple short range ballistic missiles into waters east of the Korean peninsula on Thursday, Seoul's military reported, days after the nuclear-armed North marked a state anniversary.

Seoul's Joint Chief of Staff said it had detected multiple "short-range ballistic missiles launched into the East Sea around 07:10 from Pyongyang today (2210 GMT on Wednesday)," referring to the body of water also known as the Sea of Japan.

It said it was analysing details of the launch and "closely sharing information on the North Korean ballistic missile with the USA and Japanese authorities, while strengthening surveillance and vigilance in preparation for further launches".

Japan's defence ministry also confirmed the launch of at least one suspected North Korean ballistic missile, with the coastguard warning vessels to take care.

It is Pyongyang's first apparent weapons test since July 1, and comes days after the isolated, nuclear-armed country marked a key anniversary celebrating the founding of the ruling regime.

Guinea Bissau President Embalo says he will not run for a second term

Monitoring Desk BISSAU: Guinea Bissau's President Umaro Cissoko Embalo said on Thursday he would not run for a second term in elections in November.

Embalo, 51, was elected in January 2020 to succeed outgoing president Jose Mario Vaz. He defeated runner-up Domingos Simoes Pereira with 54% of the vote and would have been eligible for another term in office.

The unexpected announcement could trigger a power vacuum and heighten political instability in the coup-prone country of around two million people.

At the end of a council of ministers on Thursday night, Embalo said his wife had dissuaded him from running again.

EU special envoy meets Azam Nazeer Tarar to discuss religious freedom

ISLAMABAD (APP): Federal Minister for Law & Justice, Human Rights and Parliamentary Affairs, Senator Azam Nazeer Tarar held a meeting with Ambassador Frans Van Daele, the EU Special Envoy for freedom of religion and belief. EU Ambassador to Pakistan Dr. Riina Kionka, Political Counsellor Rukiye Kumurcu and Cooperative Associate Lorion were also present in the meeting.

The discussions centered around enhancing cooperation on religious freedom, protecting minority rights, and advancing legislative reforms in Pakistan. Ambassador Daele praised Pakistan's efforts to promote freedom of religion but highlighted ongoing challenges faced by religious minorities, such as forced marriages and conversions. He emphasized the need for enhanced safeguards to better protect vulnerable groups.

In response, Federal Minister Azam Nazeer Tarar reaffirmed Pakistan's dedication to these protections, highlighting constitutional guarantees under Articles 20, 22, and 28, which ensure equal rights for all citizens regardless of their religion. He also highlighted the role of the Zainab Alert Response and Recovery Agency (ZARRA) in coordinating law enforcement efforts, raising public awareness and facilitating prompt action to address cases of missing or abducted children and those at risk of forced marriages.

The Child Protection Institute (CPI) and provincial child protection bureaus further contribute by creating safe environments for at-risk children, particularly those vulnerable to forced marriages or exploitation, and ensuring they receive essential support and protection, the minister said.

The minister also outlined Pakistan's broader commitment to human rights through the National Action Plan on Human

Rights, which focuses on policy reforms, access to justice, and adherence to international treaty obligations. He emphasized the role of independent bodies like the National Commission for Human Rights (NCHR), which recently received A-status accreditation from the UN's GANHRI, further strengthening Pakistan's human rights mechanisms.

Additionally, he said that a toll-free helpline (1099) provides legal advice on human rights violations, and the government has also implemented Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) to prevent the misuse of blasphemy laws, ensuring equal protection for all religions. He said that provincial efforts are also underway to secure places of worship and investigate cases of forced conversions.

The EU delegation praised Pakistan's comprehensive efforts in safeguarding vulnerable communities.
