UNITED NATIONS (APP): Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Thursday jointly 48 world leaders virtually, to outline their expectations for this month's Summit of the Future in New York, underscoring "effective" international cooperation to address global challenges, including the developing nation's rising debt burdens.

"The Summit of the Future represents a great opportunity. We must not lose it," the Pakistani leader told the virtual live event as part of a global call to action to support the once-

in-a-generation UN summit, which begins on 22 September at UN Headquarters.

Over 130 Heads of State and Government are expected to attend the landmark event, which will be held just ahead of the annual high-level debate in the UN General Assembly, which opens on Sept 24.

The Summit brings together countries from around the world, marking a critical opportunity for far-reaching agreements on international collaboration for a safer, more sustainable and more equitable world.

CM Murad, UNRC discuss ongoing, future support to meet climate change challenges

KARACHI (APP): Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah and a delegation of the United Nations in Pakistan, led by its Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator (UNRC) Mohamed Yahya discussed ongoing and future collaboration and support between the provincial government and the UN to meet the challenges of climate change in their meeting at the CM House.

The UN Coordinator acknowledged the contributions of the Sindh government in providing an enabling environment to UN agencies and their partners in carrying out interventions in the province by the UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework, which is an agreement between the UN in Pakistan and the government to work on key areas aligned with the country's development.

The UN has a significant presence in Sindh with interventions encompassing health, education, livelihoods, poverty alleviation, nutrition, enterprise development and climate-resilient agriculture and water management, Shah said.

Meeting held to discuss fisheries issues of Sindh, Balochistan

KARACHI: An important meeting was held on Friday to discuss the fisheries issues of Sindh and Balochistan in which Advisor to Chief Minister Sindh on Livestock and Fisheries Syed Najmi Alam, Secretary Livestock Fisheries Sindh Dr. Kazim Hussain Jatoti, Balochistan Parliamentary Secretary Fisheries Barkat Ali Rand, Secretary Fisheries Balochistan Javed Ahmed Shahwani along with their delegation of officials attended. It was decided in the meeting that guju is being used by trawlers despite the ban in Balochistan and legal action will be taken against it while the fisheries departments of Sindh and Balochistan enact such legislation to ensure the protection of marine life. It was also decided in the meeting that a vessel monitoring system will be installed in hunting launches and both provinces will take legal action against illegal fishing and share details of launches used in illegal fishing with each other.

Syed Najmi Alam told the fisheries officials from Balochistan that we are imposing a complete ban on bottom trawling in Sindh province in order to fully protect marine life. For this we need more legislation and that will be done, DG Marine Fisheries Dr. Ali Muhammad Mastoi, Director Marine Fisheries Asim Karim and Balochistan Government Fisheries Department Director Technical Dr. Alauddin Karachi.

Swat Police nab 3 TTP terrorists

SWAT (APP): Swat Police and the Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) on Friday arrested three Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) terrorists linked to the August 28 bombing of the Nawakaly Banr Police post, which martyred one officer and injured two others.

At a press conference, DPO Dr. Zahidullah Khan revealed that Muhammad Haris, Burhanullah, and Shahzad were caught using scientific investigation methods and modern technology, including CCTV footage.

The arrested terrorists are close relatives of TTP members, with family ties to the organization.

President greet Makhdoom on NA-171 bye-poll victory

ISLAMABAD (APP): President Asif Ali Zardari on Friday congratulated Makhdoom Tahir Rasheed on winning the bye-election in the NA-171 constituency of Rahim Yar Khan.

The president, in a statement issued by the President House, expressed the hope that Makhdoom Tahir would come up to the expectations of the people of his constituency.

He instructed him to give a special attention to the resolution of people's issues and their welfare.

President Zardari expressed the hope that Makhdoom Tahir would duly represent the people of Rahim Yar Khan in the National Assembly, besides thanking the voters for reposing trust in him.

PM chairs high-level review meeting on Monkeypox situation

ISLAMABAD (APP): Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif on Friday chaired a high-level review meeting to assess the current situation and precautionary measures being taken to prevent the spread of Monkeypox (Mpx) in the country.

The prime minister emphasized the importance of vigilance and preparedness, directing authorities to adopt all necessary measures to prevent the virus from spreading within the country. "All necessary precautionary measures to prevent Monkeypox

should be adopted," the prime minister said directing the officials concerned to raise public awareness about preventive steps.

He also instructed that scanning at all airports, seaports, and land entry points must be strictly enforced to detect any potential cases.

The prime minister said Pakistan was not currently facing an emergency situation related to Monkeypox. However, he stressed the need for continued preparedness, particularly by the Ministry of Health and the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA).

Ahsan Iqbal highlights delays and cost escalation in Diamer Basha Dam Project

ISLAMABAD (APP): Federal Minister for Planning, Development and Special Initiatives, Ahsan Iqbal on Friday chaired a review meeting on the progress of the Diamer Basha Dam project.

The meeting was attended by the Secretary of Planning, Chairman WAPDA, and senior officials of other relevant departments, according to a press release.

During the meeting, Ahsan Iqbal said that the Diamer Basha Dam is a crucial project for Pakistan's water and food security and must be completed expeditiously in the national interest.

He said that in 2018, the estimated construction cost of the Diamer Basha Dam was Rs. 479 billion,

and Rs. 120 billion had already been spent on land acquisition.

However, due to delays and unnecessary postponements during the previous government, the cost of the project has increased significantly.

He said that in 2020, construction was hastily started without proper financing, which further compounded the problems.

The Planning Minister said that during the tenure of the previous government, the cost of the project was estimated at Rs600 billion and even Rs750 billion in various meetings of the standing committees, while on paper, an estimate of Rs480 billion was being shown till date.

Monetary easing

Continuing ongoing monetary easing, the State Bank has slashed its key policy rate by 200bps from 19.5pc to 17.5pc for the third time since June. Cumulatively, the bank has sliced the interest rates by 450bps from the decade-high of 22pc in three months.

The fresh reduction in the borrowing costs shows the central bank's confidence over recent economic stability amid hopes that the IMF Board would approve the new loan programme by the end of this month. The rate cut was widely anticipated amid a sharp drop in headline inflation to a single digit in August, and growth in the delta between the current CPI reading and the SBP's policy rate to 10 percentage points.

The surprise in the policy decision was the quantum of the rate reduction. The bank said its decision was informed by the sharp fall in both headline and core inflation. The faster disinflation, resulting from a delay in the implementation of the planned increase in the administered domestic energy prices, as well as the decline in global oil and food prices has somewhat exceeded SBP expectations.

Additionally, the rate cut is driven by a sharp fall in global oil prices despite market volatility, stable SBP forex reserves at around \$9.5bn in spite of weak official inflows and continued debt repayments, and improvement in inflation expectations and business confidence. Still, the quantum of the latest rate cut is believed to have been dictated by a large decline in the secondary market yields of government securities.

While there is no uncertainty about continued monetary easing over the next few reviews, experts are divided on the extent of future rate cuts and the pace at which these should be done. The delta between inflation and policy rate suggests another couple of sharp rate cuts in November and December. But if future monetary policy is to continue focusing on maintaining positive real interest rates to lower inflation to the 5pc-7pc target by the end of next September and ensure macroeconomic stability, the pace of future rate cuts would have to be slowed down.

The SBP itself has underlined that the near-term inflation outlook is susceptible to risks. Core inflation is still high and consumers' inflation expectations increasing further. Also, there is uncertainty stemming from the timing and magnitude of adjustments in administered energy prices, the future course of global commodity prices, and any additional taxation measures to meet the shortfall in revenue collection. On balance, the bank's view is that average inflation will fall below the forecast range of 11.5pc-13.5pc for FY25. But this will depend on targeted fiscal consolidation and the timely realisation of planned external inflows. Thus, it would be prudent to first evaluate how enduring the plunge in inflation is before slashing the rate further.

Privatisation myth

Beyond sensational late-night arrests of opposition MNAs, impunity for abductors and unending intrigue, there is a remarkable degree of continuity and consistency in how the Pakistani ruling class rules.

Working people and ethnic peripheries are of secondary importance to all who occupy the corridors of power; their primary concern is to appease big creditors and foreign investors.

Which is why former finance minister Ishaq Dar's unveiled dig at the IMF is somewhat amusing. Let's be honest: all bourgeois parties seek only to secure a share of the piece in the debt-ridden, militarised structure of power, so much so that policymaking is akin to farce. Whoever is in the seat of government reproduces the same tired economic policy prescriptions. There is no bigger example of this than the privatisation mantra.

The present turbo-charged hybrid regime has followed the previous one in depicting privatisation of 'sick' state-owned enterprises as a panacea for our economic woes, an initiative, Mr Dar should be reminded, is entirely consistent with the IMF's agenda.

The argument is simple: SOEs offer poor quality services while draining the public exchequer, so sell them off to the private sector and all will be well.

PIA is at the top of the chopping block. But there are many government departments either slated for sale or touted for a rechristening. Take PWD for example, which is to be abolished and replaced by a new infrastructure authority which will likely be a handmaiden of FWO. There are dozens of other public institutions that

will, to use established policy-speak, be downsized or rightsized.

Let's start with big fish like PIA. While airline travel is not the best example of truly public transport, it is nevertheless true that PIA used to offer highly subsidised fares to destinations like Gilgit and Gwadar.

Did this represent a burden on the public exchequer? It did, but then public services are not supposed to be subjected to the logic of profit-maximising capitalist firms. More generally, PIA's performance and finances have not nosedived because it is state-owned; it can be argued that its financial plight is at least partially explained by the short-termism of the highly paid foreign consultants and executives hired over the past two decades precisely to fix the airline's woes.

In the case of Pakistan Railways, financial woes are even easier to trace: until the 1980s, PR had a monopoly on freight traffic. In 1982, the National Logistics Cell was created, and a road-building frenzy was initiated that continues to this day. The NLC has now totally displaced PR in freight. The Railways' passenger service was always subsidised by its cargo revenues.

Moving on to PTCL: when the enterprise was forcibly privatised under the Musharraf dictatorship, it was one of the most profitable enterprises in the country. In almost 20 years since, there has neither been a marked improvement in PTCL's services, nor has its share value recovered to what it was in 2005. Arguably, the most notable fact is that it was sold to Etisalat, the UAE's state-owned telecom company.

I could give more examples — of private sector IPPs that have run riot in the power sector,

or local commercial banks that dole out cheap credit with reckless abandon, fuelling conspicuous consumption in cars and real estate, thus reinforcing jobless growth that accompanies the 'privatise everything' mantra loved by both our own economic czars and omnipotent creditors.

But I will save the last word for the long-suffering ethnic peripheries, where a hybrid privatisation of land, forest, water and minerals — a true enclosure of the commons — takes all manner of hybrid forms, depriving indigenous populations of even a modicum of the benefits of what our rulers call 'development'.

Reko Diq, Saindak, Gwadar, Sindh's coast-islands, Thar, the mountains of Gilgit-Baltistan, the Paktun tribal districts, Swat, Dir, Kohistan and so many more are literally up for grabs: the nexus of foreign firms, the establishment and local big men pillage at will, sometimes by signing formal contracts and at other times through sheer gangsterism.

The case of Reko Diq is astonishing — a reckless contract award to one multinational company resulted in a fine of \$6 billion, only for the government to turn around and promise a concession for the mine to another multinational company. They call it privatisation to make it sound like the state and private sector are somehow at odds. In fact, both are engaged in what Marx called primary accumulation, an inherently violent process that is becoming more brazen by the day. Neither our own ruling class nor its foreign patrons have any interest in taming the particularly exploitative and brutal nature of the beast that is Pakistani capitalism. --

Community service

Throughout Pakistan's history, we have experienced numerous crises. We have fought wars on different fronts, and faced natural calamities, political upheavals, displacements and economic meltdowns. During these crises, the nation as a whole has come forward to help those affected directly and indirectly. The nation has shown an immense sense of community service during these trying times. However, this spirit remains transitory and limited; we lack the sense of community service in more 'normal' times.

Community service is one of the fundamental requirements of Islamic teachings. Islam enjoins believers to remain active in serving the community. The Holy Quran mentions "...And do not forget liberality between yourselves. Truly, Allah is All-Seer of what you do" (2:237). Therefore, there remains a constant need to inculcate a sense of community service.

The Holy Quran exemplifies the role of Hazrat Yusuf when Egypt faced a long-term famine situation. Hazrat Yusuf distributed food to his people. This example underlines the importance of social service.

Life is admittedly difficult and busy nowadays, with everyone trying to make two ends meet. But one can spare a few moments for community service. Working for the welfare of others is a sure key to improving oneself.

We can address many problems through community service. One such problem that needs immediate attention is the problem of climate change. Human activities are the main driver of climate change, primarily due to the burning of fossil fuels like coal, oil

and gas, etc. We can mitigate the effects of climate change by growing more and more trees in all the big and small cities of Pakistan under the umbrella of community service.

Growing more trees and making our land greener is a fit answer to climate change. Trees provide safety in heatwaves and harsh weather. They are amongst the greatest signs of nature. They protect creatures from extreme heat, while providing essential ecosystems. Trees release large amounts of oxygen and absorb carbon dioxide, reduce risks from floods and landslides, and increase environmental resilience to climate change. Beyond sequestering greenhouse gases, they offer multiple services vital for planetary health and human well-being, including water, clean air, food, biodiversity habitats, and recreational spaces.

Tree plantation can be linked to the education system of the country. The federal government has recently launched the Green Pakistan Initiative to mitigate the adverse effect of climate change. If students are engaged and assigned a role to make the country greener by planting more and more saplings everywhere, it would be a great service to Pakistan. They may be encouraged with an award or extra marks appreciating their efforts in nation-building. This needs to be made a permanent feature of the curriculum.

Our students spend a number of years in school, college and university, where they learn about many subjects. Along with theoretical knowledge, they need to be involved practically in nation-building. It is obvious that many students are under pressure during examinations and

are made to run behind marks and grades, leaving little or no room for community service. In essence, academic learning must be interwoven with meaningful community service so that classroom knowledge can be implemented in a real-world setting.

On a visit to rural Sindh, I found a school where students were busy in a plantation drive. Each student has been allocated a particular space to plant coconut palm trees. All students wholeheartedly participated in the drive. I was told that once the trees are mature and fruit-bearing, the school will reap sufficient funds from them.

Such schemes can be tailor-made and replicated as a part of the state-sponsored Green Pakistan Initiative in all schools. Schools may be assigned certain areas, streets or localities to plant trees with care till they are fully mature and self-supportive. At the end, the schools may be declared successful if they have achieved their target of plantation. In this way, the students would become a part of the plantation drive.

This is one form of community service which students can offer under the patronage of their respective schools. This will make students realise that they are caretakers of the earth and are responsible for safeguarding its beauty.

They will also be mobilised against environmentally unsound and unhealthy practices that are detrimental to the planet. Planting trees will prove a memorable feature of these students' lives. This will also be an opportunity for schools to declare the exercise a part of extra-curricular activities, thus creating a lasting impact on the minds of students. -- Courtesy Dawn

PM calls for SMEs capacity building to enhance profitability

ISLAMABAD (APP): Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Friday directed the authorities concerned to take measures for the capacity building of small and medium enterprises (SMEs) to enhance their profitability. The prime minister, who chaired a meeting of the steering committee of Small and Medium Enterprises Development Authority, said that steps to boost SMEs exports was inevitable for national economy, according to a

PM Office press release. The prime minister, who was briefed about the strategy for uplifting the SMEs, called them the engine of national development and instructed the immediate operationalisation of the SMEDA Board. Prime Minister Shehbaz highlighting the role of women in national economy, asked the authorities concerned to include women entrepreneurs in the decision making related to the SMEs. He also called for raising the standards of

export products at par with international practices and engage the experts of international repute to uplift the SMEs sector.

The prime minister was also briefed about the measures to make SMEs profitable, their access to easy loans, promotion of SMEs exports, facilitation of women in SMEs and their cohesion with the climate change. It was told that climate change would be tackled by introducing technology of manufacturing textile

SPI witnesses nominal increase of 0.01%

ISLAMABAD (APP): The weekly inflation, measured by the Sensitive Price Indicator (SPI), witnessed a nominal increase of 0.01 percent for the combined consumption groups during the week ended on September 12, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) reported on Friday.

According to the PBS data, the SPI for the week under review in the above-mentioned group was recorded at 319.28 points as compared to 319.24 during the past week.

As compared to the corresponding week of last year, the SPI for the combined consumption group in the week under review witnessed an increase of 14.36 per cent. The weekly SPI with the base year 2015-16 = 100 covers 17 urban centres and 51 essential items for all expenditure groups. Likewise, SPI for the lowest consumption group of up to Rs 17,732 witnessed increase of 0.58 per cent and went up to 312.14 points from last week's 310.35 points.

SBP injects Rs11.77 trillion into market

KARACHI (APP): The State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) injected Rs11,772.55 billion in the market on Friday through reverse repo purchase and Shariah Compliant Mudarabah based Open Market Operation (OMO).

According to OMO results issued here, the SBP conducted Open Market Operation, Reverse Repo Purchase (Injection) on September 13, 2024 for 7-day and 28-day tenors and accepted 51 bids cumulatively amounting to Rs11,647.55 billion.

Rupee gains 28 paise against dollar

ISLAMABAD (APP): Pakistani rupee on Friday appreciated by 10 paise against the US dollar in the interbank trading and closed at Rs 278.16 against the previous day's closing of Rs 278.44.

However, according to the Forex Association of Pakistan (FAP), the buying and selling rates of the dollar in the open market stood at Rs 279.00 and Rs 280.85 respectively.

Ali Pervaiz says: Economic reform agenda underway to bring stability

ISLAMABAD (APP): Minister of State for Finance, Revenue, and Power Ali Pervaiz Malik said on Sunday that the government chalked out economic reforms to seek long-term stability in the country. Talking to a private news channel, he said that the Pakistan Muslim League Nawaz (PML-N) government worked hard to

resolve economic problems. Through the positive and consistent economic policies, the inflation was brought down from 40 percent to a single digit, he added. Today, all the economic indicators were on a positive trajectory, as Fitch and Moody's were also given positive ratings to the economy of the country, he added.

PARC introduced 10 high-yielding pulses seed varieties during current year

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Variety Evaluation Committee of the Pakistan Agriculture Research Council (PARC) during the current year has approved ten high-yielding pulses varieties to boost the output of pulses in the country and reduce the reliance on imported leguminous vegetables.

"These pulses play a crucial role in global food security and nutrition of the country, whereas

Pakistan needs 1.56 million tons of pulses annually," said an official of the council. Talking to APP here on Friday, he said, "The country has become self-sufficient in mung production during 2021-22 which was 0.263 million tons against the total requirement of 0.180 million tons."

"These ten high-yielding pulse varieties are poised to revolutionize the pulses output."

Shaza Fatima says: Pak inclusion in top tiers of Global Cybersecurity Index good news for IT industry

ISLAMABAD (APP): State Minister for Information Technology and Telecommunication, Shaza Fatima Khawaja said on Friday that Pakistan's inclusion in the top tiers of the International Telecommunication Union (ITU) 2024 Global Cybersecurity Index (GCI) report is good news for the country's IT industry.

Addressing a press conference she said that Pakistan position in ITU-2021 Global Cyber security was at 79 while in the current report, Pakistan ranked among the Top-tier 46 countries.

She said that the report indicated that Pakistan's legal, technical, capacity development, skill development and organizational advancement are role models.

"The Global Cybersecurity Index 2024 shows significant improvements by countries that are implementing essential legal measures, plans, capacity building

Cybercrime case: Court confirms interim bail of Swati, others

LAHORE (APP): A sessions court on Friday confirmed the interim bail of Azam Khan Swati, Ali Zaidi, and Mussarat Jamshed Cheema in a cybercrime case registered by the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) and ordered them to furnish surety bonds of Rs 100,000 each to avail the relief.

Additional District and Sessions Judge Salman Ghumman conducted the proceedings on three separate bail petitions for Azam Swati, Ali Zaidi, and Mussarat Jamshed Cheema, who also appeared upon the expiry of their interim bail.

The defense counsel argued that the FIA had registered a baseless case against his clients, adding that the agency failed to submit any evidence. He submitted that the sections of the PECA Act included in the FIR were bailable and requested the court to confirm his clients' interim bail. However, the FIA's prosecutor opposed the plea and requested the dismissal of the bail petitions. The court, upon completion of arguments by both parties, confirmed the interim bail of all three and ordered them to furnish surety bonds for it.

LHC acquits murder accused

LAHORE (APP): A Lahore High Court (LHC) division bench on Friday acquitted a condemned prisoner for lack of evidence in a murder case against him.

Mamu Kanjan police had registered a case against Zafar Iqbal under Section 302 of the PPC on charges of stabbing his brother-in-law to death. A Tandliawala sessions court had handed down death penalty to the accused in 2021. He had filed an appeal in the high court, challenging the trial court's verdict.

PDWP approves 2 development schemes worth Rs 4.48b

LAHORE (APP): Planning and Development Board Chairman Barrister Nabeel Ahmad Awan chaired the 27th meeting of the Provincial Development Working Party (PDWP) for CFY 2024-25 in which two development schemes worth Rs 4487.543 million were approved. The approved schemes are: 1- Induction of Eco-Friendly Buses in Cities of Punjab (DLI-6 PGDP) at the cost of Rs 3,534 million.

KP waiting for Center's reply on regularization of NCP vehicles: Saif

PESHAWAR (APP): Advisor on Information Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Barrister Muhammad Ali Saif on Friday said the province was waiting for a reply from the Federal Government over suggestions to regularize the non-custom-paid (NCP) vehicles.

In a statement issued to the media, he said the matter of regularization of NCP vehicles in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa was waiting for a decision from the Federal Government adding that as soon as the suggestions forwarded by the KP government was approved, work on

regularization of NCP vehicles will start in the province. Saif further said that there were proofs that NCP vehicles have also been used in terrorist activities, adding that with the registration of these vehicles the owner of the vehicle, used in subversive activity, will easily be identified. The registration of these vehicles, he added, will also generate a hefty revenue for the provincial government.

Chief Minister Ali Amin Gandapur had approved the suggestions for the regularization of NCP vehicles before sending them to the Center for approval.

ANF recovers 419 kg drugs in 10 perations

RAWALPINDI (APP): Anti-Narcotics Force (ANF) while conducting 10 operations across the country managed to recover 419 kg drugs worth Rs 190 million and arrested 10 accused including two Afghan nationals and two women, said an ANF Headquarters spokesman here on Friday. He informed that 70 grams ice was recovered from two suspects going on a motorcycle near a university on Lahaur Road Islamabad. 2.4 kg hashish was recovered from a vehicle intercepted near Wapda Town Peshawar and an accused was arrested.

North Korea gives a glimpse of a secretive uranium-enrichment facility as Kim pushes for more nukes

Monitoring Desk SEOUL: North Korea offered a rare glimpse into a secretive facility to produce weapons-grade uranium as state media reported Friday that leader Kim Jong Un visited the area and called for stronger efforts to "exponentially" increase its number of nuclear weapons.

It's unclear whether the site is at North Korea's main Yongbyon nuclear complex, but it's the North's first disclosure of a uranium-enrichment facility since it showed one at Yongbyon to visiting American scholars in 2010. While the latest unveiling is likely an attempt to apply more pressure on the U.S. and its allies, the images released by North Korean media of the area could provide outsiders with a valuable source of information for estimating the amount of nuclear ingredients that

North Korea has produced. During a visit to the Nuclear Weapons Institute and the facility producing weapons-grade nuclear materials, Kim expressed "great satisfaction repeatedly over the wonderful technical force of the nuclear power field" held by North Korea, the official Korean Central News Agency reported.

KCNA said Kim went around the control room of the uranium enrichment facility and a construction site that would expand its capacity for producing nuclear weapons. North Korean state media photos showed Kim being briefed by scientists while walking along long lines of centrifuges. KCNA didn't say when Kim visited the facilities or where they are located. KCNA said Kim stressed the need to further augment the number of centrifuges to "exponentially

increase the nuclear weapons for self-defense," a goal he has repeatedly stated in recent years. It said Kim ordered officials to push forward the introduction of a new type of centrifuge.

Kim said North Korea needs greater defense and preemptive attack capabilities because "anti-(North Korea) nuclear threats perpetrated by the U.S. imperialists-led vassal forces have become more undisguised and crossed the red line," KCNA said.

South Korea's Unification Ministry strongly condemned North Korea's push to boost its nuclear capability. A ministry statement said North Korea's "illegal" pursuit of nuclear weapons in defiance of U.N. prohibitions is a serious threat to international peace. It said North Korea must realize it cannot win anything with its nuclear program.

14 killed in Afghanistan attack; IS claims responsibility

Monitoring Desk KABUL: Gunmen killed at least 14 people in central Afghanistan on Thursday, the interior ministry said, in an attack that was claimed by the local chapter of the militant Islamic State group.

"Fifteen Shias were killed and six others wounded in an attack carried out by the soldiers of the caliphate in central Afghanistan," the group's Amaq media wing said in a statement.

Attacks in Afghanistan have declined markedly since the Taliban came to power in 2021, but a number of armed groups, including the regional Islamic State-Khorasan, remain a threat.

"Unknown gunmen opened fire and killed civilians," Abdul Matin Qani, spokesman for the interior ministry, said.

A source in Daykundi province said 14 people had been killed and four wounded.

Trump rules out another debate with Kamala

Monitoring Desk WASHINGTON: Donald Trump said on Thursday he would not participate in another televised debate with his Democratic rival Vice President Kamala Harris.

"There will be no third debate!" the Republican candidate wrote on his Truth Social platform, including in his tally the earlier debate with US President Joe Biden in June and his Tuesday showdown with Kamala Harris.

Sweden offers immigrants \$34,000 to leave country

Monitoring Desk STOCKHOLM: Sweden plans to boost payments to up to \$34,000 to immigrants who leave the nation that has been a haven for the war-weary and persecuted, the right-wing government said on Thursday.

The Scandinavian country was for decades seen as a "humanitarian sup-erpower", but over the years has struggled to integrate many of its newcomers. Immigrants who voluntarily return to their countries of origin from 2026 would be eligible to receive

up to 350,000 Swedish kronor, the government, which is prop-ped up by the anti-immigration Sweden Democrats, told a press conference. "We are in the midst of a paradigm shift in our migration policy," Migration Minister Johan Forsell told reporters, as the government presented its latest move to crack down on migration.

Currently immigrants can receive up to 10,000 kronor per adult and 5,000 kronor per child, with a cap of 40,000 kronor per family.

UN chief says lack of accountability on UN staff killings in Gaza 'unacceptable'

Monitoring Desk UNITED NATIONS: A lack of accountability for the killing of United Nations staff and humanitarian aid workers in the Gaza Strip is "totally unacceptable," UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres told Reuters in a wide-ranging interview. Guterres also said that establishing a UN peacekeeping force would not be the "best solution" for Haiti, where armed gangs have taken over much of the capital and expanded to surrounding areas, fueling a humanitarian crisis with mass displacements, sexual violence and widespread hunger. Ahead of the annual meeting of world leaders at the UN General Assembly later this month,

Guterres summed up the past year as "very tough, very difficult." It has been dominated by the war in Gaza, which began just two weeks after leaders left New York following last year's assembly when Palestinian Hamas militants killed 1,200 hostages and took about 250 hostages in a cross-border rampage into Israel, according to Israeli allies. Describing Israel's retaliation against Hamas in Gaza — where local health officials say some 41,000 Palestinians have been killed since the war began — Guterres said there have been "very dramatic violations of the international humanitarian law and the total absence of an effective protection of civilians."

EU's ticking demographic timebomb to focus minds at Budapest talks

Monitoring Desk BRUSSELS: An inexorable decline in the number of working age Europeans will put a huge strain on welfare systems and public finances in coming decades, according to a report that will form the basis of EU discussions later this week on the demographic timebomb.

The presentation, prepared for senior finance ministry and central bank officials from the EU's 27 member states by the Bruegel think tank, said Europe's ageing society will cut the number of people with jobs and paying taxes while boosting the number of those drawing pensions and needing more health care.

Even allowing immigration to continue at current rates - already an unacceptable solution for many Europeans, as shown in growing support for far-right parties - will not be enough to offset the decline in the working-age population, it said.

Hungary, which holds the EU's rotating presi-

dency and will host the discussions on Friday and Saturday, is strongly opposed to increasing immigration and is expected instead to propose remedies such as raising fertility rates through more support for families and boosting labour force participation.

Bruegel said that in the absence of net immigration, the number of people in the 20-64 working age bracket in Europe will fall by about a fifth to 207 million in 2050 from 264 million in 2022.

Even if the 450-million-strong European Union accepted slightly more than one million immigrants a year — broadly the average from 2016-2020 — this would make up for less than half of the decline in the working-age population, Bruegel said.

Other possible actions to help alleviate the impact of an ageing population include better management of healthcare and long-term care costs as well as reform of the pension and health systems, according to the documents under discussion.

Russia expels 6 British diplomats it accuses of spying but the UK calls it 'completely baseless'

Monitoring Desk NEW YORK: Russia on Friday accused six British diplomats of spying and said it decided to expel them. The U.K. said the "completely baseless" move came weeks ago and was linked to its action in May to revoke the credentials of an attaché at the Russian Embassy and limit Moscow's diplomatic activities in London.

The latest East-West tensions unfolded as British Prime Minister Keir Starmer visits Washington for talks that will include Ukraine's request to use Western-supplied weapons to strike targets inside Russia. President Vladimir Putin has warned that Kyiv's use of long-range weapons would put NATO at war with Moscow.

Russia's Federal Security Service said in an online statement that the Foreign

Ministry withdrew the British envoys' accreditations, and Russian TV quoted an FSB official as saying it was decided to expel them.

The FSB said it received documents indicating the diplomats were sent to Russia by a division of the U.K.'s Foreign Office "whose main task is to inflict a strategic defeat on our country," and that they were involved in "intelligence-gathering and subversive activities." It did not identify the six diplomats.

The FSB warned that if other diplomats are found to be carrying out "similar actions," it "will demand early termination of their missions" to Russia.

Russian TV said the six diplomats had met with independent media and rights groups that have been declared "foreign agents".

Germany arrests Syrian man accused of machete attack plot on soldiers

Monitoring Desk BERLIN: German authorities said on Friday they had arrested a 27-year-old Syrian man accused of planning an attack on army soldiers using two machetes.

The suspect, an "alleged follower of a radical Islamic ideology", was arrested on Thursday on charges of planning "a serious act of violence endangering the state".

The man had acquired two heavy knives "around 40 centimetres in length" in recent days, prosecutors in Munich said.

He planned to "attack Bundeswehr soldiers" in the city of Hof in northern Bavaria during their lunch break, aiming "to kill as many of them as possible", they said.

Secretary General assures IMO's support for development of maritime sector in Pakistan

KARACHI (APP): The Secretary General International Maritime Organization (IMO) Arsenio Antonio Dominguez Velasco stressing on compliance of UN conventions on Friday assured continued support of IMO to Pakistan through development projects and technical co-operation for capacity building and efficiency enhancement of the maritime sector in the country.

He was addressing the inaugural session of International Maritime Sustainability Exhibition and Conference IMSEC 2024 here. The 3-day long IMSEC 2024 is being held under the theme "Catalyzing Pakistan's Maritime Transformation" as part of World Maritime Week celebrations.

New airlines seek CAA nod to operate flights in Pakistan

KARACHI (INP): Several new airlines are considering to launch operations in various cities in Pakistan, said Civil Aviation Authority (CAA). As per details, new local airlines including Jet Green, Q Airways, and Go Green Air have approached the CAA for licenses and permits, according to sources. Air Indus has also contacted the Civil Aviation Authority to resume flight operations, sources revealed. Q Aviation and Liberty Air, have also applied for licenses from the CAA to launch flight operations in Pakistan.

The CAA officials said the large number of license applications is significant for the country's economy. The influx of new airlines will provide passengers with better travel options, along with increased foreign exchange in the aviation sector and new job opportunities. It is to be noted that three private companies namely, Airblue, SereneAir and AirSial are already operating in Pakistan. Back in May, the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) unveiled a six-month performance report of airlines, operating domestically, including Pakistan International Airline (PIA).

According to the report of CAA, covering the period from July to December 2023, Pakistan International Airlines (PIA), secured the fourth position in the rankings with departure and arrival ratio stood.

Silent Muslim World, UN cause humanitarian crises in Gaza, says Monem Zafar

KARACHI (INP): Jamaat-e-Islami (JI) Karachi Ameer Monem Zafar has said that the criminal silence and inaction on part of the Muslim World and the United Nations birthed a big humanitarian crises in Gaza.

The JI leader expressed these views here on Friday at Idara Noor-e-Haq, the JI Karachi headquarters.

Speaking on the occasion, the JI leader strongly condemned Israel and her supporters over genocide in Gaza. He said that the extremist Israel, with the help of the United States, the United Kingdom and other Western countries, converted Gaza into rubble.

Over 41 thousands innocent lives have been perished by Israel, over 90,000 have been injured, including over 22,000 have become handicapped forever, he highlighted.

Asif urges SIC to express regret over past action, misbehave to take a new start

ISLAMABAD (APP): Minister for Defense Khawaja Muhammad Asif on Friday urged the Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC) lawmakers to express regret and tender an apology for their past actions and misbehave to take a new start. Speaking in the National Assembly on a point of order, the minister categorically clarified that the committee formed by the Speaker is not merely to address the concerns or narrative of any political party but rather for upholding the sanctity of the House and strengthen its narrative.

The minister highlighted that the committee was set following a sugges-

tion of Chairman Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) Bilawal Bhutto Zardari. However, he expressed concern over the proceeding of the committee as it seemed that it was set up to address PTI's concerns.

Referring to the incident that occurred two days ago, Khawaja Asif said that everyone protested and expressed solidarity with PTI as no one supported an attack on the Parliament. The minister said that he recorded his protest during the committee meeting and recused himself from being a member of the committee besides suggesting his party to appoint someone else.

Karachi to get additional 20 MGD water

KARACHI (INP): The Karachi Water Sewerage Corporation (KWSC) inked an Engineering Procurement Construction (EPC) agreement for the construction of the new Hub Canal to increase water supply to the port city.

Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Engineer Syed Sallahuddin Ahmed signed the agreement in a ceremony that took place at the MD Secretariat attended by Director Wah Construction Limited Shoab Shafiq, Colonel Sabahuddin Chaudhry, 3G Consultant Sultan Dogar, Project Director Hub Canal Sikandar Ali, and Chief Engineer Sewerage E&M Syed

Sardar Shah.

According to the KWSC Spokesperson, the project includes the construction of a new Hub Canal and the restoration of the existing one. Additionally, the Hub Pumping Station, rising main, and the Hub Filter Plant will be upgraded from their current capacity of 80 Million Gallons per Day (MGD) to 100 MGD. The project, with a fixed cost of Rs12.76 billion, is expected to be completed within a year.

"Once finished, it will significantly improve the water supply to Karachi, particularly in the western district and Keamari," the spokesperson added.

Govtsponsoring 32 dam projects to address water scarcity: Musadik Malik

ISLAMABAD (APP): Minister for Water Resources, Musadik Masood Malik, informed the National Assembly on Friday that the Federal Government is financing the construction of 32 dam projects across Pakistan, with a total cost of Rs. 1,056.986 billion.

Responding to a question during the National Assembly's question hour, the minister said, "The federal government is financing the construction of various small, medium, and large dams/reservoirs through the Public Sector Development Program (PSDP) to store surplus water, which becomes available during the flood season. This stored water will be used for irrigation and drinking, when the natural flow in rivers decreases." Once completed, these projects will store approximately 8.43 billion acre-feet of water and irrigate an additional 436,934 acres of land, Malik said and highlighting that the water stored in the Diamer Basha Dam alone, about 6.4 billion acre-feet.

Nation stands with Pakistan Army against terrorism: Imdad Hussain Shah

KARACHI (APP): The Central President of Punjab Pakhtun Ittehad Pakistan (PPIP) Imdad Hussain Shah has said that the entire nation stands shoulder to shoulder with Pakistan Army against the menace of terrorism.

While addressing a protest rally here, he said that the ongoing terrorist incidents in the country were condemnable. Imdad Hussain Shah said that terrorists had no religion or caste. He said that according to religious teachings, the killing of one person was the killing of the entire humanity.

Polio worker robbed of his motorbike, cash, mobile

HYDERABAD (APP): A polio worker carrying out the immunization campaign was robbed of his motorbike, cash and mobile phone in a robbery in village Khawand Khoso in Qasimabad taluka here on Friday.

Farhan Ali Laghari informed the police that armed men riding on a motorbike robbed him of his belongings and escaped.

He added that the district administration and the health authorities in addition to the police had been informed about the incident.

ADB approves \$320 mln to improve climate-resilience, safety of roads in Pakistan

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Asian Development Bank (ADB) has approved a \$320 million loan to support the rehabilitation of roads in the province of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa in Pakistan, enhancing safe and all-weather connectivity in rural areas.

The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Rural Roads Development Project will upgrade around 900 kilometers of rural roads in the province that are susceptible to floods and are in poor condition, according to ADB press release received here on Friday.

These cover key routes that link remote communities to education, health care, and markets, it said adding the project includes measures to incorporate climate-resilient design, road safety enhancement, and sustainable maintenance practices.

"Road transport is both a lifeline to the people and a key component of socioeconomic development in Pakistan. This vital infrastructure project will reduce travel time, lower transportation costs, and increase access to economic opportunities for millions of residents in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa," said ADB Director General for Central and West Asia Yevgeniy Zhukov.

"By providing better access to markets and services, we are empowering local communities and driving inclusive economic growth in one of Pakistan's most underserved regions," Zhukov added. Annual rainfall and temperature patterns have significantly increased in parts of the province, and the lack of resilient infrastructure escalated the impact of disasters on people and livelihoods.

UBG demands immediate 3% further cut in interest rate by State Bank

KARACHI (INP): The President of United Business Group (UBG) Zubair Tufail, Chairman of Sindh Region Khalid Tawab, and Secretary General Hanif Gohar, along with central leaders Syed Mazhar Ali Nasir, Momin Ali Malik, Malik Khuda Bakhsh, Nadim Kushti wala and other leaders, criticized the State Bank of Pakistan's mere 2% reduction in the interest rate and demanded a further 3% cut.

They also emphasized that the interest rate should be brought down to single digits and a long-term, sustainable monetary policy should be established.

The UBG leaders said that while a 2% cut in the interest rate will provide slight relief to businesses, in reality, traders, exporters, importers, and small businesses are facing severe financial challenges, primarily due to a liquidity crunch. This situation has been worsened by economic challenges, particularly the sharp rise in business costs and record-high energy tariffs. Although the 2% reduction is a positive step by the SBP in the current circumstances, it remains insufficient. The UBG leaders noted that the business community of Pakistan had expected a significant 5% reduction in the interest rate, but the 2% cut neither meets expectations nor aligns with the decreasing inflation rate. Inflation has already dropped to single digits, yet the policy rate remains excessively high.

UBG President Zubair Tufail termed the 2% cut as inconsistent with the facts, stating that the business, industrial, and trading communities across Pakistan are disappointed with the monetary policy, as it continues to carry a heavy premium over core inflation. According to market estimates, core inflation for September 2024 is expected to hover around 8.0%, while global oil prices have fallen to a three-year low and dropped below \$70 per barrel this week.
